June 16, 1981

HAIG TALKS IN CHINA--World-wide media discussion of Secretary Haig's meetings with top PRC officials focused on what was seen as agreement of the two sides to oppose Soviet "hegemonism" and a playing down of differences on U.S. arms sales to Taiwan.

West German headlines today included "Haig Calls China Valuable Friend of U.S." (conservative Die Welt of Bonn), "Haig and Hua Plan Close Cooperation" (Pro-Christian Democratic Bonner Rundschau), "Haig Offers Peking Military Aid" (pro-Social Democratic Neue Ruhr Zeitung of Essen), "Haig in Peking Discusses Delivery of Military Hardware" (independent General-Anzeiger, Bonn), "Agreement Between Haig and Hua" (center-right Frankfurter Allgemeine) and "Only Controversial Issue Is Arms Deliveries to Taiwan" (pro-Social Democratic Frankfurter Rund-schau).

"See Common Strategic Goals"

General-Anzeiger today observed that "in spite of some differences of view, Peking and Washington see common strategic goals in their policies. Both are determined to establish a clear stop sign for Soviet hegemonism...

"Although published statements by Foreign Minister Huang Hua contain no reference to Taiwan, there is no doubt that Washington-Peking relations are suffering from uncertainty about the Reagan Administration's policy toward Taiwan."

"Doubt Taiwan Arms Issue Can Be Evaded"

Pro-Social Democratic Westfaelische Rundschau of Dortmund said that "Peking takes the view that U.S. arms deliveries to Taiwan would trouble Washington-Peking relations. It is doubtful that this issue can be evaded in coming negotiations in favor of concentrating on 'strategic cooperation' as desired by Haig. Peking does not want any compromise on the issue. Nevertheless, Foreign Minister Huang has expressed the hope that these 'difficulties' will be overcome. That would be the biggest success of Haig's mission in Peking."

International Communication Agency

Communist Paper: "Haig's Dreams May Turn to Nightmares"

In West Berlin, tiny Communist Die Wahrheit held that "by supporting the Chinese armament policy Washington intends to increase its military pressure on the Soviet Union...The expansionist Chinese policy in Southeast Asia is thus supported, and so the strengthening of socialism in this region is to be prevented...Still, the soil on which Reagan and Haig are making their gamble might prove to be too unfertile...Peking's leaders...dream of ruling the world. Therefore Haig's dreams might easily turn into nightmares."

Correspondent Tony Walker in today's London Financial Times reported from Beijing that "differences between the United States and China over Taiwan are believed to have caused talks between Mr. Alexander Haig...and Huang Hua...to take twice as long as expected yesterday..."

"Haig's Message Clearly Received With Satisfaction"

In Paris today, economic <u>Les Echos</u> said the "United States' determination to oppose Soviet pressure throughout the world...is the message conveyed by the U.S. Secretary of State to the Chinese leaders, a message clearly received with satisfaction...

"Both sides remain discreet as to the means to oppose the Moscow-Hanoi axis..."

Official Silence on Talks "Indicates Serious Differences"

Conservative Figaro today said that "serious differences reportedly appeared during the conversations conducted by Alexander Haig in Peking, as indicated by the persistent refusal of a U.S. high official with the Secretary of State to provide any indication about the content of the talks...

"The feeling prevailed that Mr. Haig and his Chinese counterparts had no difficulties agreeing on the threat against world peace by 'Soviet hegemonism.'...But their respective positions did not come any closer regarding the 'difficulties' opposing them, mainly on Taiwan."

"Haig Adopts Chinese Vocabulary"

Vienna's prestigious independent <u>Die Presse</u> today asked, "How could the faux pas have happened that the Secretary of State of the world's most powerful country would regard it as proper and diplomatic, in his two-hour talk with Chinese Foreign Minister Huang Hua, to use the Chinese vocabulary?

