SUBJECT:

Senator Humphrey's Latest Letter

In addition to his earlier letters to you and the President, the Senator has written to you again on April 28, on why the Afghan Alliance in Peshawar should form the provisional government for Afghnistan and secure U.S. recognition. This letter implies that Senator Humphrey is somewhat more open to arguments of appropriateness and timing. In fact, both Alliance leader Hekmatyar and President Zia believe that action would be premature. They also agree that the U.S. should not be the first to extend recognition. Humphrey's staff assistant, Mike Pillsbury, is now asking State to help draft a resolution which preserves the Senator's concerns regarding Afghanistan, but is "in harmony" with the President's policy.

We will be preparing a response to all those letters for your signature to the Senator. The longer we draw out the dialogue, the more things on the ground will clarify themselves -- including Mujahidin capture of garrisons and towns and the political evolution.

Dear Colin:

I appreciate the information Shirin provided my staff yesterday regarding the Afghan Resistance Alliance. There may be a misunderstanding about my recommendation that we recognize the Alliance.

As I indicated in my letter to you, I do not in any way suggest that we confer recognition on only one faction of the Alliance. I propose that we recognize an interim government formed by the Alliance and based inside Afghanistan. As I also stressed, we could provide an important incentive to the Alliance to establish a broad based government inside Afghanistan, if they knew that the United States would be willing to move toward recognition.

I agree with the President's assertion that "the political future of Afghanistan must be decided by the Afghans themselves." The present plan for an interim government includes a broad political spectrum, with Afghans from outside the Alliance structure. After all, they have set up a cabinet structure of 14 ministers from the resistance, 7 from the refugees and 7 from "good Muslims" in Kabul. How could the provisional government be any broader or more representative? Moreover, the Alliance itself is highly representative of Afghan politics, extending from the fundamentalists to moderate supporters of the King like Pir Gailani.

Please let me know your views on why the Alliance's provisional government should not be recognized soon. I intend to take steps in Congress towards this goal and wish to do so in harmony with the President.

Dear Mr. President:

I returned this morning from three days of intensive discussions in Islamabad and Moscow with President Zia, top mujahideen leaders, and Soviet policy makers including Secretary Dobrynin.

I went to Islamabad on short notice, having received a communication from Yuli Vorontsov stating that he would be in Islamabad on 10 February for discussions with President Zia. I went in my capacity as a private citizen representing no government, but interested in assisting in any way possible the efforts to settle the Afghan question. As you know, I have retained an ongoing and active interest in the Afghan situtation for sometime. I have tried to use to the fullest benefit possible my good relationship with President Zia and the Soviet leadership while constantly keeping members of the U.S. Government at the Department of State and the White House fully informed about my activities.

While in this short letter I cannot fully relate to you the conversations held with President Zia and particularly with Secretary Dobrynin, I believe that unless some way is found for President Zia to sign the Geneva accords on 15 March the June summit meeting is in great peril and the Afghanistan issue may drag on for years.

There exists one central problem. The Soviets feel the future government of Afghanistan must be decided only by the Afghans themselves. Thus, they state firmly, they will not agree to establishing a new government before the signing on 15 March in Geneva. The Pakistanis say they will not sign with the present government and that a new one must form in Kabul before any agreements are signed.

Mr. Dobrynin asked me to deliver the message directly to you that the Soviets reject President Zia's proposals. He said Secretary Shultz will hear this directly from Mr. Gorbachev and he hopes that the U.S. Government will agree to help solve the problem.

President Zia asked me personally to present to you the enclosed letter which was dictated in my presence in his office yesterday in Islamabad. It sets forth his present position.

Perhaps a solution lies somewhere in between. I believe President Zia should not miss this chance to remove Soviet troops from Afghanistan. For their part, maybe the Soviets would hold no objection to establishment of a process to create a new government in Afghanistan after the agreements are signed (that process could be well underway before the agreements are signed, according to President Zia).

I think it would be beneficial for us to have a brief conversation at which time I could more fully relate the substance of the last days' conversations. You have made tremendous strides in bringing our world closer to peace and I stand as an admiring supporter ready to assist you in bringing your goals to fruition.

