Dear Roy:

Thank you for your letter of November 14 and its enclosed message from the Chairman of the National Democratic Front (NDF) of Burma.

The struggle of Burmese minority peoples to realize their aspirations poses complex, long-running issues. Some of the groups in the NDF have been fighting the central government in Rangoon for forty years. As you are no doubt aware, and indeed as Mr. Saw Maw Reh concedes, some of the NDF members are very much involved in production of and trafficking in illicit drugs.

There is no doubt that the majority of Burmese want a more open, democratic government. While we have lent moral support, the ability of outside powers, including the United States, to influence the course of events in Burma is limited. The military's seizure of power two months ago was a setback to Burmese democratic aspirations. In response, we halted all assistance except for humanitarian relief.

Still, there is some reason to believe that there will be political change in Burma. The military authorities seem to be preparing for multiparty elections, and we have encouraged them to enter into a dialogue with opposition leaders aimed at a smooth transition to an elected government. No date for elections has been set, but it appears possible that they will be held early next year.

United States interests will be served best by continued encouragement of a process that, we hope, will lead to a more democratic political system in Burma, one that meets the aspirations of most Burmese and that would open the way for peaceful resolution of minority grievances as well.

We do not believe that our interests or those of democracy in Burma are best served by siding with the minorities against the government in Rangoon, even a government as unpopular as the current military regime. We certainly could not support an organization such as the NDF, based only on minority groups, as an interim government in Burma, particularly when some of its members are deeply involved in the drug trade.

I hope this helps you put the current Burmese political situation into perspective and to understand our approach to the issues involved.

Dear U Win Thein:

I am replying on behalf of the Secretary to your letter of October 10, 1988.

Throughout the recent turmoil in Burma, the United States has supported the democratic aspirations of the Burmese people. In addition to the visit to Burma of Representative Solarz, resolutions passed by the House of Representatives and Senate condemning the Burmese government's violence against demonstrators are indicative of the bipartisan support in the United States for democratic change in Burma.

The Department of State has also shared your concern about the use of lethal force by Burmese security forces against peaceful, unarmed demonstrators; this concern has been publicly expressed numerous times by the Department spokesman. In September, the United States halted all assistance to Burma in response to the killing of peaceful demonstrators. Our policy and public statements have underscored our desire to see change in Burma occur through peaceful processes rather than through violence.

In closing, I would note that while the shape of future political change in Burma remains uncertain, we certainly hope it will be in the direction of openness, freedom, and democracy. We will continue to monitor closely the situation in Burma, with hope that out of the current ferment a democratic system will evolve which reflects the aspirations of the Burmese people.



The driving force behind the recent unrest movement in Burma is quite undeniably, the students, their mentors and religious groups especially the Buddhist monks. The present regime in power is a closely knit, most cunning group of highly trained professional murderers who adhere to the inner core surrounding U Ne Win, U Sein Lwin, General Saw Maung, Major Sandar Win, (U Ne Win's daughter) Brig-Gen Khin Nyunt. Quite naturally they are handpicked and well doctinated regarding the loyalty to the inner groups.

The political situation in Burma, is unique in the world in the sense that, the democratic forces are popularly rising up and are in the advanced stages of overthrowing a national socialistic despotic dictatorial regime. It would indeed go down in the World History the mankind as the first of such a phenomenon. It is most essential to support this movement not only for the political future of Burma but also for the rest of the world.
