MEETING WITH IRAQI DEPUTY PRIME MINISTER

TARIQ AZIZ

DATE: November 26, 1984

I. PURPOSE

To agree to resume diplomatic relations and to discuss regional stability in the Gulf and Middle East.

II. BACKGROUND

In recent years, the Government of Iraq has moved away from radical, anti-Western domestic and foreign policies in order to strengthen its defense capabilities in the face of Iran's continuation of the Gulf war. Iraq's pragmatism was induced by the fact that its supporters in the Arab world (Jordan, Egypt, Saudi Arabia) are friendly with the U.S., and, at the outset of the war, the Soviet Union stopped weapons deliveries in order to curry favor with Iran. Against this backdrop, U.S. diplomatic efforts to stop the arms flow to Iran significantly reduced Iraqi suspicions of the U.S. attitude toward the war, while encouraging the development of a low-key but important diplomatic dialogue on the Arab-Israeli conflict, chemical weapons, and human rights. Baghdad thus concluded that the time is ripe, after a 17 year hiatus, to resume normal relations.

Sensitive to the appearance of superpower infringement on its independence (and desire for the "leading role" in the Gulf), it is important for Tariq Aziz to hear you reiterate the principles of "equality, mutual respect and reciprocity" as the basis of our diplomatic relations. While primarily

symbolic, the resumption of relations should also lead to broader commercial, cultural and educational ties. Iraq may have the world's second largest petroleum reserves, and will need large amounts of foreign investment to rebuild when the war ends. We therefore expect Baghdad increasingly to look to the U.S. Politically, this step will help counter the charge that our regional influence is declining while Moscow's increases. This is particularly significant in light of increased U.S.-Israeli strategic cooperation and Iraq's past leadership of the rejectionist anti-Israel Arab radicals.

The second topic for discussion, regional stability, represents the most important interest that we share with Baghdad. As the chief barrier to the spread of Iranian-supported Islamic fundamentalism, Iraq is promoting regional stability in the course of securing its own defense. Within the regional context, Iraq hopes a stable and peaceful Iran, independent of Soviet domination, will emerge. We share this goal, but remain wary of Iraq's ambitions in the Gulf (Baghdad is feared by all the Gulf Arabs), as well as the dangers of Soviet intervention in response to ill-conceived Iraqi military operations against Iran. Aziz will respond positively to assurances that U.S. interests would best be served by the earliest end to the war that will leave both countries independent and territorially intact. However, Aziz should also understand that our ability to provide diplomatic support is predicated on Iraq's active cooperation with diplomatic efforts to end the war.

Finally, you should reiterate the U.S. commitment to your September 1 peace initiative. While we should be under no illusions about the prospects for outright Iraqi support of the peace process or a rapprochement with Israel, U.S.-Iraqi normalization should help strengthen the emerging Amman-Cairo-Baghdad alignment, reinforcing Jordan's security against Syrian and radical Palestinian threats. (The Iraqis have moderated their policy so that they will now support whatever is acceptable to the Palestinians vis-a-vis a settlement with Israel.) This alignment essentially reflects President Saddam Hussein's bitter hatred for Syrian President Hafez al-Assad, who remains allied with the Iranians. Iraq is considering resuming normal relations with Egypt without requiring Egypt to abrogate the Peace Treaty with Israel or the Camp David Accords. It would therefore be useful to hear Aziz' views on the emergence of practical cooperation with Jordan and Egypt, and to encourage Baghdad to resume relations with Egypt in the interest of regional stability.

In conclusion, your meeting with Tariq Aziz and the resumption of relations is a historic event that should further strengthen our friends and possibly contribute to evolving opportunities for the peace process. Although this step comes at Iraqi initiative, I believe we will be criticized in some quarters for dealing with a ruthless regime that uses brutal methods against its own people and adversaries (e.g. chemical weapons). Nonetheless, we have carefully laid the groundwork for this development and are convinced that the increased influence (bilateral and regional) that will accrue from normal relations clearly outweighs the potential disadvantages. Your talking points are at Tab A. A memo from Secretary Shultz is at Tab B.

