



A simple poster pays tribute to victims of the Holocaust

NORFOLK — Nandor Lazar never has liked to talk much about the years he spent, near-starved and frozen, in Nazi work camps at the Russian front.

A quiet, self-effacing man, he still struggles a little with the English language he began to learn when he fled Hungary for the United States in 1948.

But now Lazar, 72, has chosen another way to express his feelings about the Holocaust that claimed the lives of 6 million of his fellow Jews. After a year of work and dozens of painstaking drafts, he has produced a poster that pays tribute to those who died.

Lazar, who has never taken an art lesson, cherishes high aims for the simple drawing. He hopes that before long the posters will appear on the walls of homes, synagogues, churches and schools around the world.

He sold several dozen of his 3,000 copies at the convention of Holocaust survivors in Washington last week. But it is the rest of the world - especially Christians — that Lazar is trying to reach.


The message, he said, is that "any minority can get in trouble - like in India they kill so many Muslims. The Christian can have it, too, to remember they can get in trouble if they elect the wrong leaders."

Lazar's one-man effort to give the world a symbol of the Holocaust began a year ago with a crude sketch of a tombstone. A rabbi told him it was too depressing, he said, so he replaced the tombstone with a monument and kept

Finally, he was satisfied. The final product, about 17 by 11 inches, shows a gray, stair-stepped monument topped by a triangle and a yellow, six-pointed star like the ones Jews had to wear under the Nazi regime.

The triangle bears a message in white letters: "1933-1945, in memory of 6 million European Jews."

On the top step sit six crudely drawn yellow candles, on the bottom step a single candle. "This is the 6 million Jews - the six candles," Lazar said. "And this candle is for the non-Jews," the 5 million others who died in Nazi camps.

Lazar said he wanted his poster to become a symbol of the Nazi victims, as the cross stands for Christianity.

"They've written so many books," he said. "The historian look at it. Private (citizens) is not going to look."

"Here," he said, pointing to the poster, "a child can see it. 'Mama, what is that?' And they explain it. He wants to know more; he goes to the library and looks for the book."

Lazar, a short, slender man with a gray beard and glasses, figures it was just an accident that he survived the war. "I'm not smart," he said. "I'm not strong."

He agreed to talk about his experiences only because it might draw attention to the memorial. "I don't count," he said. "They died, thousands and thousands. My main purpose is this (poster), to be a symbol."

Born in Somkerek, Hungary, Lazar ran a household goods store in Budapest until the war. In 1941, he was forced to join a work crew of Jews who followed Hungarian and German troops into Russia.

"We done the dirty work" for the soldiers, he said. "We moved always along. I served 20 jobs. One time I worked in a hospital. The sick people came. We had to undress them, wash them, and the clothes they had a lot of lice.'

Another time, he and several others were ordered to move a barbedwire barrier from one place to another in deep snow. "My hands froze," Lazar said. "No gloves, no nothing."

In their weakened condition, they were easy prey for diarrhea and typhus. Only 30 of Lazar's work group of 200 made it through the war, he

And when they died, "we buried them like sardines" in mass graves. "After the war," he said, "everybody look for somebody. They say to me, 'Why you not make a mark where my husband is buried?' I say, 'I bury him today and tomorrow somebody bury me."

His brother, now in Israel, also survived the war, but their parents died in a concentration camp.

In 1949, Lazar came to Norfolk under the sponsorship of local residents. Still a Norfolk resident and a bachelor, Lazar is retired from a grocery clerk's job he held for 25

Like many of those who suffered during the war because they were Jews, Lazar has asked himself often where the God of Abraham was when so many of the chosen people were slaughtered.

I believe in God, but he is sleeping a little," Lazar said with a little cackling laugh. "It looks like it to

"I ask so many times, 'Help,' and no help," he said. "I was more reli-gious before. . . . I don't have explanation. He (God) is helpless.


"But what is religion?" he asked. "It's history. You learn from the past."

And so Lazar hopes his posters will perpetuate the memory of the Jews and others who died at the hands of the Nazis.

If they don't sell, he said, he will give them away. Any profits will go toward the United Jewish Federation of Tidewater.

"I'm not doing it to be rich," he said. "A 72-year-old man, what do he need? I don't have children; I don't have a wife. I live a simple life because when I was in concentration camp I say I need a bed, I need clothes, nothing else."

Dear Ben:

Thank you for sharing with us your views and those of your constituents concerning the President's State Visit to the Federal Republic of Germany. We fully understand the depth of your concerns and assure you the President's feelings about the crimes against humanity perpetrated by the Nazi regime are no less deeply felt. President Reagan has attempted to make absolutely clear during his visit the revulsion all Americans feel for the horrors which were committed in the name of the German state and our determination not to forget them. As you know, his itinerary included a ceremony at Bergen-Belsen concentration camp in order to pay homage to all those who perished at the hands of the Nazis. As he said on the anniversary of the liberation of that camp April 21, there can and should be no absolution.

President Reagan is certain you agree that, as part of our efforts to learn from the experiences of this dark era, we must not reject opportunities for reconciliation. The President was asked by Chancellor Kohl to pay a visit to a German military cemetery in Bitburg, and he has honored that request.

