

For Italy is a very close friend of the United States, a friend whose support we value and whose counsel we seek and trust.

You have come to the United States at a moment when our relationships with our friends and allies in Europe are very much on our minds. Just a week ago Soviet General Secretary Gorbachev and I signed the INF Treaty. We in the United States are keenly aware that it was the political will and determination of European governments and peoples and our joint commitment to the NATO alliance that enabled us to conclude that treaty. As I told Prime Minister Gorla, Italy's part in this process, since the moment in 1979 when it came forward to accept deployment, has been indispensable.

← INF is a lesson that we should apply in all areas: We were tough from the start, we stood together and we got our position in the negotiations.

In addition to developments in Europe, we discussed the Persian Gulf, where Italy has also distinguished itself by coming forward and agreeing to share the responsibility of keeping the international sea lanes free of lethal explosives by sending ships to the area. The continuation of the war between Iran and Iraq poses dangers that extend far beyond the borders of that troubled region. We agreed to continue our strong support in the United Nations Security Council for the efforts of the Secretary General to bring an end to the conflict.

When Prime Minister Gorla and I last saw each other, he was Minister of the Treasury and we were both participants in the Venice Economic Summit. Today, we again talked about the ~~international economic situation~~ ^{international economic situation} ~~importance of the Summit process~~ and of strengthening ~~the~~ international trade and financial arrangements.

Over the next few days Prime Minister Gorla will be meeting with Secretary Shultz, Secretary Baker, Secretary Carlucci, Congressional leaders, and private businessmen, among others. I am happy to report that as he embarks on the remainder of this busy and important visit, U.S.-Italian relations could hardly be better.

Prime Minister, we are indeed pleased and honored to have you as our guest.



Dear Mr. Costa:

I have been asked to respond to your letter of December 8, 1987 to President Reagan requesting the U.S. Government to consider the Township of Assisi as a World Heritage Site and to influence the United Nations to inscribe it on the World Heritage List.

During this holiday season, Francis of Assisi is especially remembered for erecting the first nativity scene for townsfolk to see and recall that Christmas night in Bethlehem. His quest for peace and solidarity have been carried on not only by the people of Assisi but by many others as well. Over the centuries, Assisi has developed a special cultural and spiritual heritage.

The articles of the Convention concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage stipulate that "it is for each State Party.... to identify and delineate.... properties situated on its territory... ." As a State Party to the Convention, Italy is the country that must propose the nomination of Assisi and ensure that measures will be undertaken for its preservation. Should the Italian Government put forth the nomination of Assisi for inscription on the World Heritage List, the United States and other States Parties would certainly give it careful consideration.