I. THE SETTING:

After Aziz had accepted an invitation from the Vice President for a White House visit in October, Iraq decided to re-establish diplomatic relations with the U.S. and requested Aziz' visit with you to give prominence to the event. Iraq's decision to resume relations reflects the regime's confidence in its internal stability and war situation, its desire to balance relations with the USSR, its interest in further opening toward the West, and its assumption of a more active international diplomatic posture. It seeks to reinforce U.S. diplomatic support for the earliest end to the Iran-Iraq War.

Since Iraq broke diplomatic relations with us during the 1967 Arab-Israeli war, we have made clear our readiness to resume relations when Iraq elected to do so. You reiterated this point in your letter to Iraqi President Saddam Hussein delivered by Don Rumsfeld last December.

Aziz' main message is that Iraq can be a force for regional stability, and as such, shares a major national interest with the United States. This is an intriguing prospect: Iraq indeed is serving as the principal barrier to the expansion of Khomeinism across the Persian Gulf. Moreover, the lack of full Arab support for Iraq in its own "Arab cause" has led Iraq to withdraw support for hard-line positions in the Arab-Israeli conflict. Our vigorous diplomacy with Iraq, supported by third countries, and Iraq's wartime need for international support, have also led it to expel or suppress terrorist groups it had supported. Nonetheless, we should not accept uncritically Iraqi claims to be a factor promoting regional stability.

Normalization offers us important opportunities. It will help counter the charge that the Soviets are making inroads in the region at our expense, although Iraq has been careful not to allow its decision to be interpreted as a "tilt" toward the U.S. It will help strengthen an emerging Amman-Baghdad-Cairo alignment, further boosting Jordan's security against the Syrian and radical Palestinian threats it will face if it moves toward negotiations with Israel. Diplomatic relations will

expand our contacts with an influential Gulf country that shares our antipathy for the spread of radical Islamic violence and that claims to share our interest in regional stability. It will give U.S. exporters a better footing in the highly competitive market of a country which may possess the free world's second largest oil reserves.

Aziz' visit will focus public attention on the normalization. He will be interviewed on the Voice of America and several nationwide news shows. He will meet with key members of Congress of both parties, including leading supporters of Israel, several of whom have actively supported the development of U.S.-Iraqi relations over the past several years.

We should make clear that the significance of resumption of U.S.-Iraqi relations is largely symbolic; it recognizes the de facto normalization of U.S.-Iraqi relations that has taken place over the past several years. On the positive side, we should make clear that this success for U.S. policy in the Middle East stands to further the interests of regional stability and to reinforce U.S. influence in the area. However, we will want to avoid having the visit and normalization construed as: 1) inimical to our relations with Israel; 2) hostile toward Iran; 3) condoning Iraq's repugnant human rights practices; 4) implying any fundamental change in our relationship, e.g. toward military cooperation.

II. THE ISSUES:

Diplomatic relations: As Middle Easterners, Iraqis are particularly prone to read great political significance into the atmospherics of personal contacts. Your personal touch will therefore strongly shape the future of our relations. Iraq emphasizes its desire for relations based on "equality and mutual respect." We should stress our commitment to these principles, and our own interest in reciprocity in all areas.

Regional Stability: Iraq accepts our neutrality in the war, and claims that it, too, wants Iran to survive the war as a peaceful neighbor free of Soviet domination. We want to reinforce Iraq's openness to mediation efforts, urging it to avoid steps, such as resuming attacks on cities or reciprocating Iranian mistreatment of Iraqi POWs, that will exacerbate Iranian hostility. We welcome Iraq's efforts to reinstate Egypt's moderating influence in Arab councils, and should encourage it to follow Jordan in resuming relations with Egypt at the earliest propitious moment. We should state our welcome for further Iraqi support for Jordan against security threats it will face if it works out an arrangement with the Palestinians to negotiate with Israel. We should encourage Iraq to re-emphasize President Saddam Hussein's statement to Congressman Solarz in 1982 that a "secure condition is necessary for both Israel and the Palestinians."