For four decades, the Federal Republic of Germany has faced up to the guilt and responsibilities of its Nazi past and has, in countless ways, demonstrated concretely its commitment to democratic ideals and human rights, including standing shoulder to shoulder with us in the Alliance in defense of freedom. With particular regard to the younger generation in Germany, it is important to demonstrate that, while we continue to hold the nation responsible for its past, we do not consider them to bear individual responsibility for the crimes of Nazism.

Let me make clear that the President does not consider his appearance at Bitburg to represent an act of forgiveness for those crimes, but rather one of acknowledgment of the democratic society the German people have built. He considers this to be a positive gesture which in no way detracts from his full and heartfelt commitment to remember and honor the victims of the Holocaust and the American soldiers who gave their lives to defeat the Nazi regime and its crimes.

DEAR MR. PRESIDENT:

IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT YOU RECONSIDER YOUR COMMENTS ABOUT WHY YOU ARE CHOOSING NOT TO VISIT DACHAU CONCENTRATION CAMPWHEN YOU COMMEMORATE V-£ DAY IN MAY OF THIS YEAR. I AM CERTAIN THAT YOU ARE UNAWARE OF THE INACCURACIES AS WELL AS THE IMPLICATIONS. PLEASE ALLOW ME TO EXPLAIN.

YOU SAID THAT YOU PREFER NOT "...REAWAKENING MEMORIES AND SO FORTH... AS A SOCIAL STUDIES TEACHER, I HAVE SPENT 16 YEARS OF MY LIFE TEACHING MY STUDENTS ABOUT EVENTS FOR WHICH THEY COULD NOT POSSIBLY HAVE ANY MEMORY **PRECISELY** FOR THE REASON YOU CLAIM IT UNNECESSARY - BECAUSE PEOPLE FORGET. WE MUST NEVER FORGET THE DEPTHS OF DEPRAVITY THAT PEOPLE CAN SINK TO IF BIGOTRY AND ANTI-SEMITISM ARE ALLOWED TO GO UNCHECKED. HEIGHTS OF ACCOMPLISHMENT AND DEPTHS OF DEPRAVITY-THIS IS THE CORE OF HUMAN BEHAVIOR AND HISTORY. EMPHASIZE ONE AND IGNORE THE OTHER IS INACCURATE HISTORY. I CANNOT IMAGINE A CEREMONY COMMEMORATING THE CIVIL WAR IN OUR OWN COUNTRY AND NOT MENTIONING SLAVERY! THE PURPOSE OF POINTING OUT THE NEGATIVE EXPERIENCE IS NOT TO ENCOURAGE BITTER FEELINGS, BUT TO USE IT PUBLICLY TO MAKE THE STATEMENT THAT WE WILL NOT TOLERATE INJUSTICE ANYWHERE. SURELY, COULD HAVE USED THE CONTRAST TO FURTHER DEMOCRATIC AIMS.

It is very hard to let the events of the last week pass without expressing my deep concern. Your sense of history seems to be inaccurate, and more disappointing, your decision is ill-advised.



On the 40th anniversary of the end of the war in Europe, the world refuses to forget

ll this sound and fury must seem terribly mysterious to Ronald Reagana national uproar over visits to a German cemetery. Are we not the future-facing republic? Is it not right to celebrate V-E day with a show of American magnanimity? The nation's response has been a loud and firm no, but it is a no that derives from history, not from meanness of spirit.

The nightmare of World War II is simply not to be smiled away, first because the war touched everywhere, not just the Western Front, but Piccadilly and the Champs Elysées and Stalingrad. Second, because it was both a war and a crime-6 million Jews and perhaps 4.5 million others exterminated. What Reagan may not understand is that cemeteries house visible ghosts. At Bitburg, the SS troops still rant and hunt. At Bergen-Belsen the children still weep.

On May 8 of this year, all such ghosts reappear, along with the happier memories of relief and victory. Forty years ago, Europe emerged from six years in a dark and terrifying room into sudden light. There were the cheering citizens tossing hats in the air, and there were the dead in piles and ditches. There was also the promise of a peaceful future that would soon show Europe to be neither dead nor wholly revived. No more grandly expanding empires. No more nationalistic war whoops—the egotism and sentimentality of 19th century European romanticism having found its deadly end in the Nazis and the Fascists. Victory in Europe may be said to have lasted one day. Andy Rooney, then a staff writer for Stars and Stripes, wrote of U.S. and Soviet troops meeting and embracing at the Elbe: "You get the feeling of exuberance, a great new world opening up."

So how should one celebrate V-E day 40 years later, with the Europe that was set free now cut in half, and much of the great new world closed tight? One sees little hugging at the Elbe these days. Only a few weeks ago, a Soviet soldier in East Germany shot and killed a U.S. military officer for trespassing. Perhaps V-E day requires a more sober and moderate reaction than celebration. There are things simply to consider: the selfless heroism of the millions who fought to prevent Hitler's onslaught; the cooperation of proud powers in a right and necessary cause. As a practical lesson, one must also consider how quickly and easily the world allowed a madman to seize it by the throat.

