BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON DR. FRANK E. YOUNG

Frank E. Young, M.D., Ph.D., Commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, was born in Mineola, New York in 1931 and was educated in Union College, the Medical Center of the State University of New York (M.D., Cum Laude) and Case Western Reserve University (Ph.D.). After internship and residency in Pathology in University Hospitals in Cleveland, Chio, Dr. Young served on the Faculty of Case Western Reserve University (1962-1965), Scripps Clinic and Research Foundation (1965-1970) and University of California at San Diego (1967-1970). In 1970 he became Chairman of the Department of Microbiology and Professor of Microbiology, of Pathology and of Radiation Biology and Biophysics at the University of Rochester, Rochester, New York. Concurrently he directed the Clinical Microbiology Laboratories for Strong Memorial Hospital and the County of Monroe. Subsequently he was appointed Dean of the School of Medicine and Dentistry and Director of the Medical Center of the University of Rochester (1979-1984) and Vice President for Health Affairs (1981-1984). Additionally he served as Chairman of the Executive Hospital Committee of Strong Memorial Hospital (1979-1984), Chairman of the Medical Advisory Committee, Monroe Community Hospital (1979-1984) and Pathologist, Strong Memorial Hospital (1974-1984).

While Commissioner of FDA Dr. Young participated as a Member of the U.S. Delegation to the World Health Assembly in Geneva, Switzerland, 1985; lead the U.S. Delegation to the Third U.S./Israeli Symposium on Health, Jerusalem, 1985; participated in the Conference of Experts on the Rational Use of Drugs, Nairobi, Kenya, 1985; and Headed the State Department Delegation to the Ad Hoc Biotechnology Working Group of the Organization of Economic Cooperation Development, Paris, France, 1985, which resulted in the negotiation of an international agreement in Biotechnology. Dr. Young's area of research is biotechnology including the fundamental genetics of pathogenic and non-pathogenic bacteria. These studies were supported by grants from the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation, American Cancer Society, and industry. He has received numerous awards including membership in the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, the Edward Mott Moore Award for the outstanding physician from the Monroe County Medical Society, honorary degrees from Roberts Wesleyan College (Doctor of Science, 1983) and Houghton College (Doctor of Science, 1984) and was a member of ten scientific societies. He has served on NIH advisory committees, including the Recombinant DNA Advisory Committee (1979-1980), the Microbiology Training Study Section (1972-1973), the Bacteriology and Mycology Study Section (1975-1979), and was chairman of the Microbial Genetics Study Section (1981-1982). He also was a member of the Scientific Advisory Committee for Virology and Cell Biology Study Section of the American Cancer Society (1974-1979).

He and his wife Leanne have five children.

SUBCHAPTER XX-WORLD HEALTH ORGANIZATION

§ 290. Acceptance of membership by the United States

The President is hereby authorized to accept membership for the United States in the World Health Organization (hereinafter referred to as. the Organization), the constitution of which was adopted in New York on July 22, 1946, by the International Health Conference for the establishment of an International Health Organization, and deposited in the archives of the United Nations.

INTERNATIONAL HEALTH ADMINISTRATION

Ex. Ord. No. 10399, Sept. 29, 1952, 17 F.R. 8648, designated the Surgeon General to perform certain duties under the International Sanitary Regulations of the World Health Organization.

§ 290a. Designation, of representatives and alternates; compensation; loyalty checkup

The President shall designate from time to time to attend a specified session or specified sessions of the World Health Assembly of the Organization not to exceed three delegates of the United States and such number of alternates as he may determine consistent with the rules of procedure of the World Health Assembly. One of the delegates shall be designated as the chief delegate. Whenever the United States becomes entitled to designate a person to serve on the Executive Board of the Organization. under article 24 of the constitution of the Organization, the President shall designate a representative of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and may designate not to exceed one alternate to attend sessions of the Executive Board. Such representative must be a graduate of a recognized medical school and have spent not less than three years in active practice as a physician or surgeon. Such representative and any such alternate shall each be entitled to receive compensation at one of the rates provided by section 867 of this title, for such period or periods as the President may specify, except that no Member

of the Senate or House of Representatives or officer of the United States who is thus designated shall be entitled to receive such compensation: Provided, That no person shall serve as such representative, delegate, or alternate until such person has been investigated as to loyalty and security by the Civil Service Commission.

