

# TORONTO SUMMIT Draft Guidance for Public Diplomacy Efforts

# Toronto Summit represents the maturation of the Summit process.

The Toronto Summit will be the end of the second cycle of Economic Summits. These summits have become a real force for international economic cooperation, an opportunity for leaders to learn from each others experiences and attitudes, and a forum to discuss critical political issues such as our response to terrorism.

There have been a number of accomplishments at the summits in the eighties. The Bonn Summit played key role in initiating Uruguay Round; the Tokyo Summit placed agriculture reform squarely on the international economic agenda. Versailles launched and Tokyo elaborated the process of economic coordination. Williamsburg laid the groundwork for our international debt strategy (which evolved into the Baker Plan). Summits have provided the political impetus for the reform, adjustment and cooperation necessary for enhancing growth and working toward more open and efficient economies.

At the last Summit in Canada (Ottawa 1981), President Reagan raised themes of reliance on market forces and the urgency of structural reform. Over the intervening years, these themes have become accepted policy tenets of the Summit process and are applied in most of the Summit Seven countries.

#### The Agenda at Toronto

The discussion at Toronto will likely be more focused on economic topics than at recent summits. Prime Minister Mulroney, with full support of the other leaders, is trying to make this Summit less formal to allow for more substantive interchange.

The overall theme of this Summit is likely to be the importance of free markets and open societies. As we enter the nineties, the pace of technological and economic change is accelerating; the Summit leaders know they must take full advantage of new opportunities while managing associated social and political stress. The experience of the past decade has been that the economies and societies that are the most open and free are the most flexible and adaptable and the most likely to experience high rates of growth.

This theme is likely to recur as the Heads discuss the spectrum of traditional and non-traditional Summit topics. On trade, for example, the enduring Summit theme of liberalization is likely to be reinforced by the leaders in a call to the GATT to make tangible progress in the Uruguay Round at the mid-term review this December. In this context, particular attention again will be focused on agriculture. The major Summit nations are wasting vast resources on market-distorting subsidies of their agricultural sectors. At Venice, the Heads called upon the Uruguay Round to negotiate a long-term solution to the crisis in agriculture, based on the principle of market-oriented structural changes and the phase-out of trade-distorting subsidies. At Toronto, the U.S. and Canada in particular will be seeking more specificity in guidance to the GATT on advancing towards this politically difficult but economically imperative objective.

In the context of the general theme of stimulating greater openness and flexibility, the Heads undoubtedly will be discussing other "structural" (also known as microeconomic) problems. Examples of structural issues, beside trade and agriculture, where the Heads may be exchanging experiences and advice would be: tax reform, privatization and deregulation (particularly in such trade-relevant sectors as transportation, financial services, and telecommunications), education, entitlement programs and employment.

The Summit will also be an occasion for the leaders to review and, if necessary, improve the arrangements for international economic policy coordination agreed upon at the Tokyo and Venice Summits. Over the past few years, the policy coordination process has provided a forum for the Summit countries to consider ways to promote policies that will assure further convergence of economic performance and a strong and stable global economy.

They will benefit in this discussion from the availability of the international economic indicators provided the G-7 by the IMF staff. There may even be discussion on the margins of the Summit of proposals to improve the indicators process, by adding, for example, a commodity price index.

The President and other Summit participants may discuss the potential for a more equitable sharing of the responsibilities inherent in the international economic system. The Summit may consider ways that surplus countries and the rapidly growing, so-called newly industrializing countries (NICs) might assume more responsibilities commensurate with their economic strength and extensive trading relationships.

The theme of flexibility and openness will be relevant as well to the discussion of international debt problems. The Summit leaders will review developments in the application of the debt strategy, such as elaborations of the "menu approach" and recent debt management experiences of major debtor nations (Mexico, Brazil etc.) The President will be cautioning against so-called "global solutions" which would in various forms have creditor governments underwrite debt restructuring

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packages. In the U.S. view such approaches would run counter to the principle of private market-based solutions, and would lump all debtors together, losing the economic policy benefits of the case-by-case approach.

The Toronto Summit may also be an occasion for the leaders to discuss other important economic issues. Other topics that might be raised will of course be determined by the interests of the Heads and, perhaps, by the pressing economic issues of the moment.

#### The Communique and Statements

A number of the Summit heads, including the President, have expressed a preference for having the Summit statements process be more brief and reflective of what was actually discussed and decided. Accordingly, at Toronto the expectation is that there will be fewer and simpler presentations of what the leaders have discussed, although the specifics of any Communique or statement(s) on political issues will necessarily be determined at Toronto.