"He did this when he blamed 'Soviet hegemony' for everything. It is true that this favorite expression has been used in official Chinese statements since the beginning of the Sino-Soviet ice age. But its adoption by the West, and by the American Secretary of State in particular, must strike Beijing as an odd adjustment, to say the least..."

Japan: "U.S. Says Strong, Stable China Is Indispensable"

Tokyo's publicly financed NHK television today reported that Huang stated that China's basic foreign policy opposes hegemony, while Haig stated that the United States thinks the existence of a strong and stable China is indispensable for maintaining a balance of power in the world.

"Many Points of Agreement"

Independent moderate Yomiuri of Tokyo cited the New China News Agency as saying the Secretary and Huang had a "deep exchange of views."

The paper noted that their meeting lasted longer than scheduled. It cited an official in the Haig party as saying "there are many points of agreement on Soviet hegemony, which is the cause of the worsening international situation."

Independent liberal Asahi's correspondent in Beijing reported that Secretary Haig met with Vice Premier Bo Yibo and Defense Minister Geng Biao to discuss China's textile imports to the United States and U.S. arms exports to China.

Conservative financial Nihon Keizai's correspondent reported that a senior official accompanying Secretary Haig stated that the second meeting (with Huang) was extended because "these are the first high-level talks between the United States and China since the Reagan Administration took office."

South Korea: "Deadlock" on Arms Sale

All papers in Seoul today carried an Agence France-Press story that the two sides were "deadlocked" on sale of arms to Taiwan.

Hong Kong: Story on Defense Paper

The <u>South China Morning Post</u> today asserted that "the unprecedented disclosure in Peking" of a "paper prepared by... the Institute of International Strategic Studies (of London)...outlining China's defense posture with regard to the Soviet Union, is meant to be a reminder that China can withstand a Soviet assault, with or without American help."

The paper said release of the IISS document "was obviously part of China's rebuttal to suggestions in the United States that it sell the Chinese certain types of arms in return for tacit Peking consent that Taiwan also be similarly supplied."

Singapore: "Chinese Unease Over U.S. Policy Directions"

In the view of the Straits Times of last Saturday, "The Chinese definitely place great importance on relations with Washington because of its strategic value against the Soviet power and influence...

"But Chinese delight over Mr. Haig's visit is somewhat tempered by unease over what Beijing views as the various directions (or lack of them) in American foreign policy. This is confirmed in their eyes by a recent Reagan one-liner that 'sometimes the right hand does not know what the left hand does' in foreign policy."

India: "Americans Fail to Moderate Chinese Tone"

In New Delhi today, the <u>Times of India</u> ran a byliner's view that "if high-level briefings were designed by the Americans to moderate the Chinese tone, then they have clearly failed to do so. A spokesman of the Chinese Foreign Minister quickly replied to these American disclosures (on the talks) that 'should the United States continue to sell arms to Taiwan in disregard of our repeated expressions of resolute objection, we will certainly give a strong response.'"

African Treatment

The <u>Cameroon Tribune</u> of Yaounde reported on the weekend that <u>Secretary Haig</u> was arriving in Beijing at a time when the <u>Chinese</u> were mounting serious attacks against the <u>United States</u> over arms sales to <u>Taiwan</u>. The paper said <u>Mr. Haig</u> "has refused" to comment on the <u>Chinese</u> position.

In Lome, the official Togolese Nouvelle Marche observed that the talks at the outset resulted in a declaration in favor of increased cooperation in the face of "Soviet aggression and expansionism."

Headlines in Argentina

Headlines in Buenos Aires yesterday included, "Haig, Hua Agree on Danger of Soviet Expansionism" (conservative <u>La Prensa</u>) and "China and U.S. Accuse Moscow-Haig, Hua Agree on Impending Soviet Expansion" (conservative <u>La Nacion</u>).

* * * * * * *

MIDDLE EAST--Media in several capitals gave considerable attention to the status of the Habib mission, particularly in the light of the Israeli raid on Iraq. Other prominent media subjects were the anticipated U.S. stance in the current UNSC debate on the raid, and the overall U.S. attitude toward Israel. An Israeli Washington correspondent predicted that at his press conference today President Reagan would discuss general U.S. policies on the Middle East.

