Dear Mr. Hamerman:

The President has asked me to reply on his behalf to your letter of October 4, 1982 concerning Mrs. Nusrat Bhutto.

We appreciate your expression of concern about Mrs. Bhutto's case. The Department of State has approached the Pakistani authorities on several occasions about Mrs. Bhutto's application to leave the country. We have pointed out that our interest stems from the clear-cut humanitarian considerations at work as well as the potential political and public relations problems which might arise on the eve of President Zia's early December arrival in the United States.

Despite our concerns over this case, as well as over other human rights related allegations, we continue to consider the relationship we have established with the Government of Pakistan an important element of U.S. foreign policy. We believe that enhancing regional stability and thwarting Soviet expanionist tendencies in South and Southwest Asia through this relationship serves the interests of both the American and Pakistani people.

Thank you for your letter. If we can provide any further information, please don't hesitate to write us again.

Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to you on behalf of the National Democratic Policy Committee to bring your urgent attention to the gross violation of the most basic human rights that is now taking place in Pakistan. I am referring specifically to the case of Begum Nusrat Bhutto, the leader of the Pakistan Peoples Party and widow of the late former Prime Minister Z.A. Bhutto.

Mrs. Bhutto is suffering from complications which arose out of long prison terms she has undergone; she has urgent medical needs, and has requested the Pakistan government for a passport and permission to travel to Europe for medical treatment. For more than a month now, the authorities have refused to respond to her request, in spite of the fact that Mrs. Bhutto has repeatedly stated her willingness to answer any and all questions the authorities may have as to her request. In despair, Mrs. Bhutto has recently communicated to a sister in London her belief that Pakistan President Zia ul-Haq wants to see her die. Zia ul-Haq overthrew; and then arrested, tried and executed Mrs. Bhutto's husband in 1979 in defiance of pleas from world leaders.

Our first concern is that you exercise your considerable moral and political power to urge General Zia ul-Haq to act promptly to see that Mrs. Bhutto receives the medical treatment she requires. It would be most inappropriate for you, Mr. President, to receive the President of Pakistan in December in a situation where he is engaged in what the entire world recognizes to be a cynical denial of basic human dignity and morality.

Secondly, Mr. President, we ask you to reflect on the fact that the case of Mrs. Bhutto is not the only case of what most Americans, were they given the facts, would readily identify as a gross and systematic supression of human freedom and democratic rights in Pakistan. military dictatorship of General Zia ul-Haq -- a regime whose massive benefit financially from the flow of heroin into American cities has been documented, a regime so inimical to the interests and needs of its citizens that it has found it necessary to defend itself with a suspension of all basic democratic rights, including a free press and elections, and, most recently, with the enactment of laws establishing the death sentence for all political prisoners and the principle that suspects of political and other crimes are guilty until they prove themselves innocent.

You owe it to yourself, Mr. President, and to the American people to disassociate the United States of America from further financial, military, and political support of Zia ul-Haq's regime in Pakistan because this government is an active repudiation of every principle in whose defense our own nation was founded.

Your positive action on these two matters would find overwhelming support among the American people.



Dear Mr. Lynch:

I have been asked to reply to your letter of November 30, 1982 to the President regarding the case of Tariq Ahsan, a Pakistani academic arrested on charges of distributing subversive literature. We appreciate the expression of your views on this case.

During the visit of President Zia to the United States this month, our concerns about the human rights situation in Pakistan were raised at the most senior levels of the Administration. In addition, these questions were raised by other prominent Americans with whom President Zia met during his stay, including several Members of Congress. We believe that President Zia could have been left in no doubt as to the seriousness with which we regard the question of human rights in Pakistan, as elsewhere around the world.

We did not, during our conversations, raise with the President the case of any individual. As I am sure you will understand, to do so might have left the mistaken impression with the Pakistanis that our concerns were limited to one or a few individual cases, rather than to the broader issue of human rights and individual liberties.

I hope the foregoing has been responsive to your inquiry. If I can be of any further assistance, please let me know.






