Tokyo Summit Public Diplomacy: Action Calendar

Ambassador Jim Rentschler's Public Diplomacy team has developed a comprehensive rundown of key pre-departure events and activities directly or indirectly related to Tokyo Summit issues (Tab A). This material -- in essence an action program -- identifies the principal areas where it will be necessary to ensure coordinated in-put of the thematic emphases which you have already approved in connection with the Summit. Rentschler's team will be tracking each of these events and coordinating, where appropriate, with all relevant players, at the same time updating the action calendar in light of evolving events.

The central public diplomacy issue which requires early resolution concerns the President's major remarks (content, cadence, special thematic considerations), particularly the ASEAN material in Bali and the Tokyo speech. For the former, emphasis on the "larger Pacific community" concept (regional stability, security, cooperation) would seem to be a natural focus; for the latter, the public diplomacy team strongly recommends using Tokyo to highlight the "Winds of Freedom" message (in effect striking a loftier, more ideological note than envisaged in a standard Chamber of Commerce format.)

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

Assuming no objections are perceived, the Public Diplomacy team will be tracking each of these events and coordinating, where appropriate, relevant in-put, as indicated in the notional work plan. (The latter will, of course, be regularly updated in light of evolving events.) Your memo also flags what we see as the major public diplomacy issue now requiring speedy resolution, viz., choreographing the President's major public remarks (especially Bali and Tokyo.)

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



PRESIDENT REAGAN'S TRIP TO ASIA (SPRING 1986)

AND GORBACHEV II

I. Core Concept

The President's Asian trip and the Tokyo Economic Summit, followed by Gorbachev II, form a public diplomacy continuum; major thematic chords sounded from the earlier platform should both amplify and reinforce the basic message of the later.

II. Controlling Theme

The Winds of Freedom: With strong American leadership directed toward the building of a better and safer world, the fresh winds of freedom are blowing, East and West.

III. Target Perceptions

A. Scene

- The President's trip to Guam, Bali, the Tokyo Economic Summit, and any additional stop(s)/event(s) should be publicly viewed as yet another practical and positive expression of the economic principles which he has articulated since the Ottawa Summit of 1981, together with the central foreign policy objectives embodied in his Geneva meeting with Soviet Leader Gorbachev, highlighting:
 - -- improved communication between different societies;
 - -- peaceful competiveness of differing political and economic systems;
 - -- unflagging support for democratic aspirations;
 - -- free economies which meet human needs;
 - -- free-nation solidarity in the service of mutual security.
- Explicitly or implicitly every part of the April-May itinerary should provide reciprocal reinforcement for one or more of these principles and further influence the public climate for Gorbachev II.

B. Primary Target Perception

- An energetic President and the continuing American renewal: assertive U.S. leadership is essential to world peace and prosperity.

C. Supporting Target Perceptions

- Reality is catching up with Ronald Reagan's vision: commonality of interests in the Atlantic and Pacific communities now a positive trend in the late 20th Century.
- Recommitment to Democracy: the future lies with those nations espousing full political/economic self-expression and self-determination.
- The U.S. is a reasonable partner in the search for lasting peace.

D. Individual Locations and Matching Messages

1. Guam

- Main Theme: indivisibility of democratic freedom.
- Specific Emphasis
 - -- America's role in preserving peace in the Pacific ("No man is an island.")

2. Bali/Indonesia

- Main Theme: America remains centrally relevant to the promotion of democratic cooperation, economic progress and security in the Pacific Basin.
- Specific Emphases
 - -- ASEAN contributes to regional stability and security.
 - -- Indonesia on the path of democracy.
 - -- U.S. offers a partnership of shared values.
 - -- Primacy of economic and political freedom (lesson of the Philippines).

3. Tokyo Economic Summit/Japan

- Main Theme: Summit partners help power the winds of freedom increasingly blowing democratic self-rule and entrepreneurial energy across the globe.

- Specific Emphases

- -- Free Markets. Freedom from encumbering government regulation, ownership, or control, together with freedom of choice for consumers.
- -- Free Trade. Freedom to flow witout barriers or distortions; resistance to protectionism and continuing support for new round of multilateral negotiations.
- -- Free Investment. Freedom to invest in enterprises; freedom from onerous or growth-depressing taxation which stifles new investment.
- -- Free Nations. Freedom for LDCs to grow and move toward self-sufficiency through economic reform, reaping the benefits of Summit consensus on sustained non-inflationary market-oriented growth.