"Feeling That Israeli Patience Is Running Out"

The <u>Times</u> of London today ran a Jerusalem correspondent's statement that "with Mr. Philip Habib...due back in Israel later this week, there is a growing feeling in political circles here that Israeli patience with this mission is beginning to run out. The clearest indication of the (Israeli) Government's attitude was given last night when Mr. Begin told an election rally that Israel would itself remove the Syrian missiles if Mr. Habib brought a negative answer (on) Syria's willingness to remove them from Lebanon."

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"U.S. Efforts in Deep Trouble?"

London's <u>Financial Times</u> held today that "U.S. efforts to defuse the six-week missile crisis in Lebanon..appear to be in deep trouble after last week's Israeli attack on the nuclear reactor in Iraq. A heightened sense of crisis throughout the region was reflected in a remarkable personal appeal yesterday by King Hussein of Jordan to President Reagan...

"In Tel Aviv yesterday, military officials indicated Israel's readiness to attack Syrian anti-aircraft missiles stationed in Lebanon as soon as the (Habib) peace mission runs out of steam."

The paper added that "in Saudi Arabia, where Mr. Habib arrived at the weekend to pursue further the intermediary role played earlier by Riyadh, the official Saudi press agency carried Saudi newspaper criticism of his peace mission as 'irrelevant and incomprehensible.' U.S. diplomats in the Middle East are known to be concerned that the reports may represent a new level of frustration in the Saudi Government which could set back the loosely coordinated U.S.-Saudi attempts to resolve the confrontation."

"Israeli Papers Say U.S. Made Information Available"

Today's independent <u>Quotidien</u> de <u>Paris</u> stated that "several Israeli newspapers assert that the (Israeli) operation (against Iraq) was only made possible thanks to the information provided by Washington...It is likely that the United States will use its veto against a condemnation of Israel by the Security Council...The chances of reaching a peaceful settlement of the conflict in the Middle East have never seemed so small."

"Expect U.S. Condemnation of Raid"

In West Berlin, today's pro-Social Democratic Volksblatt Berlin wrote: "U.N. circles are convinced that in the Security Council the United States will veto any resolution that is combined with demands for sanctions. On the other hand, they expect U.S. chief delegate Jeane Kirkpatrick to agree to a simple condemnation of the Israeli operation."

In the paper's opinion there would be major conflict if the Arabs did not accept separate votes on condemnation and sanctions, be-

cause a general U.S. veto would "shock" the Arabs and have consequences.

"A New Phase of Destabilization?"

Centrist Corriere della Sera of Milan yesterday observed that "the nuclear race began in the Middle East in the 60s. The time of reckoning is now. Israel knows, or thinks it knows, that its security depends on the fact that it is the only one with the bomb. Perhaps the raid over Baghdad is only the beginning of a new phase of destabilization in that troubled region."

Israel: "Reagan Expected to Set Policy Today"

Israeli media today prominently cited several American officials, papers and television stations in regard to the Israeli raid on Iraq, concluding that there was as yet no clear indication about the precise way the United States will handle the UNSC debate on the exploit.

Opposition Davar of Tel Aviv today ran Washington correspondent Mordechai Barkai's speculation that "President Reagan is expected to determine in his press conference today the U.S. policies in the Middle East, beyond the preliminary reaction to the Israeli strike."

Paper Cites Meese on "the President's Stand"

Independent Yediot Aharonot today cited Presidential Adviser Edwin Meese's reported remarks to the Christian Science Monitor in which his "sympathetic note toward Israel reflects the President's stand."

"Increased U.S. Intelligence Surveillance?"

Today's Jerusalem Post carried Washington correspondent Wolf Blitzer's assertion that "Israel may find itself coming under increased U.S. intelligence surveillance" because of the raid. Citing "Administration and Congressional sources," Blitzer said Senator Percy had "suggested that the CIA target Israel for closer surveillance." Blitzer cited an assistant of the Senator as denying this.

