Dear Mr. President:

We are writing on behalf of Dr. Robert Simon, the first American physician to go to Afghanistan. Dr. Simon is the founder of the International Medical Corp, with a membership of two hundred and fifty medical personnel and a professor of Emergency Medicine at the University of California at Los Angeles. He plans to return to Afghanistan as soon as funds can be generated for 8 teams of medical and surgical personnel.

Since the Soviets expelled the Red Cross, the Afghan people have had no Internal humanitarian assistance. The French medical teams working inside Afghanistan have one serious deficiency; they cannot perform surgery, except for emergency amputations. As Dr. Simon stated at his forum, "to be wounded in Afghanistan is to be as good as dead." Travel time to Pakistan is life-threatening for those people whose injuries require surgery.

We would like to offer our support in obtaining funds from the Agency for International Development for Dr. Simon and the International Medical Corp. We feel that the provision of surgeons, along with ambulances and medical supplies, are matters of the highest priority. The program outlined by the International Medical Corp would include training of Afghan civilians as medics so that in the future fewer Americans will be involved.

At the present time, there is a critical need for surgical treatment in Afghanistan. The International Medical Corp can meet that need and will give the plight of the Afghan people the visability and some of the humanitarian aid they deserve.



Dear Mr. Pal:

The White House asked me to respond to your letter of January 31, expressing concern about Afghanistan and the weapons you feel the Afghan Freedom Fighters need for their struggle against Soviet aggression. I regret that you did not receive a reply to your previous correspondence; the heavy volume of mail received at the White House occasionally results in misplaced letters. Nevertheless, you can be assured that the President is aware of your concerns, and appreciates your taking the time to write him on this important issue.

The United States strongly opposes the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan, and seeks the removal of Soviet troops from that war-torn land. The U.S.S.R.'s invasion and continuing occupation is an example of Soviet willingness to use its military might beyond its border in ways that threaten peace, stability and freedom in the Southwest and South Asian regions, as well as throughout the world. For this reason, it is essential that Soviet aggression in Afghanistan not succeed.

As President Reagan reiterated on September 24 to the United Nations General Assembly (UNGA), the United States is committed to seeking a negotiated political settlement for Afghanistan based on the principles spelled out in six UNGA resolutions. These resolutions call for an immediate withdrawal of foreign troops from Afghanistan; reaffirm the right of the Afghan people to determine their own form of government and to choose their economic, political, and social system; reiterate that the preservation of the sovereignty, territorial integrity, political independence, and non-aligned character of Afghanistan is essential for a peaceful solution of the problem; and call for the creation of conditions which would enable the Afghan refugees to return voluntarily to their homes in safety and honor.

Unfortunately, the prospects for an early political settlement do not appear bright. The Soviets seem prepared for a long struggle, and have shown no willingness to negotiate a withdrawal of their forces. With their increasingly brutal reprisal tactics against civilians and civilian areas, the Soviets seem to feel they can prevail through a cynical policy of attrition and that the world will simply look the other way.

The Afghan people, for their part, have demonstrated a remarkable determination to resist the Soviet invader. The resistance fighters are more numerous, better armed, and more effective than ever before. After five long years of mounting bloodshed on both sides, the conflict remains a bitter stalemate and the Soviets face the bleak prospect of an open-ended military struggle.

The United States Government has repeatedly made clear to Soviet leaders that their army's presence in Afghanistan is and will remain a serious impediment to a fundamental improvement in our relations. This was stated most recently in Vienna by Assistant Secretary of State Richard Murphy in his "experts" talks on the Middle East with his Soviet counterpart. We will continue to speak out against the Soviets' brutal repression of the Afghan people, and will work with those seeking to focus world attention on Soviet atrocities and to bring about an early withdrawal of Soviet forces. The question of how we can bring home to the Soviet Union the full cost of its aggression in Afghanistan is under constant review.

As President Reagan said in his statement released on the December 27 fifth anniversary of the Soviet invasion, "...we will not forget the people of Afghanistan who are struggling to live once again among the free nations of the world. These brave people will continue to have the support of all Americans in their noble struggle."

There is considerable truth to Senator Humphrey's charge that the government has been very slow in getting off the mark. I should underscore, however, that it was a Presidential initiative which called for overt humanitarian assistance to the Mujeheddin. We provided a plane load of medical supplies in the fall of 1984 to accompany the Vice President to Pakistan for the Mujeheddin. The White House subsequently called for a \$6 million federal program.

Part of the problem has been Department of State's and AID's inability to identify funds for the humanitarian program. This problem has been resolved, and funds have been found for the full \$6 million program. A detailed conference took place in London to review appropriate procedures for spending the food and medical funds. Ambassador Helman is in Pakistan now formalizing this process. We are attempting to set in motion a process which will hold not only for the current activity but also for the projected \$15 million program in FY 86. This new program will be funded as an amendment to the Foreign Assistance Act of 1961 and will provide for humanitarian assistance, including food, clothing, and medical assistance.

The effort has to be closely coordinated with the Pakistani Government, as all these programs run through Pakistan. There have been a number of entreaties from Capitol Hill to move more rapidly. While these concerns are understandable, they do ignore the basic fact that we can go only as fast as we are given running room by the Pakistanis. Some of the Congressional supporters of the Mujeheddin have been particularly anxious to provide assistance to American doctors to go to Afghanistan. This has serious political ramifications, and we have been exploring this option very carefully before underwriting an effort to fund American private doctors serving in a humanitarian capacity in Afghanistan.

