Discussion

The principal findings of S.J.Res. 365 state that: (1) more than 120,000 Soviet troops currently remain in Afghanistan as a result of the illegal invasion in December of 1979; (2) these forces have decimated the nation of Afghanistan; (3) the Afghan Mujahideen have resisted the Soviet forces for more than six years; and (4) on May 16, 1985, the Afghan resistance formed the Islamic Unity of Afghan Mujahideen, representing a unified coalition of the major Afghan organizations dedicated to ending Soviet occupation.

S.J.Res. 365 reaffirms the support of the United States for the struggle of the Afghan people and welcomes the delegation of the Islamic Unity of Afghan Mujahideen led by Spokesman Burhanuddin Rabbani on the occasion of his first official visit to the United States.

Spokesman Burhanuddin Rabbini, with whom you met during the week of June 15, 1986, and his delegation, have already departed from the United States.

S.J.Res. 365 passed the Senate by a vote of 98-0 and the House by voice vote.

SUBJECT: Presidential Visit to Afghan Wounded

As part of our public diplomacy follow up to the Reykjavik meeting, attached is a schedule proposal for the President and possibly Mrs. Reagan to visit a group of wounded Afghan freedom fighters and children being treated in U.S. hospitals on December 9.

The next group of 25-30 Afghans to be flown to the U.S. under the McCollum patient airlift program for free medical treatment donated by private groups and hospitals will arrive in Washington on December 8. State has arranged for them to spend the night at Georgetown University Hospital before being dispersed to treatment centers all over the U.S. A Presidential visit to Georgetown Hospital would serve three major objectives:

--to keep public focus on the continuing Soviet war against the people of Afghanistan as one of our key regional concerns;

--to bring home the human costs of that war as part of Human Rights Day commemoration and preparations to mark the 7th anniversary of the Soviet invasion;

--to highlight American public and private efforts to support the Afghan resistance.

Alternatively, we could arrange to bring some of the Afghans to the White House, but this would be less dramatic and more contrived.

We would build a number of public diplomacy activities around this event, including a Presidential statement pointing to the anniversary of the Soviet invasion, possible Worldnets and other media events. In addition, Helsinki Watch will issue its report on the effect of the war on Afghan children, which will reinforce the message.

OPL strongly supports this event, and will help with logistics.

Subject: Presidential Visit to Afghan Wounded on Human Rights Day, December 10

The Interagency Afghanistan Focus Committee has begun ' planning activities to direct attention to the continued Soviet occupation of Afghanistan and to highlight the seventh anniversary of the Soviet invasion, December 27.

As the war in Afghanistan drags on with no end in sight, and as the Soviets become increasingly sophisticated in their use of the media to project an image of flexibility, the importance of enhancing US and international media attention to Soviet activities in Afghanistan becomes increasingly important. It is essential -- factually and, if possible, visually -- to expose Soviet duplicity in Afghanistan, as we did in the case of their sham withdrawal of six Soviet regiments.

We believe that a visit to Afghan wounded by the President and/or Mrs. Reagan on December 10, Human Rights Day, would serve to highlight the continued and massive human rights violations against the Afghan people, while forcefully reasserting the Administration's broader commitment to supporting individual human rights. It would also underline the message in the UN report by the Special Rapporteur on Afghanistan which concludes that, "continuation of the military solution (in Afghanistan) will lead inevitably to a situation approaching genocide." Helsinki Watch is scheduled to publish a report on or about December 10 focussed on the effect of the war on the Afghan children which could be effectively tied to a White House visit to Afghan wounded.

As you know, under the McCollum patient airlift program, we have been bringing Afghan wounded on a regular basis to the United States for pro bono medical treatment unavailable in Pakistan. Broad, bi-partisan Congressional support of and participation in the program has stimulated positive coverage of this US effort to assist the Afghan people. In addition,

Others will be flown from Washington to various states where, with the help of Congressional offices and Afghan support groups, they will be placed in local hospitals.

A visit to the Afghan wounded by President and/or Mrs. Reagan would not only highlight the continued war in Afghanistan, but also encourage greater participation -- both in the United States and in Europe -- in this humanitarian program.

Dear President Reagan:

We, the members of the Peninsula Clergy Association of Newport News, Hampton, and York County, Virginia, are writing to commend you for the concern you have shown for the people of Afghanistan in your recent talks in Iceland with officials of the Soviet Union and in other negotiations with the Soviets.

As a United Nations report prepared late last year entitled "Situation of Human Rights in Afghanistan" pointed out, half of that nation's twelve million people have been driven from their homes -- four million of them into exile in other countries. Children's bodies are mutilated by small bombs disguised as toys. The infant mortality rate is 300 to 400 per 1,000 births. Five hundred thousand civilians have been killed and countless others severely injured and countless more deprived of food. Indeed, as an editorial in THE WASHINGTON POST of December 15, 1985, states, "The word that comes to mind when one reads this [United Nations] report is genocide."

We trust that you will continue to speak on behalf of the people of Afghanistan whenever the opportunity arises and continue also to try to make the people of the United States and of the rest of the world more fully aware of the suffering and anguish inflicted by the Soviets upon the brave Afghan people.