JOINT STATEMENT ON RESUMPTION OF RELATIONS

The Governments of the United States and of Iraq have agreed to resume diplomatic relations, effective today, November 26, 1984. This agreement has concluded today between President Reagan and Deputy Prime Minister and Foreign Minister of Iraq, His Excellency Tariq M. Aziz. The two countries Diplomatic Missions are upgraded as of this date from interests sections to Embassies, and their principal officers will hold the title of Charge d'Affaires, pending the appointment of Ambassadors. Ambassadors will be appointed as promptly as possible under the nomination processes required within and between both countries.

TALKING POINTS FOR THE PRESIDENT'S MEETING WITH
IRAQI DEPUTY PRIME MINISTER TARIQ AZIZ,
THE OVAL OFFICE, MONDAY, NOVEMBER 26, 11:30 a.m. - 12:00 p.m.

DIPLOMATIC RELATIONS

- I am very pleased that you are here, and very interested in your thoughts on our relations.

- We welcome resumption of normal relations.

- Your visit and U.S.-Iraqi normalization are important as symbolic recognition that we can cooperate in promoting our mutual interest in regional stability.

- We base our relations on equality, mutual respect and reciprocity in all areas.

- I hope our commercial, cultural and educational ties will be strengthened.

IRAN-IRAQ WAR

- Turning to your war with Iran, the U.S. is interested in the earliest peaceful settlement that preserves the independence and territorial integrity of both countries.

- We will continue to pursue all possible approaches that will convince Iran to accept a peaceful settlement of the conflict.

- I also want to urge your government to avoid actions against Iran which could lead to an expansion of the war.

ARAB-ISRAELI ISSUES

- I remain firmly committed to my initiative of September 1, 1982. However, it is essential for the parties to negotiate directly in order to achieve a lasting solution.

- I recognize that we disagree over various aspects of this problem.

- However, we would appreciate your efforts to help improve the regional environment for a negotiated settlement.

- Your continued support of King Hussein is very important.

- I encourage Iraq to find an early opportunity to resume diplomatic relations with Egypt.



THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE ADVISES THAT DUE TO THE CONTINUING HOSTILITIES BETWEEN IRAN AND IRAQ TRAVEL IS NOT RECOMMENDED TO CERTAIN AREAS OF NORTHERN IRAQ AND THE AREAS BORDERING IRAN. HOWEVER, THIS DOES NOT PRECLUDE TRAVEL TO BAGHDAD AND MOST OTHER AREAS OF IRAQ. ALL U.S. CITIZENS ARE STRONGLY URGED TO REGISTER WITH THE U.S. EMBASSY AFTER THEIR ARRIVAL IN IRAQ. THE EMBASSY IS LOCATED ACROSS FROM THE FOREIGN MINISTRY CLUB IN THE MASBAH QUARTER OF BAGHDAD. THE TELEPHONE NUMBERS ARE 719-6138 and 719-6139. THE TELEX NUMBER IS 212287 USINT IK. AN ALTERNATE TELEX IS THE COMMERCIAL SECTION TELEX, NUMBER 213966 USFCS IK.

WITH FEW EXCEPTIONS, ALL VISITORS TO IRAQ MUST BE SPONSORED. POTENTIAL TRAVELERS FROM THE U.S. SHOULD APPLY FOR THEIR VISAS AT THE IRAQI EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON, D.C. SOME BUSINESS TRAVELERS HAVE OBTAINED VISAS AT IRAQI EMBASSIES IN ROUTE TO IRAQ. HOWEVER, THIS MUST BE ARRANGED WELL IN ADVANCE TO AVOID DELAYS. THERE ARE NO PROVISIONS FOR AIRPORT VISAS.