§ 290b. Authorization of appropriations; payment of salaries and expenses

There are hereby authorized to be appropriated to the Department of State for contribution to the working capital fund of the organization the sum of \$560,000 and as annual appropriations the following:

(a) such sums as may be necessary for the payment by the United States of its share of the expenses of the Organization as apportioned by the Health Assembly in accordance with article 56 of the constitution of the Organization, except that payments by the United States for any fiscal year of the Organization after 1958 shall not exceed 33% per centum of the total assessments of active members of the Organization for such fiscal year; and

(b) such additional sums, not to exceed \$83,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1947, as may be necessary to pay the expenses incident to participation by the United States in the activities of the Organization, including—

(1) salaries of the representative and alternate provided for in section 290a of this title, and appropriate staff, including personal services in the District of Columbia and elsewhere, without regard to the civil-service laws and chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 5; services as authorized by section 3109 of title 5; under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of State may prescribe, allowances for living quarters, including heat, fuel, and light and cost of living allowances to persons temporarily stationed abroad; printing and binding without regard to section 501 of title 44 and section 5 of title 41; and

(2) such other expenses as the Secretary of State deems necessary to participation by the United States in the activities of the Organi-

zation: Provided. That the provisions of section 287r of this title, and regulations thereunder, applicable to expenses incurred pursuant to subchapter XVII of this chapter shall be applicable to any expenses incurred pursuant to this paragraph.

While Commissioner of FDA Dr. Young participated as a Member of the U.S. Delegation to the World Health Assembly in Geneva, Switzerland, 1985; lead the U.S. Delegation to the Third U.S./Israeli Symposium on Health, Jerusalem, 1985; participated in the Conference of Experts on the Rational Use of Drugs, Nairobi, Kenya, 1985; and Headed the State Department Delegation to the Ad Hoc Biotechnology Working Group of the Organization of Economic Cooperation Development, Paris, France, 1985, which resulted in the negotiation of an international agreement in Biotechnology. Dr. Young's area of research is biotechnology including the fundamental genetics of pathogenic and non-pathogenic bacteria. These studies were supported by grants from the National Institutes of Health, National Science Foundation, American Cancer Society, and industry. He has received numerous awards including membership in the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences, the Edward Mott Moore Award for the outstanding physician from the Monroe County Medical Society, honorary degrees from Roberts Wesleyan College (Doctor of Science, 1983) and Houghton College (Doctor of Science, 1984) and was a member of ten scientific societies. He has served on NIH advisory committees, including the Recombinant DNA Advisory Committee (1979-1980), the Microbiology Training Study Section (1972-1973), the Bacteriology and Mycology Study Section (1975-1979), and was chairman of the Microbial Genetics Study Section (1981-1982). He also was a member of the Scientific Advisory Committee for Virology and Cell Biology Study Section of the American Cancer Society (1974-1979).

He and his wife Leanne have five children.

§ 290. Acceptance of membership by the United States

The President is hereby authorized to accept membership for the United States in the World Health Organization (hereinafter referred to as. the Organization), the constitution of which was adopted in New York on July 22, 1946, by the International Health Conference for the establishment of an International Health Organization, and deposited in the archives of the United Nations.

§ 290a. Designation of representatives and alternates; compensation; loyalty checkup

The President shall designate from time to time to attend a specified session or specified sessions of the World Health Assembly of the Organization not to exceed three delegates of the United States and such number of alternates as he may determine consistent with the rules of procedure of the World Health Assembly. One of the delegates shall be designated as the chief delegate. Whenever the United States becomes entitled to designate a person to serve on the Executive Board of the Organization, under article 24 of the constitution of the Organization, the President shall designate a representative of the United States, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and may designate not to exceed one alternate to attend sessions of the Executive Board. Such representative must be a graduate of a recognized medical school and have spent not less than three years in active practice as a physician or surgeon. Such representative and any such alternate shall each be entitled to receive compensation at one of the rates provided by section 867 of this title, for such period or periods as the President may specify, except that no Member

of the Senate or House of Representatives or officer of the United States who is thus designated shall be entitled to receive such compensation: *Provided*, That no person shall serve as such representative, delegate, or alternate until such person has been investigated as to loyalty and security by the Civil Service Commission.