4. Summit Bilaterals

- <u>Main Theme</u>: Western democracies retain the initiative in jointly shaping a freer and safer world.

- Specific Emphases

- -- Japan: emerging Japanese role in supporting broader Western security.
- -- All: necessity of united stand on East-West issues.
- -- All: sincerity of American commitment to progress in U.S.-USSR relationship.
- -- <u>All</u>: implications of the Philippines experience directly affect/support Western interest in promoting expanded freedom.
- -- All: tightened international cooperation is the key to combatting terrorism.
- -- <u>All</u>: tightened international cooperation is also the key to cutting drug traffic.

5. Post-Asia: Gorbachev II (U.S.)

- Main Theme: Building on the New Start at Geneva.
- Specific Emphases:
 - -- Realism: Pursuit of understanding with the Soviets must continue to proceed in full and frank awareness of the major differences existing between democratic and Communist societies.
 - -- Reducing, eventually eliminating nuclear and conventional arsenals. We have the opportunity and the mandate to press forward with the reduction of nuclear arsenals.
 - -- Encourage respect for human rights. U.S. will remain second to none in the vigorous defense of human rights, believing that countries which respect civil liberties and quality of life are unlikely to unleash war.
 - -- Reducing the use and threat of force. Any recipe for better superpower relations must include Soviet cessation of efforts to expand influence in other countries through armed intervention and subversion.
 - -- Building trust, a more cooperative, relationship. Improved people-to-people, as well as government-to-government communication between our countries can promote better understanding and lead to strengthened peace and stability.

Themes for the Tokyo Summit

Major Theme: BUILDING A BETTER AND SAFER WORLD

THE WINDS OF FREEDOM

Basic Messages:

-- The World is Witness to a Global Movement Towards
Political and Economic Freedom which Promises a Better
and Safer World

The Winds of Freedom blow on every continent, bringing with them an unmistakable and unprecedented convergence of political and economic self-expression and self-determination.

-- The Summit Nations Must Foster the Free Flow of the Winds of Freedom

The right of the state to limit individual political and economic well-being has been challenged. The Summit nations must take the lead in encouraging and supporting the worldwide recommitment to democratic ideals and productive entrepreneurial activity.

-- There are Safeguards to the Winds of Freedom

The great democracies know from experience: Freedom of the marketplace, free and fair trade, open investment opportunities and security from external disruption are the engines of growth, development and prosperity. The benefits of economic and political freedom will come to any nation which follows their example.

Supporting Concepts:

- -- The nations of the world are reaching out for personal freedom, democratic self rule and entrepreneurial activity:
 - 1. Recommitment to Democracy: More than 50 countries, one third of the world's population, are now living under democratic rule including -- in Europe: Spain, Portugal, Greece; in South and Central America: Argentina, Brazil, Peru, Bolivia, Ecuador, Uruguay, El Salvador, Guatemala, Costa Rica, Honduras, Caribbean Basin (90% of all people in Latin America and the Caribbean now enjoy democratic rule); and in Asia.
 - 2. Emergence of Market-oriented Economies:
 ASEAN nations -- India, Brazil, Third World disillusionment with Soviet model of development, China,
 Hungary, etc. In agriculture alone, over the past decade, there has been a vigorous movement away from centralized planning toward free market policies, encompassing thereby more than 2 billion people; one half the world's population.
- -- It is essential to safeguard the Winds of Freedom through:
 - 1. <u>Markets</u> -- free from encumbering government regulation, ownership, or control; freedom of choice for consumers.
 - 2. Trade -- free to flow without barriers or distortions; resistance to protectionism and continuing support for the new round of multilateral negotiations.
 - 3. <u>Investment</u> -- freedom to invest in enterprises; freedom from onerous or growth depressing taxation which stifles new investment.
 - 4. Policy towards developing nations -- freedom to grow and move toward self-sufficiency through economic reform. Summit nations will through policy-based lending, assist those who embrace growth-producing reforms, investment and assurance of open markets.
 - 5. <u>Security</u> -- freedom from external disruption
 - -- Soviet Union -- as stated at Williamsburg, the security of the Summit nations is indivisible and must be approached on a global basis. Continue to seek a more stable and constructive relationship with the Soviet Union based on the principles of restraint and reciprocity and thus maintain the military balance

while seeking the expansion of the political dialogue leading up to and through the second Reagan Gorbachev meeting.