PERSONS WHO REMAIN IN IRAQ LONGER THAN FIFTEEN DAYS MUST REGISTER WITH A LOCAL OFFICE OF THE RESIDENCE DEPARTMENT. IN MOST CASES, SUCH INDIVIDUALS REQUIRE AN EXIT VISA TO DEPART. EXIT VISAS MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE RESIDENCE DEPARTMENT. ANYONE WORKING UNDER CONTRACT TO THE IRAQI GOVERNMENT OR FOR A COMPANY UNDER GOVERNMENT CONTRACT NEEDS PERMISSION FROM THE GOVERNMENT OFFICE ADMINISTERING THE CONTRACT TO OBTAIN AN EXIT VISA. SUCH PERMISSION MAY BE WITHHELD IF THE GOVERNMENT OFFICE IS NOT SATISFIED THAT THE TERMS OF THE CONTRACT HAVE BEEN MET OR IF A PERSON HAS VIOLATED AN IRAQI LAW OR REGULATION.

AT THE PRESENT TIME MOST CITIZENS OF IRAQ ARE PROHIBITED FROM TRAVELING OUTSIDE THE COUNTRY. THIS RESTRICTION APPLIES TO THOSE WHO HAVE ESTABLISHED RESIDENCES IN THIRD COUNTRIES SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THE IRAN/IRAQ WAR. THEREFORE, IRAQIS WHO HAVE BECOME LEGAL PERMANENT RESIDENTS OF THE U.S. ("GREEN CARD" HOLDERS) SINCE SEPTEMBER OF 1980 ARE ADVISED NOT TO UNDERTAKE TEMPORARY TRAVEL TO IRAQ. THOSE WHO DO MAY NOT BE PERMITTED TO DEPART IRAQ, NOTWITHSTANDING THEIR U.S. RESIDENCY.

INDIVIDUALS MAY BRING UP TO TWENTY FIVE IRAQI DINARS INTO THE COUNTRY; ONLY FIVE DINARS MAY BE EXPORTED. THERE IS NO LIMIT ON THE AMOUNT OF FOREIGN CURRENCY WHICH MAY BE IMPORTED, BUT IT MUST BE DECLARED AT THE TIME OF ENTRY. THOSE HOLDING CASH WHICH THEY MAY LATER WISH TO CARRY OUT OF THE COUNTRY SHOULD INSIST ON A CURRENCY DECLARATION RECEIPT UPON ARRIVAL AT THE AIRPORT. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY LEAD TO CONFISCATION OR CONVERSION TO IRAQI DINARS AT THE TIME OF DEPARTURE. IT IS SOMETIMES DIFFICULT TO DECLARED CURRENCY, ESPECIALLY ON VERY LATE-ARRIVING FLIGHTS. THUS, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT PERSONS COMING TO IRAQ CARRY TRAVELER'S CHECKS RATHER THAN LARGE AMOUNTS OF CASH, SINCE IT CAN BE SHOWN THAT THE CHECKS WERE PURCHASED OUTSIDE OF IRAQ. FOREIGNERS MAY BRING INTO IRAQ UP TO 250 GRAMS OF WORKED GOLD, WHICH MUST BE DECLARED UPON ENTRY. THEY MAY NOT BRING IN UNWORKED GOLD. GOLD ACQUIRED LOCALLY MAY NOT BE EXPORTED.

MAJOR HOTELS IN IRAQ REQUIRE THAT HOTEL BILLS FOR FOREIGNERS BE PAID IN HARD CURRENCY. CREDIT CARDS ARE NOT WIDELY ACCEPTED WITHIN THE COUNTRY. HOWEVER, SOME MAJOR HOTELS DO ACCEPT AMERICAN EXPRESS CREDIT CARDS FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS. ALSO, SOME FOREIGN AIRLINES WILL ACCEPT AMERICAN EXPRESS CARDS FOR PAYMENT OF AIR TICKETS.

