Under his leadership, Gabon has consistently encouraged the peaceful settlement of regional disputes, siding with reason, dialogue, and moderation over bloodshed, war, and terror. Recognizing this, the Organization of African Unity asked President Bongo to help find a solution to the conflict in Chad.

President Bongo has been a champion of African development and has worked tirelessly for the welfare of its peoples. The United States and Gabon enjoy close cooperation in the effort to achieve these noble goals. We have enjoyed a positive and friendly relationship for the past two decades, a relationship that has served both our countries well. I've greatly valued President Bongo's advice and counsel concerning America's role in Africa's political and economic development.

As requested, this office has reviewed the above-referenced draft departure statement of President Reagan for delivery on the departure of President Bongo of Gabon. We have no legal objection to the draft statement.

We have three stylistic suggestions. First, in the first sentence of the first paragraph "welcomed" should be changed to "welcome." As presently written, the sentence could be read to refer to the quality of White House hospitality ("very welcomed"), rather than the President's pleasure at seeing President Bongo ("very welcome"). Second, in the second sentence of the first paragraph the word "overdue," which might be taken as a criticism of President Bongo for delaying his visit, should be changed to "awaited." Third, in the fourth line of the second paragraph the word "sided" should be changed to "siding."

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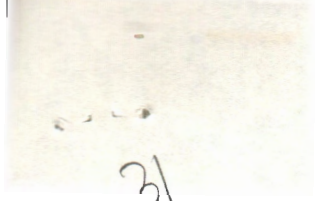

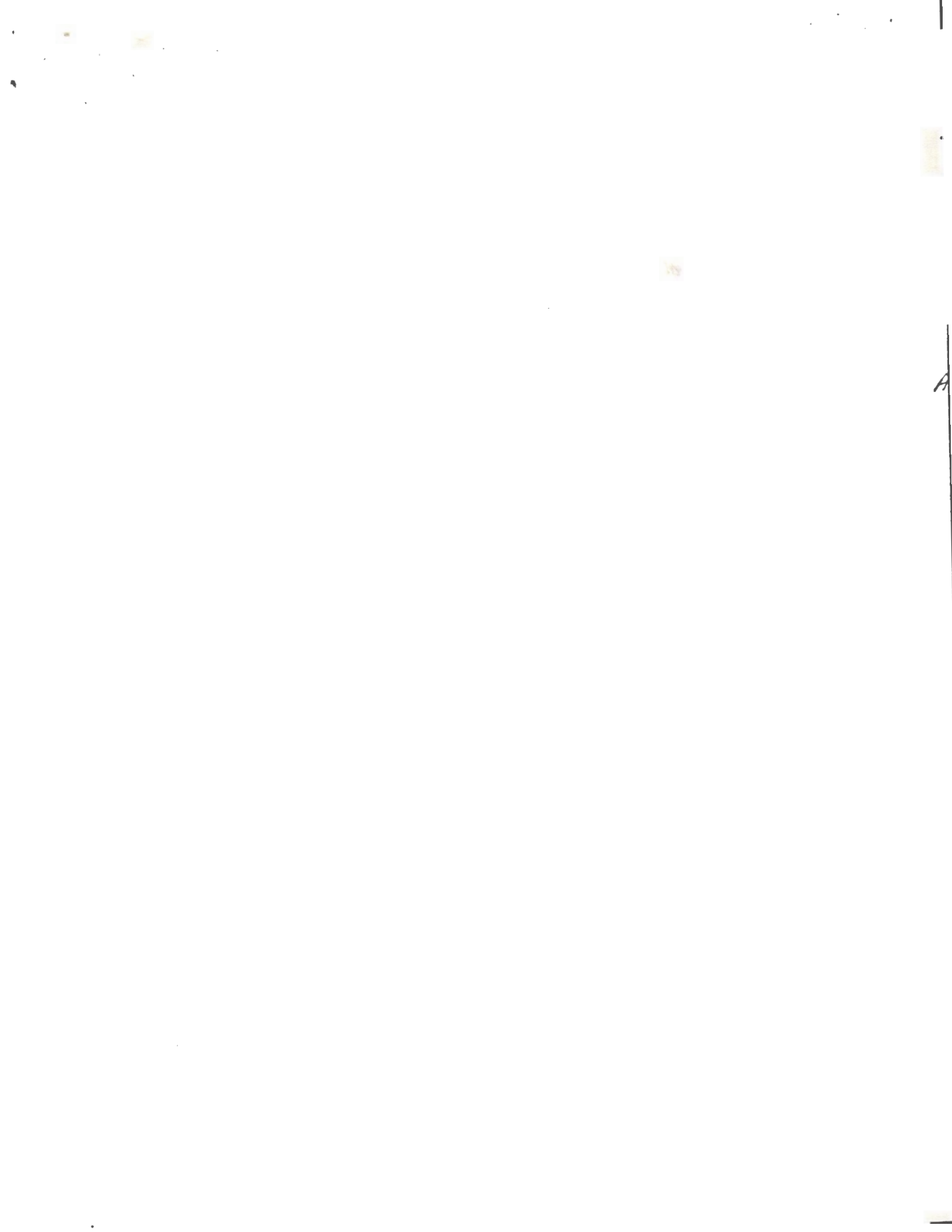
We appreciate your cooperation in accommodating our suggested changes. We think the draft is much improved with your revisions.