Terrorism -- Freedom from fear and domestic insecurity are the right and responsibility of free peoples; also freedom of travel and of commercial movement. When those freedoms are violated by outlaw elements in the world society, the Winds of Freedom are stilled, silent in the atmosphere of tension and fright. The Summit nations must pledge their total cooperation in identifying, extirpating and bringing to justice the perpetrators, agents, sponsors and abettors of terrorists, such as those responsible for the attack on the Achille Lauro and the Rome and Vienna airports. Civilized nations cannot continue to tolerate in the name of material gain or self-interest the murder of innocent citizens or the disruption of international economic activity.

-- The U.S. has done its part:

- 1. Open markets -- the U.S. maintains the most open markets in the world and the President has taken the lead in resisting protectionism.
- 2. <u>Domestic Economic Policy</u> -- encourages growth and employment; has resulted in reduced interest rates, reduced inflation and increased employment; has established mechanism for reducing budget deficits.
- 3. <u>International leadership</u> -- U.S. has led the world in promoting the new trade round, coordinating economic policy through the G-5 and addressing the Third World debt crisis through the Baker Plan. The U.S. has also shown leadership in reducing East-West tensions and confronting terrorism.

Primary Agenda Items

I. Economic issues

- A. Trade
 - Summit will strongly endorse new round.
 - Summit will endorse reduction and dismantling of trade restrictions.
 - Summit will endorse exchange rate progress.
 - Summit will endorse structural adjustment corrections to deal with imbalances.
- B. International Monetary Issues
 - Should Summit nations endorse concept and agenda of a monetary conference?
- C. Debt
 - Summit will likely endorse Program for Sustained Growth ("Baker Plan")
- D. Oil Price Decline
 - Summit will recognize beneficial effects of decline in oil prices on world economy

II. Political and Other Issues

- A. Terrorism
 - Summit will endorse stronger statement on terrorism beyond Bonn civil aviation statement to include U.S. initiatives.
- B. Narcotics
 - Will be subject of discussion at working lunch of Heads of State (May 5) and will be referenced in a Nakasone Summit statement.
- C. Science and Technology
 - Summits historically remark on these issues. Possible subjects for discussion, referral to working groups or mention in Summit statements: "Human Frontiers," Environment, Neurobiology, Space Stations.

III. Unstructured Time

- Three hour meeting on opening day of Summit for Heads of State to discuss issues of interest to them.

PRESIDENT REAGAN'S TRIP TO ASIA (SPRING 1986) AND GORBACHEV II:

THE PUBLIC DIPLOMACY FRAMEWORK

I -- Core Concept

The President's Asian trip and the Tokyo Economic Summit, followed by Gorbachev II, form a public diplomacy continuum; major thematic chords sounded from the earlier platform should both amplify and reinforce the basic message of the later.

II -- Controlling Theme

The Winds of Freedom: With strong American leadership directed toward building of a better and safer world, the fresh winds of freedom are blowing, East and West.

III -- Target Perceptions

A. Scene

- The President's trip to Guam, Bali, the Tokyo Economic Summit, and any additional stop(s)/event(s) should be publicly viewed as yet another practical and positive expression of the economic principles which he has articulated since the Ottawa Summit of 1981, together with the central foreign policy objectives embodied in his Geneva meeting with Soviet Leader Gorbachev, highlighting
 - --- <u>improved communication</u> between different societies;
 - --- peaceful competiveness of differing political and economic systems;
 - --- unflagging support for democratic aspirations;
 - --- free economies which meet human needs;
 - --- free-nation solidarity in the service of mutual security.
- Explicitly or implicitly every part of the April-May itinerary should provide reciprocal reinforcement for one or more of these principles and further influence the public climate for Gorbachev II.

B. Primary Target Perception

- An energetic President and the continuing American renewal: assertive U.S. leadership is essential to world peace and prosperity.

C. Supporting Target Perceptions

- Reality is catching up with Ronald Reagan's vision: commonality of interests in the Atlantic and Pacific communities now a positive trend in the late 20th Century.
- Recommitment to Democracy: the future lies with those nations espousing full political/economic self-expression and self-determination.
- The U.S. is a reasonable partner in the search for lasting peace.