PERSONS PURCHASING AIR TICKETS THROUGH IRAQI AIRWAYS SHOULD BE AWARE THAT THE COMPANY HAS BEEN RELUCTANT TO ENDORSE ITS TICKETS OVER TO OTHER INTERNATIONAL CARRIERS. AIR TICKETS ISSUED BY TWA ARE NOT ACCEPTED BY IRAQI AIRLINES. IN ADDITION, TRAVELERS HAVE REPORTED THAT LUGGAGE TAGGED WITH TWA TICKETS WILL NOT BE FORWARDED BY IRAQI AIRWAYS. TRAVELRS ON IRAQI AIRWAYS ARE ADVISED THAT STRINGENT SECURITY MEASURES FORBID PASSENGERS TO CARRY ON HAND LUGGAGE, INCLUDING BRIEFCASES AND CAMERAS. IN SOME CASES, ITEMS WHICH HAVE BEEN PASSED BY CHECK-IN COUNTER AND AIRPORT SECURITY PERSONNEL HAVE LATER BEEN TAKEN AWAY BY AIRCRAFT SECURITY TO BE STORED WITHOUT RECEIPT. IT IS THEREFORE RECOMMENDED THAT ALL ITEMS BE PACKED AND CHECKED WITH NORMAL BAGGAGE.

TRAVELERS SHOULD BE PREPARED FOR INCONVENIENCES. FOR EXAMPLE, AIRLINE SCHEDULES MAY CHANGE WITHOUT NOTICE, AND INTERNATIONAL TELEPHONE DIRECT DIALING AND TELEX SERVICE MAY BE UNAVAILABLE OR IRREGULAR.





Thank you for your letter of December 24, 1986 and for your expression of support.

I understand and sympathize with your concerns regarding your son's welfare in Iraq. Because of the ongoing conflict between Iran and Iraq, the State Department's current travel advisory for Iraq recommends against travel to certain areas of northern Iraq and the areas bordering Iran, but notes that that does not preclude travel to Baghdad and most other areas of Iraq. Our Embassy in Baghdad stands ready to assist all American citizens, ~~[in the event such assistance should become necessary]~~ and I trust that your son has registered with the Consul at the American Embassy.

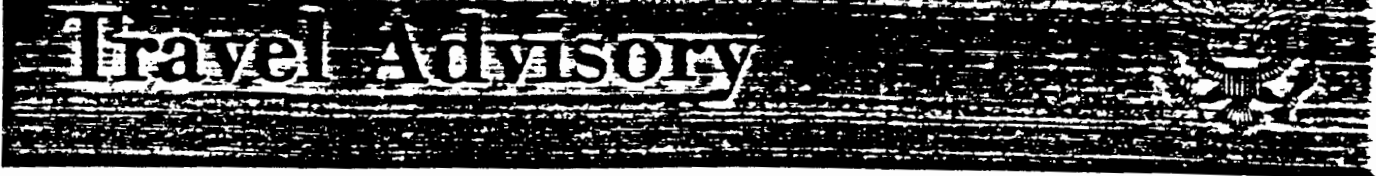

TRAVEL TO IRAQ

THE DEPARTMENT OF STATE ADVISES THAT DUE TO THE CONTINUING HOSTILITIES BETWEEN IRAN AND IRAQ TRAVEL IS NOT RECOMMENDED TO CERTAIN AREAS OF NORTHERN IRAQ AND THE AREAS BORDERING IRAN. HOWEVER, THIS DOES NOT PRECLUDE TRAVEL TO BAGHDAD AND MOST OTHER AREAS OF IRAQ. ALL U.S. CITIZENS ARE STRONGLY URGED TO REGISTER WITH THE U.S. EMBASSY AFTER THEIR ARRIVAL IN IRAQ. THE EMBASSY IS LOCATED ACROSS FROM THE FOREIGN MINISTRY CLUB IN THE MASBAH QUARTER OF BAGHDAD. THE TELEPHONE NUMBERS ARE 719-6138 and 719-6139. THE TELEX NUMBER IS 212287 USINT IK. AN ALTERNATE TELEX IS THE COMMERCIAL SECTION TELEX, NUMBER 213966 USFCS IK.

