Thank you for your letter expressing your concern about the United States' financial obligation to international health organizations.

In discussions of the Continuing Resolution, the Administration most strenuously urged the Congress to provide the level of funding necessary for the United States to meet its international commitments. Despite the fact that a sizeable increase was achieved in funding for UN organizations during the budget summit negotiations, the \$480 million appropriation for United States contributions to international organizations still fell far short of the requested \$571 million for the current fiscal year.

The allocation of the \$480 million among the several international organizations is currently being considered by the State Department, and you may wish to contact that department with your views on the appropriation allocation.



Dear Mr. Baker:

As you may know, since my appointment as Surgeon General, in addition to my domestic duties, I have been heavily engaged in international health activities. This interest stems not only from my concern for the well-being of people everywhere, but also from the recognition that health problems have no boundaries. The health of populations in other countries can impact directly on the health of Americans — surely AIDS is clear evidence of that. Additionally, there is no dispute that international health cooperation is an invaluable mechanism of foreign policy. Over the years, international health has served to reduce barriers to diplomacy and to help counter threats of aggression.

I believe the United States is facing a serious dichotomy in its efforts to influence important decisions that are made multilaterally and bilaterally when confronted with huge amounts of unpaid commitments to the United Nations system. My particular concern is the U.S. failure to meet its obligations to international health organizations, such as the World Health Organization (WHO) and the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO). This seriously impairs our ability to maintain the role of world leader that has marked our participation in international health since the beginning of this century.

As the administration negotiates reductions in the FY 88 State Department appropriations over the coming weeks, I am deeply concerned that funding for the multilateral organizations such as WHO and PAHO may be slashed even further in the urgency to reduce the budget deficit.

I strongly urge your support in assuring that the U.S. meets its financial obligations to WHO and PAHO. The 1988 U.S. assessment for WHO is \$74.7 million; for PAHO it is \$38.1 million. If full funding cannot be brought about at this time, I urge that the maximum amount be provided to WHO and PAHO, and a supplemental request be made for the remaining short-fall.

If we are to continue the gains that have been made in international health programs, I believe it is imperative that we restore our full funding commitment to these organizations. To do otherwise will gravely impair activities that are clearly in the best interests of the United States.

Dear Fred:

I would deeply appreciate if President Reagan would consider a five minute meeting and photo opportunity on October 19, 1987 with Dr. Jonathan Mann who is the World Health Organization coordinator in the worldwide war against AIDS. Jonathan is an American Public Health Service officer devoted to this Administration and is carrying out an exemplary job under difficult circumstances. While the United States has properly had some concerns with WHO administration, in the field of AIDS our government has enthusiastically supported the work of Dr. Mann and his colleagues.

Since all of our budgetary requirements in the AIDS fight have been fulfilled such a photo opportunity would not cost our government any additional funding. Symbolically, however, it would reinforce the leadership of the President and his sincere support and concern for the spread of this dread disease. Needless to say, it would be helpful to Dr. Mann in his work because of the tremendous prestige of both our President and our country.

During a brief visit to the United States this past week, Dr. Mann asked if I would make this request on his behalf. I mentioned his request to Secretary Bowen last Friday and he was in support of it. If it should be our President's desire, I feel certain that Secretary Bowen would be happy to also make himself available for the photograph. This, of course, is within your own judgement.

I would recommend your giving this favorable consideration. The reason for requesting October 19 is that it is the day prior to Dr. Mann's address before the General Assembly of the United Nations in New York on October 20 and he will be in the country. I might add that one of the reasons that he

Dr. Nyle C. Brady is the Senior Assistant Administrator for Science and Technology for the Agency for International Development (A.I.D.). A former Director-General of the International Rice Research Institute (IRRI-Philippines) and currently Professor Emeritus at Cornell University, he was appointed to his A.I.D. position in 1981.

As Senior Assistant Administrator, Dr. Brady has primary responsibility for enhancing the Agency's capabilities to use science and technology to further economic and social progress in third world countries. In addition, he helps strengthen scientific and technical capacities of the Agency staff, and serves as the Agency's primary liaison with the scientific and techical communities worldwide.

Dr. Brady received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Chemistry at Brigham Young University in 1941, a Ph.D. in Soil Science from North Carolina State University in 1947, and an Honorary Doctor of Science Degree at BYU in 1979. He served on the professorial staff at Cornell University from 1947 to 1975. He also served as head of Cornell's Agronomy Department from 1955 to 1963; Director of the Cornell University Agricultural Experiment Station from 1965 to 1973; and Associate Dean of the New York State College of Agriculture and Life Sciences from 1970-1973. Dr. Brady served as Director of Science and Education in the U.S. Department of Agriculture from 1963 to 1965 while on leave from Cornell.

Dr. Brady is a member of numerous scientific societies and has served in an official capacity with several of them. He was Vice President of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 1966; President of the Soil Science Society of America (1964); Chairman of the Agricultural Board of the National Academy of Sciences (1968 to 1971); and Chairman of the A.I.D. Research Advisory Committee (1969 to 1973).

Dr. Brady received a Professor of Merit award in the College of Agriculture at Cornell University (1953); the James E. Talmage Award, Brigham Young University (1977); the International Agronomy Award, American Society of Agronomy (1987); and was a co-recipient of the National Peanut Council Award for Research in 1947.

Dr. Brady has published nine editions of one of the leading soil science textbooks and is currently preparing the tenth edition. For the past 19 years, he has served as editor of Advances in Agronomy. A native of Manassa, Colorado, Dr. Brady is married to Martha Cornum and has two sons and two daughters.