D. Individual Locations and Matching Messages

1. Guam

- <u>Main theme</u>; indivisibility of democratic freedom.
- Specific emphasis
 - --- America's role in preserving peace in the Pacific ("No man is an island")

2. Bali/Indonesia

- Main theme: America remains centrally relevant to the promotion of democratic cooperation, economic progress, and security in the Pacific Basin.

Specific emphases

- --- ASEAN contributes to regional stability and prosperity.
- --- Indonesia on the path of democracy.
- --- U.S. offers a partnership of shared values.
- --- Primacy of economic and political freedom (lesson of the Philippines).

3. Tokyo Economic Summit/Japan

- Main theme: Summit partners help power the winds of freedom increasingly blowing democratic self-rule and entrepreneurial energy across the globe.

- Specific emphases

- --- Free markets. Freedom from encumbering government regulation, ownership, or control, together with freedom of choice for consumers.
- --- Free trade. Freedom to flow without barriers or distortions; resistance to protectionism and continuing support for new round of multilateral negotiations.
- --- Free investment. Freedom to invest in enterprises; freedom from onerous or growth-depressing taxation which stifles new investment.
- --- Free nations. Freedom for LDCs to grow and move toward self-sufficiency through economic reform, reaping the benefits of Summit consensus on sustained non-inflationary market-oriented growth.

4. Summit Bilaterals

- <u>Main theme</u>: Western democracies retain the initiative in jointly shaping a freer and safer world.

Specific Emphases

- --- Japan: emerging Japanese role in supporting broader Western security.
- --- All: necessity of united stand on East-West issues.
- --- All: sincerity of America commitment to progress in U.S.-USSR relationship.

- --- All: implications of the Philippines experience directly affect/support Western interest in promoting expanded freedom.
- --- All: tightened international cooperation is the key to combatting terrorism.
- --- All: tightened international cooperation is also the key to cutting drug traffic.
- 5. Possible other stop(s)/event(s)
 (appropriate material to be developed)
- 6. Post-Asia: Gorbachev II (U.S.)
 - Main theme: Building on the New Start at Geneva.
 - Specific emphases
 - --- Realism: Pursuit of understanding with the Soviets must continue to proceed in full and frank awareness of the major differences existing between democratic and Communist societies.
 - --- Reducing, eventually eliminating nuclear and conventional arsenals.

 We have the opportunity and the mandate to press forward with the reduction of nuclear arsenals.
 - --- Encourage respect for Human rights.
 U.S. will remain second to none in the vigorous defense of human rights, believing that countries which respect civil liberties and quality of life are unlikely to unleash war.

- Reducing the use and threat of force. Any recipe for better superpower relations must include Soviet cessation of efforts to expand influence in other countries through armed intervention and subversion.
- --- Building trust, a more cooperative, relationship. Improved people-to-people, as well as government-to-government communication between our countries can promote better understanding and lead to strengthened peace and stability.

U.S. Objectives for Tokyo Economic Summit

I. Objectives

<u>Primary</u> -- To secure endorsement of U.S. leadership on major international economic issues: trade, monetary policy, and debt.

<u>Secondary</u> -- To secure endorsement of U.S. leadership on major international security issues: East-West dialogue, arms control and terrorism.

II. Supporting Concepts

- Leading by Example -- The U.S. has kept the commitments made by the President at previous economic Summits to confirm its domestic macroeconomic policies toward the promotion of worldwide non-inflationary growth and prosperity. The U.S. has:
 - o Stimulated investment
 - o Resisted protectionism
 - o Lowered interest rates
 - o Established a mechanism for reducing the federal deficit
- -- Leading by Initiative -- In addition, the U.S. has launched important initiatives to encourage, regenerate and preserve worldwide prosperity through non-inflationary growth:
 - o Trade -- The President has strongly advocated the establishment of a new multilateral trade round without condition or limitation as to the subjects to be negotiated, thus including investment, safeguards, dispute resolution and trade in services.
 - o Monetary Policy -- The U.S. has given increased attention to surveillance and convergence of national monetary policies through the G-5.
 - Debt -- The U.S. has proposed a plan for assisting debt-laden countries through the encouragement of additional but coordinated commercial and multilateral policy-based lending.
- III. Headline of Successful Summit: "Summit Nations Support
 U.S. Lead on Key Economic Issues."