It is widely accepted that Soviet strategy in Afghanistan is to "eliminate the fishes by emptying the sea." They have declared war on the civilian population who aid the freedom fighters, and have been very effectively practicing "migratory genocide." In excess of four million Afghans have sought refuge outside the country -- approximately one third of the total population -- the world's largest refugee population. The overall budget for the refugees in Pakistan is estimated in excess of \$400 million per year from a number of international sources.

There can be no question that the best interests of the freedom fighters are served by assisting a civilian population, anxious to remain in their homes, and in their country, in doing so. However, the red tape involved in providing humanitarian assistance to the Afghans inside Afghanistan has rendered us virtually helpless in meeting our objectives. The State Department has recently completed spending \$2 million earmarked last fall by Congressman Wilson for humanitarian aid to the Afghans. Since mid-November the State Department has been discussing a humanitarian aid program of \$6 million in food and medical programs. much hardship in locating the funds, White House approval was given in mid-February for this expenditure. Although \$2 million was then identified for that purpose it has not yet been spent. I am told that the other \$4 million will be Identified any day now, this has been the answer I have been getting for weeks, and as you can see, months.

Dear Don:

I would like to bring to your attention an issue which I believe impacts heavily on the United States' ability to successfully implement foreign policy goals. While U.S. policy supports the freedom fighters in Afghanistan, and they are commonly held out as courageous protectors of freedom, they are currently crying out for food and medicine to protect the innocent civilian population choosing to remain in their own country.

It is widely accepted that Soviet strategy in Afghanistan is to "eliminate the fishes by emptying the sea." They have declared war on the civilian population who aid the freedom fighters, and have been very effectively practicing "migratory genocide." In excess of four million Afghans have sought refuge outside the country -- approximately one third of the total population -- the world's largest refugee population. The overall budget for the refugees in Pakistan is estimated in excess of \$400 million per year from a number of international sources.

Unfortunately, as you well know, to the Afghans time is in short supply. I would greatly appreciate it if you could use your good offices to insure that a mechanism exists for the effective and expeditious delivery of humanitarian aid to the Afghans.

Dear Mr. Abassi:

I am responding to your letter of August 6 to the President. Thank you for taking the time to write and express your concern for the President's health and your strong support for the administration's policy on Afghanistan and on international terrorism.

The United States strongly opposes the Soviet occupation of Afghanistan, and seeks the removal of Soviet troops from that war-torn homeland. The U.S.S.R.'s invasion and continuing occupation is an example of Soviet willingness to use its military might beyond its border in ways that threaten peace, stability, and freedom in the Southwest and South Asian regions, as well as throughout the world. For this reason, it is essential that Soviet aggression in Afghanistan not succeed.

As President Reagan reiterated on September 24 to the United States General Assembly (UNGA), the United States is committed to seeking a negotiated political settlement for Afghanistan, based upon the principles spelled out in six UNGA resolutions on Afghanistan. These resolutions call for an immediate withdrawal of foreign troops from Afghanistan; reaffirm the right of the Afghan people to determine their own form of government and to choose their economic, political, and social system; reiterate that the preservation of the sovereignty, territorial integrity, political independence, and non-aligned character of Afghanistan is essential for a peaceful solution of the problem; and call for the creation of conditions which would enable the Afghan refugees to return voluntarily to their homes in safety and honor.

Unfortunately, the prospects for an early political settlement do not appear bright. The Soviets seem prepared for a long struggle, and have shown no willingness to negotiate a withdrawal of their forces. With their increasingly brutal reprisal tactics against civilians and civilian areas, the Soviets seem to feel they can prevail through a cynical policy of attrition and that the world will simply look the other way.

You and your countrymen have demonstrated a remarkable but not surprising determination to resist the Soviet invader. resistance fighters are more numerous, better armed, and more effective than ever before. The question of how the United States can bring home to the Soviet Union the full cost of its aggression in Afghanistan is under constant review. After five long years of mounting bloodshed on both sides, the conflict remains a bitter stalemate and the Soviets face the bleak prospect of an open-ended military struggle.

The United States Government has repeatedly made clear to Soviet leaders that the Soviet Army's presence in Afghanistan is and will remain a serious impediment to a fundamental improvement in our relations. The State Department has played an active role in trying to focus world attention on Soviet atrocities. We will continue to speak out against their brutal repression of the Afghan people and will work with those seeking to bring about an early withdrawal of Soviet forces.

On the broader question of international terrorism, we continue to work with our allies on practical steps to combat terrorism while searching for long-term solutions to an ever-growing problem. Vice President Bush heads a government-wide task force to review and recommend improvements in our efforts to halt terrorism. We believe that terrorism has become a form of warfare all its own -- war against freedom, which we cannot and will not lose.

Your countrymen's tireless efforts to expel the Soviet invaders and regain your freedom are an inspiration to all freedom-loving peoples. As President Reagan said in his statement released on the December 27 fifth anniversary of the Soviet invasion, "we will not forget the people of Afghanistan who are struggling to live once again among the free nations of the world. These brave people will continue to have the support of all Americans in their nobel struggle."

May I take this occasion as well to wish you and your colleagues Id Mubarak and to offer the hope that before another Id-al-Azha is upon us, the situation in Afghanistan will have taken a major turn for the better.