WITH FEW EXCEPTIONS, ALL VISITORS TO IRAQ MUST BE SPONSORED. POTENTIAL TRAVELERS FROM THE U.S. SHOULD APPLY FOR THEIR VISAS AT THE IRAQI EMBASSY IN WASHINGTON, D.C. SOME BUSINESS TRAVELERS HAVE OBTAINED VISAS AT IRAQI EMBASSIES IN ROUTE TO IRAQ. HOWEVER, THIS MUST BE ARRANGED WELL IN ADVANCE TO AVOID DELAYS. THERE ARE NO PROVISIONS FOR AIRPORT VISAS.

PERSONS WHO REMAIN IN IRAQ LONGER THAN FIFTEEN DAYS MUST REGISTER WITH A LOCAL OFFICE OF THE RESIDENCE DEPARTMENT. IN MOST CASES, SUCH INDIVIDUALS REQUIRE AN EXIT VISA TO DEPART. EXIT VISAS MAY BE OBTAINED FROM THE RESIDENCE DEPARTMENT. ANYONE WORKING UNDER CONTRACT TO THE IRAQI GOVERNMENT OR FOR A COMPANY UNDER GOVERNMENT CONTRACT NEEDS PERMISSION FROM THE GOVERNMENT OFFICE ADMINISTERING THE CONTRACT TO OBTAIN AN EXIT VISA. SUCH PERMISSION MAY BE WITHHELD IF THE GOVERNMENT OFFICE IS NOT SATISFIED THAT THE TERMS OF THE CONTRACT HAVE BEEN MET OR IF A PERSON HAS VIOLATED AN IRAQI LAW OR REGULATION.

AT THE PRESENT TIME MOST CITIZENS OF IRAQ ARE PROHIBITED FROM TRAVELING OUTSIDE THE COUNTRY. THIS RESTRICTION APPLIES TO THOSE WHO HAVE ESTABLISHED RESIDENCES IN THIRD COUNTRIES SINCE THE BEGINNING OF THE IRAN/IRAQ WAR. THEREFORE, IRAQIS WHO HAVE BECOME LEGAL PERMANENT RESIDENTS OF THE U.S. ("GREEN CARD" HOLDERS) SINCE SEPTEMBER OF 1980 ARE ADVISED NOT TO UNDERTAKE TEMPORARY TRAVEL TO IRAQ. THOSE WHO DO MAY NOT BE PERMITTED TO DEPART IRAQ, NOTWITHSTANDING THEIR U.S. RESIDENCY.

INDIVIDUALS MAY BRING UP TO TWENTY FIVE IRAQI DINARS INTO THE COUNTRY; ONLY FIVE DINARS MAY BE EXPORTED. THERE IS NO LIMIT ON THE AMOUNT OF FOREIGN CURRENCY WHICH MAY BE IMPORTED, BUT IT MUST BE DECLARED AT THE TIME OF ENTRY. THOSE HOLDING CASH WHICH THEY MAY LATER WISH TO CARRY OUT OF THE COUNTRY SHOULD INSIST ON A CURRENCY DECLARATION RECEIPT UPON ARRIVAL AT THE AIRPORT. FAILURE TO DO SO MAY LEAD TO CONFISCATION OR CONVERSION TO IRAQI DINARS AT THE TIME OF DEPARTURE. IT IS SOMETIMES DIFFICULT TO DECLARED CURRENCY, ESPECIALLY ON VERY LATE-ARRIVING FLIGHTS. THUS, IT IS RECOMMENDED THAT PERSONS COMING TO IRAQ CARRY TRAVELER'S CHECKS RATHER THAN LARGE AMOUNTS OF CASH, SINCE IT CAN BE SHOWN THAT THE CHECKS WERE PURCHASED OUTSIDE OF IRAQ. FOREIGNERS MAY BRING INTO IRAQ UP TO 250 GRAMS OF WORKED GOLD, WHICH MUST BE DECLARED UPON ENTRY. THEY MAY NOT BRING IN UNWORKED GOLD. GOLD ACQUIRED LOCALLY MAY NOT BE EXPORTED.

