Dear Senator Sarbanes:

Thank you for your letter of January 7 to Secretary Shultz regarding the human rights situation in Pakistan, particularly the detention of Pakistani attorney Raza Kazim.

Mr. Kazim and a number of other Pakistanis, including military personnel, were arrested in January 1984 by Pakistan's martial law authorities. We understand that Mr. Kazim is suspected of involvement in a plot to overthrow the Government. In July 1984 local newspapers reported that Mr. Kazim had been charged under the Pakistan Army Act of 1952 with "attempting to seduce Army personnel." Family and defense sources, however, have told our diplomats in Pakistan that Mr. Kazim and his codefendants were only recently charged under sections of the Pakistan Penal Code which concern various serious offences including "waging or attempting to wage war against Pakistan."

In the past, trials involving sensitive national security matters have been in camera before a military court. Presumably, this will be done in Mr. Kazim's case due to the sensitivity of the allegations and the possible presentation of evidence or testimony implicating foreign powers.

We understand that one of Mr. Kazim's attorneys met with his client on January 10. Various family members, including Mr. Kazim's wife, have met with Mr. Kazim on several occasions. Family sources state that Mr. Kazim has received medical and dental treatment while in detention. According to these sources, Mr. Kazim has not alleged that he has been tortured.

Our diplomats in Pakistan will continue to follow this case closely, as they do the general human rights situation in Pakistan. During the past year, there have been some positive developments in Pakistan's human rights situation. Hundreds of political detainees have been released, including most of the country's prominent opposition politicians. Some limited political activities have been permitted as the nation prepares for parliamentary elections on February 25 and for provincial assembly elections on February 28. Pakistan, of course, continues to provide refuge for over 2 million Afghan refugees in the face of the continuing Soviet threat from Afghanistan.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to express my concern over the continuing problem of human rights violations in Pakistan, and specifically about the case of Raza Kazim. Mr. Kazim, a lawyer, has been held in solitary confinement for a full year, since January 9, 1984, although no charges have ever been filed against him. Amnesty International has received reports of dozens of other such political detainees, many of whom are being tortured in Pakistani prisons.

It is my strongly held view that human rights concerns must be an integral part of U.S. foreign policy, and that respect for the rule of law is fundamental to those concerns. I hope that you will continue to voice those concerns in your dealings with the government of Pakistan.





Attached at Tab A is the USIA proposal to transfer approximately \$660,000 into an interest-bearing account. The recipient would be the U.S.-Pakistan Educational Foundation. Treasury and OMB are not sure that this can be done in time for fiscal year 1986. It may go to a supplemental next year. There are more imaginative uses we can put this money to in the Indo-Pakistani cultural/educational context in the near future. For example, if Indo-Pakistani normalization proceeds satisfactorily, an exchange of scholars between these countries (which could be financed from this fund) could further help improve relations. When we have programs, we cannot find requisite funds. In view of the above, and given the fact that the U.S. Educational Foundation in Pakistan already has sufficient funds, we should not release the \$660,000 at this time.

## UNITED STATES EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION IN PAKISTAN

Sec. 204. There is hereby authorized to be appropriated for the United States Information Agency for the fiscal year 1986 up to the equivalent of \$660,000 in Pakistani rupees owned by the United States, to be made available to the United States Educational Foundation in Pakistan for use in carrying out purposes of the Foundation. Such use may include investment of the funds by the Foundation in order to generate income that will be retained by the Foundation to support its programs.

## Analysis

The Treasury Department now holds approximately 10,261,000 Pakistani rupees owned by the United States as a result of the Agency's operation from 1956 through 1966 of the now-defunct Informational Media Guaranty Program pursuant to Section 1011 of the United States Information and Educational Exchange Act of 1948, as amended. At the present rate of exchange, these rupees are worth about \$660,000.

Section 1011(d) of that Act provides, in substance, that foreign currencies generated under the IMG program may be appropriated by Congress for use for educational and other specified purposes that are in the national interest of the United States and mutually agreed to by the governments of the United States and other countries from which the currencies are derived. The United States Educational Foundation in Pakistan conducts precisely that type of educational program. It was established by an agreement between the Government of the United States and the Government of Pakistan, which entered into force on October 18, 1972.

Dear Mr. Nasem:

I am writing in response to your letter of March 21 to the President.

In your letter and report you allege that, somehow, the Department of State, specifically NEA/PAB, has obstructed the workings of the U.S.-Pakistan Alliance to the detriment of the private sector of both countries and of the national interests of the United States and to the benefit of the Soviet Union. These are serious allegations which, quite frankly, you have failed to substantiate in any way. If you believe that we are the cause of whatever difficulties you might be experiencing, I suggest you contact us directly; we will be happy to meet you, as we have done numerous times, and discuss whatever it is you wish to discuss.

We strongly favor and support the work of private organizations in bringing about increased trade, investment, and understanding between the United States and its friends abroad. In so far as the U.S.-Pakistan Alliance is one such group, we, of course, wish it all the best. We cannot, however, favor the Alliance over other groups nor confer upon it a quasi-official status. We will consult and share information with the Alliance to the same extent that we do so with other private Americans and organizations.

I am not indignant, not outraged but, I am very disappointed that my letter to you dated the June 29, 1984, did not even receive a cursory review by some responsible official at the White House, although the subject addressed had great national security interest implications for the U.S.

Throughout your public service, you have always placed strong emphasis on public involvement in the government affairs. You are the champion of the "get the government of the back of the people" campaign. There is someone at the Reagan's White House, who does not share your values. Our letter had asked you to help us gain balance in our charted mission of bringing the people of Pakistan and the U.S. togather as friends.

This letter of profound importance to the private sector in two countries was routinely sent to some unspecified concerned agency with a short good-bye to us and we never heard about it. As I had worked on your 1976 and 1980 presidential campaign as an un-paid member of the election team. I do not recall, this type of attitude visible among the members. We respected every letter and suggestion we received and thanked the people who took the time to reach us, either by phone or letter.

Despite the handling of the mail at the White House, I do still very much respect your choice of personnel and taking the liberty in sending you this most serious report on U.S. Pakistan foreign affairs.

I trust that it will merit your personal attention in some suitable form of a brief smmary to you. The subject matter should be before the U.S. Department of State, under normal channal of communication. But, we have not had much luck with the Office of NEA/PAB and we are unable to get our dissatisfactions high up on the screen for Secretary Shultz's attention

In most stark terms, we are faced with the same issue that has been upper most in your mind. Namely, that the foreign policies of the United States are defined, promoted, implemented, and managed by the Department of State and when any segment of these policies fail, not only the U.S. Embassies but also the U.S. Armed Forces, pay the formidable price with American lives. Results of failures come home to us in caskets.

The notion that a number of foreign service officials must be given a free hand in the implementation of the U.S. foreign policy without any check and balance that will involve the guidance and advice from the U.S. and the host country private sector has back fired in the recent years. Iran is the most obvious case in point.

Over 30 million Iranians, despite the great working relationship between State Department and the Shah, did not really know the Americans and when the governments turned the cards on the table, almost every Iranian was a potential risk to the U.S. public relations in Iran.

I hope we are not hard at work turning Pakistan into another Iran. This time the United States - Pakistan Alliance wants to share in the private sector implementation of the U.S. foreign policy in Pakistan and I strongly urge you to assist us by instructing the Department of State to cooperate and establish a practice of frequest consultations with the Alliance in the future.