Armand's April 10 letter to you shows that he has lost none of his incredible enthusiasm and energy, and that peace in Afghanistan remains a priority concern. Unfortunately, his activity in this regard is not seen by others as strictly private -- given his past involvement with the Administration in matters such as the Daniloff case and his penchant for reporting widely on each contact he has with Administration officials, Senators, etc.

The high profile push being given to former King Zahir Shah by Armand, UN negotiator Cordovez, Pak Foreign Minister Yagub, and others has already produced the backlash which Armand warns against in his April 10 letter. A majority of the Resistance field commanders inside Afghanistan and the seven political leaders in Pakistan have taken a stand against the King. This may change over time but for the moment everyone needs to let the idea rest. As you know, what George Shultz told the Soviet leaders and the Soviet people (on TV) is consistent with the April 10 letter, and represents the long-standing position of this Administration. Mike Armacost had previously made the same points in Moscow. The Soviets are as yet unyielding on the key issues of early withdrawal and no Communist domination of a successor or transition regime.

I see no need for us to continue a dialogue with Armand on this issue. If he should call, you might inform him that the current tough Soviet attitude and the suspicions of the Resistance mean that continuation of his active role in the near future would tend to be counterproductive.

Those of us associated with the Palm Beach Clinic greatly appreciate Congressman Lewis' support of our effort.

Dr. Khalid Akram received his medical training and M.D. from the Medical School at Kabul University. He has been providing medical assistance inside Afghanistan since 1982. He served as vice-president of the Mujahideen Doctors in 1983-84. In March 1985, Dr. Akram testified before the Congressional Task Force on Afghanistan.

Dr. Akram was a part of a panel that appeared before the Palm Beach Round Table forum November 12, 1984. As you know, Congressman Lewis was also a member of that panel that discussed the situation of the Afghan war with the Russians. Private funds were raised to establish a clintc in Afghanistan to serve both the freedom fighters as well as local villagers.

Mrs. Williams and I traveled to Peshawar, Pakistan to determine the feasibility of a Clinic "inside". Assistance was sought to receive additional support from agencies operating in the Peshawar area so that the Clinic could survive on a continuing basis.

In July 1985, a small medical team consisting of Dr. Akram, one other Afghan doctor and 2 paramedics and one cook established the core of the "Palm Beach Clinic for Afghans" which is located in a strategic yet defensible location, near the Kabul area. Military support for this private venture is provided by local Mujahideen. Humanitarian aid is all that the Palm Beach Clinic needs, and all Clinic personnel are Afghans.

The Clinic funds are administered in Peshawar by a board consisting of three prominent Afghans.

At present the Clinic is functioning with a skeletal work force, yet are treating about 700 patients per month. Our plan is for the Palm Beach Clinic to act as a hub of emergency treatment for both the Mujahideen and local villagers. A network of 10 paramedics will radiate out into more remote areas. With adequate funding, a patient delivery system to permanent hospital facilities will function out of this treatment center and care could be extended to 100 patients per day. Estimates ranging from 400-600 people traverse the routes through the Clinic area daily.

The ancillary functions of the Clinic are performed b local Afghans. A secondary, but very important aspect of the Clinic is to provide meaningful employment to people remaining "inside".

Because of the difficulty in attracting doctors to remain in Afghanistan, the main emphasis of the expanded Clinic will be the utilization of dedicated paramedics with a quick and dependable patient delivery system to the "outside".

Although the Palm Beach Clinic is new, the concept is sound and it is functioning NOW!

With an established respected Board providing guidance the Clinic has a good chance of survival. We have already survived a seven day Russian offensive, which occurred the first week of September. The moral support from a private group of individuals in the U.S.A. has become very meningful to the Afghans. Although there is a one month lag time, I will continue to receive a detailed monthly report from the Clinic.

Direct American people involvement can move mountains. This particular effort grew from the collection of 500 pair of boots for the freedom fighters. The Palm Beach Clinic has already become symbolic of what one Afghan doctor and a handful of Americans can accomplish. To sustain this effort the Clinic now needs, some on going support.

Enclosed are some recent press clippings regarding our Clinic, an organizational chart showing the present staff and proposed staffing, Afghan employment contracts, a letter from Houston, Texas, and proposed budget for an expanded operation.

Both my wife and I have hospital backgrounds. I founded a hospital housekeeping service in 1959. My company was acquired by American Hospital. Supply in 1972 and I retired to Palm Beach in 1974. My wife, Sue, was Assistant Administrator at Mercy Medical Center in Denver from 1965 to 1971. Prior to that she was Director of Nursing Services at St. Joseph Hospital in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

We are members of the Everglades Club, and I am a board member at The Beach Club. I am also a governor of the Palm Beach Historical Society and we are both very active with the Palm Beach Chapter of the American Heart Association. We have a fund raising event this evening, but realistically, we don't expect to receive more than five or six thousand dollars. I have given our Clinic Board my personal assurance that we will provide funds for another three months operation, but Federal assistance would enable us to expand our existing program.


