Dear Tom:

The recent state visits by Prime Minister Suzuki of Japan and Chancellor Schmidt of West Germany graphically illustrated the improvements the White House and the Protocol office have made in formal arrival ceremonies.

As a matter of expediency and efficiency, the White House directly contracted and absorbed costs for various improvements that are rightfully the responsibility of the Department of State.

Enclosed is a breakdown of the costs that the White House incurred for Mr. Suzuki's and Chancellor Schmidt's arrival ceremonies on May 7 and May 21 respectively. These costs were generated from two sources: the General Services Administration and Copelands, the Mount Vernon Flagmakers. I have enclosed the two Copelands bills, amounting to \$11,980.68, which I trust the State Department will pay directly. The remaining expenditures, which amount to \$19,146.00, the General Services Administration has already charged to the White House. We expect to be reimbursed for these costs.

I have also enclosed a breakdown of estimate costs for future arrival ceremonies. These, of course, should be paid by the Department of State. We will need to sit down in the very near future and discuss what procedures you would like to establish for future accounting and billing.

I think it might be advisable that you discuss this letter with Mr. Richard T. Kennedy, the Under Secretary of State for Management. He will be able to give you the proper guidance on how these payments and reimbursements should be handled.

I sincerely appreciate your cooperation in this matter.

SUBJECT:

Foreign Missions Act

You asked for background on the Foreign Missions Act, to follow up on Bill Stearman's timely memorandum of Wednesday.

For a number of years, State has been working with Congress to redress a serious and growing imbalance between the treatment accorded to U.S. missions overseas and that made available to foreign government missions in the United States.

This imbalance has two adverse effects. First, foreign governments have greatly overcharged U.S. missions abroad for housing and facilities similar to those that they receive here at market rates. Second, foreign governments, particularly those in the Soviet bloc, have a considerably easier time getting choice locations here in Washington than do our missions abroad. Of course, to the Soviets and their client states, a choice location is one with significant intelligence—gathering possibilities.

The Foreign Missions Act was added to the FY 82 State Authorization in the House, and it cleared the Foreign Affairs Committee without problem. A key provision makes location decisions the responsibility of the National Capital Planning Commission, an Executive Branch agency that has considerable D.C. government representation. At hearings yesterday before Congressman Dellums' District affairs committee, D.C. representatives stated that the location of embassies was a local issue, since embassies were no different than other commercial establishments. State Department representatives argued that this issue has important federal government ramifications, although the D.C. government should also have a say.

The prognosis for passage in the full House is good, although there will be continuing criticism from the D.C. government on home rule grounds. As you instructed, I spoke yesterday with Steve Rhodes of Rich Williamson's staff. His view is that, while he would like to avoid yet another problem with the D.C. government, the national security considerations in this case easily outweigh the local concerns.

In sum, I believe we should continue to push for this important legislation. Please let me know if you require more information.