Paper Reports Carter Message on Iraqi Nuclear Plans

Tel Aviv's Maariv asserted that "at the end of 1980" Mr. Begin received a document from President Carter that "stated in clear

terms that the United States knew that Iraq was trying to make nuclear weapons and that it was in an advanced stage toward that goal, with the help of the French reactor."

State Department Spokesman's Remarks

In regard to the Habib mission, Israeli correspondents today cited State Department spokesman David Passage as discussing the missile crisis yesterday. They concluded that his remarks were an indirect reply to Mr. Begin's earlier statement on Mr. Habib's mission.

Israeli radio ran a correspondent's opinion that "Syrian media yesterday provided Habib with answers to all questions he is going to ask Damascus in his current stop-over. They said that Syria had nothing to tell Habib and that Syria is not scared by Begin's threats."

Egypt: Sadat on the Israeli Raid

Cairo papers yesterday prominently carried President Sadat's reported statement to the Egyptian weekly May that the Israeli operation did not destroy peace but violently shook it. The papers said he described Begin's decision to strike the Iraqi nuclear facility as a "blank check" for Syria and the Soviet Union to use against the peace process.

Kuwait: Denial that AWACS in Saudi Arabia Aided Israelis

The Kuwait press Sunday and yesterday criticized the Israeli raid. Al-Qabas accused the United States of complicity and called for a "comprehensive reconsideration of the Arab world's relations with the United States."

The <u>Kuwait Times</u> yesterday ran a Kuwait News Agency dispatch from Riyadh stating that Saudi Arabia denied "press reports alleging that the AWACS planes operating in the Kingdom had assisted Israeli warplanes in their raid on Iraq's nuclear facility...Saudi Arabia is deeply grieved that some Arab newspapers have been deceived by the lies reported by some foreign media that are serving Zionist aims."

CLARK AFRICA MISSION--In Lusaka, the Times of Zambia, newspaper of the country's single legal party, asserted yesterday that the "American plan (for Namibia) seeks strict constitutional guarantees for the territory's 110,000 whites before independence." The paper emphasized that the peace plan which "Washington is now opposing was drawn up by the Western 'contact group' which includes the United States....But really what is more vexing in the latest U.S. maneuvers is their racist approach....Why should they be more concerned with the privileged white minority and not the longsuffering blacks?

"While these maneuvers are going on, the intransigent Pretoria regime is attacking independent neighboring countries and there is not a single word of rebuke from the White House. Africans have come to realize that the Americans are not being sincere in solving the Namibian problem apart from securing concessions to perpetuate their huge financial interests...

"The United States must be told in no uncertain terms (by the OAU) that delaying tactics or watered down peace plans will not stop the Namibian independence struggle but will only escalate the war."

WESTERN DEFENSE--Today's liberal <u>Guardian</u>, reporting on Assistant Secretary Eagleburger's speech in London last night, said he was "unrepentant" in urging NATO partners to "follow the Reagan lead" in boosting defense expenditures.

The conservative <u>Daily Telegraph</u> reported that Secretary Weinberger was "drawing up a secret 'defense guidance' paper...(that) represents a sharp departure from the strategy that has been followed since the Nixon Administration" and would permit the United States "to fight two major wars simultaneously."



Legislation on "The Regulation of Foreign Missions" has been introduced in HR 3518-Section 119 (State Appropriation Bill). The DC Government is unhappy about losing control over the location of foreign missions and has gone through OMB to the White House to lobby against the Bill. It is due to be raised by Ed Meese at his early morning staff meeting (June 4). (If he does not raise it, you should.) You can tell Meese that this bill has national security implications and that the question should be referred to the NSC Staff. Let

I sent you a memo on this issue some time ago. Bob Kimmitt and I have been keeping on top of it. There are important intelligence and other security issues involved; therefore, these foreign missions should be considered a Federal, not a D.C., responsibility.