I am taking this opportunity of conveying to you something which I feel is very important. I had a long meeting with Mr Vorontsov yesterday, and he has left us with no doubt that the Soviet Union is sincere about their withdrawal. But he has also left a very strong and clear impression that the Soviet Union do not intend to do anything substantial and meaningful to bring about a new transitional government which is so essential for establishing stability and for creating an environment of security in which the refugees may return to Afghanistan with dignity and honour. Whereas I am of the view that the Soviet Union has taken a firm and hard decision to withdraw the troops, yet at the same time they are hoping that Dr Najib will continue to stay at the helm of affairs or alternatively, PDPA without him remain in being forming a coalition government around itself with elements from within and outside of Afghanistan but without the participation of the Mujahideen.

I wish to convey this to you that this is a great moment in history. It all depends how we emerge from this situation - we who have stood together and firmly on principles. I think when history is written, you Mr President, will emerge as one person who has contributed



so much, in the form of moral and material help, to the cause of freedom of a small, neutral, independent people. I may also add at this juncture that the United States has nurtured this tender tree of freedom of a people for 8 long years. This tree is about to bear the fruit.

I venture to say that your relevance and importance in history, with regard to the struggle of Afghans may not be related to the withdrawal of the Soviet troops. By an ironic turn of events the credit for this withdrawal may go to the Soviets themselves. greatness will be recognised by the history by your unflinching and steadfast support to a small and proud people, thousands of miles away from America, who waged a heroic struggle to retain their independence and identity. You should be known to history for one who helped the people of Afghanistan to throw away the yoke of oppression and subjugation and re-assertion of their independence. Unless this happens the basic aim will not be achieved. Therefore, I pray to you Mr President, that we should not let the Soviet Union turn their brutalities into glory. This can only be possible if your help, both moral and material continues to flow to the aid of Mujahideen.

I am requesting Dr Hammer to deliver this message personally to Dr Hammer is not only a great American but also a great friend of Pakistan, and also of the people of Afghanistan. He enjoys respect amongst leadership of the Soviet Union, and we value the role that he has been playing during the last four years for the cause of regaining freedom by the people of Afghanistan.



Dear Mr. Kling:

I am responding to your letter of April 27 to President Reagan on Afghanistan.

The settlement reached at Geneva on April 14 constitutes the first step toward realizing our goals in Afghanistan.

These aims have been and remain, to secure a rapid and complete withdrawal of Soviet troops, to facilitate the unimpeded return of the refugees to their homes, to restore Afghanistan's status as an independent and non-aligned country, and to allow the Afghan people genuine self-determination.

As Secretary Shultz made clear in Geneva, U.S. support for the Afghan resistance remains strong and will continue. We have stressed to the Soviets that we retain the right, consistent with our obligations as a guarantor of the agreement, to provide military assistance to the Afghan resistance. If Moscow continues to supply the Kabul regime

we will exercise that right. You can be certain that this

Administration will do nothing which would put the mujahidin at
a disadvantage as they continue their struggle against the
illegitimate regime in Kabul. We believe that this regime
cannot long survive a Soviet withdrawal.

As the Soviet withdrawal proceeds, our attention will turn to the repatriation and resettlement of the millions of Afghan refugees. We are encouraging a multilateral effort in order to maximize the resources from various sources. We will also continue our own substantial humanitarian assistance program for the war-affected people of Afghanistan.

We look forward to the day when Afghanistan will take its rightful place in the community of nations as an independent country, free of foreign intervention and occupation. This Administration remains committed to the cause of a free Afghanistan, and our support for the Afghan people will not falter as they near the goal for which they have sacrificed so much.

Dear Mr. President:

Your decision to agree to the Afghan accords comes as a great disappointment to those of us who number ourselves among your most ardent supporters and who have shared your publicly stated commitment to the realization of an independent, non-communist Afghanistan.

While we recognize it is too late to reverse your decision, we respectfully ask that you publicly repeat your commitment to seek an Afghanistan that is free and not within the Soviet orbit — and that you become personally involved in assuring that, should the Soviets begin aiding its puppet Kabul regime, the United States continues aiding the Afghan resistance with Stingers, long-range mortars and mine-clearing equipment.

Further, we ask that you:

- Recognize the Afghan resistance, the Islamic Unity of Mujahideen, as the true leadership of Afghanistan.
- Make public the letters of understanding between Secretary of State George Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Sheverdnadze, dated March 25 and April 8 of this year.
- Provide United States assistance in Afghan reconstruction once the Soviets have withdrawn, and demand war reparations of the Soviet Union.
- Institute an immediate embargo on proposed U.S. high-tech trade with the Soviets until they have completely withdrawn from Afghanistan and an independent Afghan government has been formed there.