MAJOR HOTELS IN IRAQ REQUIRE THAT HOTEL BILLS FOR FOREIGNERS BE PAID IN HARD CURRENCY. CREDIT CARDS ARE NOT WIDELY ACCEPTED WITHIN THE COUNTRY. HOWEVER, SOME MAJOR HOTELS DO ACCEPT AMERICAN EXPRESS CREDIT CARDS FOR PAYMENT OF BILLS. ALSO, SOME FOREIGN AIRLINES WILL ACCEPT AMERICAN EXPRESS CARDS FOR PAYMENT OF AIR TICKETS.

PERSONS PURCHASING AIR TICKETS THROUGH IRAQI AIRWAYS SHOULD BE AWARE THAT THE COMPANY HAS BEEN RELUCTANT TO ENDORSE ITS TICKETS OVER TO OTHER INTERNATIONAL CARRIERS. AIR TICKETS ISSUED BY TWA ARE NOT ACCEPTED BY IRAQI AIRLINES. IN ADDITION, TRAVELERS HAVE REPORTED THAT LUGGAGE TAGGED WITH TWA TICKETS WILL NOT BE FORWARDED BY IRAQI AIRWAYS. TRAVELRS ON IRAQI AIRWAYS ARE ADVISED THAT STRINGENT SECURITY MEASURES FORBID PASSENGERS TO CARRY ON HAND LUGGAGE, INCLUDING BRIEFCASES AND CAMERAS. IN SOME CASES, ITEMS WHICH HAVE BEEN PASSED BY CHECK-IN COUNTER AND AIRPORT SECURITY PERSONNEL HAVE LATER BEEN TAKEN AWAY BY AIRCRAFT SECURITY TO BE STORED WITHOUT RECEIPT. IT IS THEREFORE RECOMMENDED THAT ALL ITEMS BE PACKED AND CHECKED WITH NORMAL BAGGAGE.

TRAVELERS SHOULD BE PREPARED FOR INCONVENIENCES. FOR EXAMPLE, AIRLINE SCHEDULES MAY CHANGE WITHOUT NOTICE, AND INTERNATIONAL TELEPHONE DIRECT DIALING AND TELEX SERVICE MAY BE UNAVAILABLE OR IRREGULAR.




Dear President Reagan;

To sign a reply to a letter from Mr. Jerry Clinkscales (Tab B).

Facts

Mr. Clinkscales has written to inquire about conditions in Iraq, where his son is currently employed. He is concerned that recent events may have seriously damaged U.S.-Iraqi relations, creating dangers for Americans living in Iraq. Mr. Clinkscales also expresses continued support for you and your policies.

Discussion

The attached response (Tab A) notes the dangers of travelling anywhere near the Iran-Iraq battlefront, emphasizes the readiness of the American Embassy in Baghdad to assist U.S. citizens, and informs Mr. Clinkscales that you have asked the State Department to follow-up on your letter and answer any specific questions that he might have.





Thank you for your letter of December 24, 1986 and for your expression of support.

I understand and sympathize with your concerns regarding your son's welfare in Iraq. Because of the ongoing conflict between Iran and Iraq, the State Department's current travel advisory for Iraq recommends against travel to certain areas of northern Iraq and the areas bordering Iran, but notes that that does not preclude travel to Baghdad and most other areas of Iraq. Our Embassy in Baghdad stands ready to assist all American citizens, and I trust that your son has registered with the Consul at the American Embassy.

I have asked the State Department to contact you to provide more details on the situation in Iraq and to answer any questions you might have.