Then too, there is Europe to consider. Finally, after centuries, a purely European war is unthinkable, but the peace has difficulties. Rough times for Europe in 1985: high unemployment, signs of racism, terrorism, ennui. So far all the dreams of a unified Continent have resulted in a relatively successful economic

alliance but not a political entity.

There are subtler problems: How does the Continent retain the glory of its history and avoid functioning merely as America's antique shop? How should Europe and the U.S. deal with each other? "Can we never extract this tapeworm of Europe from the brain of our countrymen?" asked Ralph Waldo Emerson in 1860. World War II performed the extraction. The U.S., a child of Europe, became an uncomfortable parent, uncomfortable in part because it is


Still, there is something to consider that has only a tangential connection with geopolitical repositionings but has a direct relationship to Reagan's unfortunate blunders of the past few weeks. Whatever the victory in Europe represented, it was centrally the triumph over pitiless evil. A British journalist who witnessed the liberation of Bergen-Belsen wrote in his dispatch: "It is my duty to describe something beyond the imagination of mankind." But the death camps were not beyond the imagination of people; they were the inventions of people. That is what the world refuses to forget. -By Roger Rosenblatt BNBh.

What the SS Was All About

Time that works to heal wounds can also weaken memories that deserve to be kept strong. President Reagan, who should know better, has suggested that the SS graves in the West German military cemetery that he plans to visit next month are those of very young men, children almost, impressed into service in the last months of the war and free from any association with the crimes of the Nazi era. The President has even suggested that those buried at the Bitburg cemetery, like those who died in the concentration camps during the Nazi period, are equally victims of Hitlerism. To believe this is utterly to miss the point of what the SS was all about and what the controversy over Bitburg involves.

Who is buried at Bitburg is unimportant. It is the SS insignia on certain graves there that are of paramount significance, and it is these that make a presidential pilgrimage to the site inconceivable. The world knows nothing of the SS men buried at Bitburg. It knows more than can ever be comprehended about what the SS stood for and what crimes it committed. The SS graves at Bitburg are the stark symbol of the horror that descended on Europe when it fell under Nazi domination. The SS, in its several roles, embodied the unspeakable evil of that era.

The SS ran the concentration and extermination camps, as everyone knows. It was responsible for mass murder, organized and carried out on a scale

unique in history. Jews were the primary though by no means the exclusive victims of the SS. While 6 million Jews perished at the hands of the Nazis, millions of non-Jews were also deliberately killed along with them. Not all died in the camps. The grisly work of the SS was conducted in the field as well.

By the end of the war the military arm of the SS—the Waffen SS—totaled 39 divisions. These were Hitler's elite, carefully selected for their loyalty, their fanaticism, their brutality. Where they went terrorism and atrocities followed—in Poland, in Czechoslovakia, in France, in Russia, in Belgium. It was an SS officer who gave the order near Malmedy in Belgium to slaughter U.S. prisoners of war—"Machen alle kaput." It was SS men who obeyed that order and murdered more than 200 Americans.

The controversy over Reagan's planned visit to Bitburg and the homage that he will pay there is hardly only a "Jewish" issue. Neither does it touch only the victims of Nazism and those who fought the war against it. It is above all a moral issue, posing a choice between respect for the enormous tragedy of the near past and the satisfaction of transient political interest. For the President to go to Bitburg would be not just inappropriate but also wrong. For the President to pay his respects near SS gravesites would be not just a blunder but also an insult to humane values.

It is especially incongruous that you should choose to visit a cemetary when in fact we cannot visit the cemetaries of our grandparents, aunts, uncles, cousins and young brothers and sisters who were robbed of the chance to grow into adulthood. Their cemetaries are the crematoria, ditches, fields and places that are known only to the Eternal. We cannot honor their memory by visiting their gravesites for they have none.

We implore you, Mr. President, to consider the pain that we bear for our slain relatives who have no final resting place and who shall therefore know no eternal peace.

Your goal of emphasizing harmonious relations between the governments of the United States and West Germany is to be lauded. Yet there are ways of demonstrating that commitment without inflicting pain on the memories of those who can no longer speak and without causing pain for those of us who must do so on their behalf.

Mr. President, you are a man of conscience. Please search deeply into yours. A decision not to visit the Bitburg cemetary is the only right and honorable one.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing you on behalf of Mr. Ignatius Billinsky and the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America regarding your upcoming visit to Bitburg.

It is the sense of the Ukrainian Congress Committee of America that this and future generations of Germans should not be held responsible, in perpetuity, for the actions of a renegade few.

We must recognize Germany's progress since World War II and the fact that Germany is our strongest ally and mainstay in NATO.

We feel that the need to remember the tragedy of the Holocaust can be fully met by your concurrent visit to Bitburg. Furthermore, West German Chancellor Helmut Kohl and his government have taken appropriate steps to memorialize the tragedy as a nation to ensure that such an abhoration does not recur.

Ukrainians and other national and ethnic groups were victims of the Nazis, but as Americans we feel it is vital for the United States to strengthen its ties with Germany. We therefore support your visit to the Bitburg cemetary as a symbol of mutual respect between the people of the United States and Germany.