§ 290b. Authorization of appropriations; payment of salaries and expenses

There are hereby authorized to be appropriated to the Department of State for contribution to the working capital fund of the organization the sum of \$560,000 and as annual appropriations the following:

(a) such sums as may be necessary for the payment by the United States of its share of the expenses of the Organization as apportioned by the Health Assembly in accordance with article 56 of the constitution of the Organization, except that payments by the United States for any fiscal year of the Organization after 1958 shall not exceed 33% per centum of the total assessments of active members of the Organization for such fiscal year; and

(b) such additional sums, not to exceed \$83,000 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1947, as may be necessary to pay the expenses incident to participation by the United States in the activities of the Organization, includ-

ing-

(1) salaries of the representative and alternate provided for in section 290a of this title, and appropriate staff, including personal services in the District of Columbia and elsewhere, without regard to the civil-service laws and chapter 51 and subchapter III of chapter 53 of title 5; services as authorized by section 3109 of title 5; under such rules and regulations as the Secretary of State may prescribe, allowances for living quarters, including heat, fuel, and light and cost of living allowances to persons temporarily stationed abroad; printing and binding without regard to section 501 of title 44 and section 5 of title 41; and

(2) such other expenses as the Secretary of State deems necessary to participation by the United States in the activities of the Organization: Provided, That the provisions of section 287r of this title, and regulations thereunder, applicable to expenses incurred pursuant to subchapter XVII of this chapter shall be applicable to any expenses incurred pursuant to this paragraph.

BACKGROUND

This assembly will be the 39th annual session of the World Health Organization, open to all UN member states, at which the WHO program is reviewed and the budget is approved. Public Law 80-643 requires that the Chief Delegate, two Delegates and any Alternate Delegates to the Assembly be appointed by the President. Senate confirmation of these appointments is not required.

Traditionally the Delegates and Alternates appointed by the President are senior government officials primarily from the health field. The Department of Health and Human Services, in consultation with the State Department, has recommended Secretary Bowen for appointment as Chief Delegate, with C. Everett Koop, Surgeon General of the United States, as Deputy Chief Delegate. The third Delegate would be Ambassador Gerald Carmen of the U.S. Mission in Geneva. Proposed for Alternate Delegates are Dr. Frank Young, Commissioner of Food and Drugs, Thomas Malone, Deputy Director of the National Institutes of Health, Neil Boyer of the State Department, and Nyle Brady of the Agency for International Development.

These Delegates and Alternate Delegates would be assisted by a small number of Government experts from the Department of Health and Human Services and by members of the staff of the U.S. Mission in Geneva.

If the proposed designations are approved, the Department will proceed with appropriate arrangements.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

FROM: The Secretary of Health and Human Services

SUBJECT: 40th World Health Assembly

Under Secretary Don Newman recently led the U.S. delegation to the 40th World Health Assembly. His report to me on this annual meeting of the member states of the World Health Organization (WHO) has reinforced my belief that WHO is one U.N. agency in which membership is clearly in the U.S. interest. Moreover, WHO is providing an excellent example not only of continuing sound management, but also of efforts to reform the U.N. budgeting processes along lines advocated by the United States.

In his address to the Assembly, Mr. Newman emphasized the need for budget reduction and reform, and stressed the importance of including the private sector in financing health care at the country level. He also emphasized the role that both the United States and WHO are playing in international efforts to combat disease, especially the serious problem of AIDS.

The results of the two-week Assembly were, for the most part, very positive.

While WHO's 1988-1989 budget, as originally proposed, contained no program growth, it did have a significant nominal increase due primarily to inflation and the decline in the value of the dollar. However, the efforts of the U.S. delegation were largely responsible for a commitment by the Director-General to re-open the biennial budget in 1988 to reduce it further by \$25 million and to use the reformed budgeting process to seek at least \$25 million in additional cuts in the 1990-1991 budget.

On other matters, there was very thoughtful and constructive discussion of the priority programs of WHO. These include the world-wide effort to combat diseases that kill millions of children every year, the international battle against drug abuse and, importantly, WHO's efforts to coordinate the global fight against AIDS.

Unfortunately, as at other U.N.-related meetings, there were efforts by certain member states to interject extraneous political issues. However, our delegation was impressed by the extent to which the WHO leadership and many member states worked to eliminate or minimize these divisive issues.

Finally, I want to note the great importance of U.S. contributions to WHO, measured in terms of technical input, program leadership and policy guidance. Mr. Newman noted, as I did when I headed the delegation last year, that there is a recognition on the part of both the WHO secretariat and many member states that these non-monetary U.S. contributions to WHO are at least as important as our budgetary assessment in making WHO one of the most successful and highly regarded intergovernmental agencies.
