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

SUBJECT:

Domestic Issues for Summit Trip

As discussed, there follows several domestic "events" which should be ripe for Presidential action during the Summit. None of these requires "heavy lifting" which I know is difficult when you are traveling abroad. There are seven items, which should show some domestic Presidential activity for seven of the thirteen travel days.

- 1. After consultation with Secretary of Labor Bill Brock, establish an Emergency Board to investigate the labor dispute between the Maine Central Railroad and its employees in accordance with Section 10 of the Railway Labor Act. An Executive Order creating the Board is in David Chew's office.
- 2. Sign the World Trade Week Proclamation. Although World Trade Week is not until May 19, the President could sign the proclamation early; not much news value, but would demonstrate that the President is continuing day-to-day business.
- Issue a statement on Fair Housing Month. We would need to move quickly because April is Fair Housing Month.
- 4. Direct Secretary Herrington to establish a group to determine if we should go forward with plans to select a second nuclear waste repository by the end of the century. We are currently required by law to do this, but conditions in the nuclear power industry have resulted in estimated reduction of waste products on the order of 30-40%. (Tentative meeting with Secretary Herrington this afternoon on this issue.)
- 5. Issue a statement when the remains of the Challenger astronauts are returned next week -- to Dover Air Force Base.

- 6. Announce support for legislation which would revise the personnel system so that employee compensation would be based more on performance. Although no decision memo has been forwarded, the DPC's consensus recommendation is to support such legislation. The timing on this issue would be good because the week of May 5 is Public Service Recognition Week.
- 7. Announce that we oppose an amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill which would transfer security screening of civilian DOD employees from OPM to DOD. We will, however, review the issue through a special working group and may ultimately support the transfer. The President has a decision memo on his desk on this issue.
