Drug campaign aims at teens, parents

"You don't have to be part of the crowd. Be who you are, and stand up proud. Say no. Just say no."

This jingle, sung by teenagers to an upbeat rock tune, is part of a new multi-media public service advertising campaign against drug abuse — aimed at teenagers and their parents.

A preview of the campaign was presented yesterday for first lady Nancy Reagan, who has added her support and leadership to the issue.

The advertisements, which are being sent to all print and broadcast media throughout the country this week, tell young people to "Just say no," to drugs and advise parents to "get involved with drugs before your children do."

The campaign was created by Needham, Harper & Steers Inc., an advertising agency, under the auspices of the Advertising Council and the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

Began 11/2 years ago

Sheila Tate, Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, said the campaign was initiated about 1½ years ago, when Mrs. Reagan suggested that the Advertising Council, a non-profit organization, get involved with the fight against drug abuse.

"I'm very impressed," Mrs. Reagan said after viewing the advertisements. "If we all work together, I just think that we can make a difference, make a dent."

Mrs. Reagan is scheduled to cohost the WABC-TV show, Good Morning, America, today for a special program devoted to drug abuse.

Ashton McFadden, 18, of Manhattan, a former addict who said he once "got high an average of 7 times a day," was invited by Mrs. Reagan to attend the preview of the campaign.

"I think the slogan is great," he said, because it focuses on two significant things — the "development of individuality" and taking a firm stand against drug use.

McFadden, who will complete a Phoenix House drug rehabilitation program next month, presented Mrs. Reagan with an award from Phoenix House last May for her concern about drug abuse.

His mother, Lynn McFadden, also said she thought the advertisement would be effective and could help parents talk about drugs with their children.

"I didn't think I had to discuss drugs with my children," she said. "Now I wish I had discussed the problem sooner. He has a younger sister. She knows." Wednesday, October 12, 1983;

Kicks off ad campaign

She wore a bright green button on her black-and-white tweed suit with the slogan "Just say no" in white print.

It's a slogan First Lady Nancy

It's a slogan First Lady Nancy Reagan said she would like to see all over newspapers, magazines, on radio and on television. And, most of all, it's a message she would like to see drummed into the heads of thousands of youths across the United States.

The slogan is the theme of a new public service campaign, sponsored by the Advertising Council, to promote the prevention of drug abuse. It was unveiled yesterday to Mrs. Reagan in the Third Ave. office of Needham, Harper & Steers, the advertising agency that volunteered its services for the project.

"If we can just save a few, that's better than nothing," Mrs. Reagan said of the campaign. "I do think that if everybody works together, the groups all work together, we can do something. I refuse to say we can't do anything."

HT WAS MORE than a year ago when Mrs. Reagan addressed a Washington meeting of the Advertising Council, which arranges free public advertising for national issues, and asked for help on her pet project, the prevention and treatment of drug abuse.

Needham took up the challenge and, said Chairman Paul Harper Jr., began researching the project with the help of the National Institute on Drug Abuse.

The theme of the youth campaign is "Just say no" to drugs. Harper said the purpose is to show children they can buck peer pressure to take drugs and still be respected.

With Mrs. Reagan as the campaign was unveiled were Ashton McFadden, 18, and his mother, Lynn, both of Manhattan. Ashton was greeted with a kiss and a hug from Mrs. Reagan—they had met about 18 months ago, when the First, Lady, visited Phoenix House, 12, drug treatment center where Ashton is enrolled.



Thank you so much for accepting on behalf of Mrs. Reagan the Honorary Chairmanship of the annual HOPE Ball. Had I not been out of the country, you would have heard from me sooner.

It may be of interest for you to know that I was in Grenada, where Project HOPE was asked to restore the health care delivery system which had been left in shambles with the departure of the Cubans. Our military had been temporarily filling in, but we were asked initially through the National Security Council how rapidly we could solve the problem. I believe the First Lady would be pleased to know that the mission has been accomplished and the twenty American health professionals are providing both service, training and the necessary planning, together with our Grenadan colleagues for the future. This was the first technical assistance agreement signed between Grenada and the United States and was evidence of the importance which the Grenadans placed upon the value of the health of their people. Needless to say, the political impact was even greater.

President Reagan continues to be the "Man of the Hour", not only in Grenada, but throughout the Caribbean. During visits to our projects in Barbados and Antigua and in meeting with people as well from St. Lucia, Dominica and Jamaica, I can assure you that if the President were running for re-election in the Caribbean, he would be a really unanimous choice of the people.

Please extend my personal gratitude to Mrs. Reagan for agreeing to serve once again.

Dear Mr. Krahn:

This will respond to your recent letter to Fred F. Fielding, Counsel to the President, inquiring as to whether the President would sign a letter of commendation to winners of the Junior Achievement award in Southeastern Wisconsin.

As I advised in our telephone conversation of Friday, March 2, 1984, it is a matter of longstanding White House policy, in this and previous administrations, to refuse permission to use the name, signature or likeness of the President in connection with any commercial venture, advertisement or endorsement, regardless of the merits of the request. Indeed, given the number of such requests of this nature that the President receives, we are normally forced to decline such requests even from charitable or other non-profit organizations, unless they are entities in which the President is personally involved or participates as President by virtue of historical precedent. Accordingly, I regret to advise you that we cannot approve this request.

We very much appreciate your inquiry into this matter; however, we trust you can understand the reasons we cannot comply with your request.

Some time ago you asked me to comment on a suggestion by Pete Roussel that the President establish a commission to examine the problems of drug abuse among athletes. I asked Carlton Turner to comment on this, and I had a response waiting for me on my return from Europe.

Many of the professional sports organizations have already agreed to help the President and Mrs. Reagan fight drugs in their meeting of December 16, 1982. Other sports organizations have declined involvement because they are highly concerned about inflaming an already sensitive issue. Thus, it is not a good idea to pursue politically, and I agree with Carlton that we should stay away from it.

The President and Mrs. Reagan met with the commissioners of the major sports organizations on December 16, 1982. We asked them to help us reduce drug abuse by using the positive influences and role models of prominent, clean athletes. Dear Mrs. Reagan:

We would be honored and privileged if you would graciously consent to serve as Honorary Chairman of the 1984 Mint Museum Antiques Show - October 5, 6, 7 - and would like to invite you, if you could arrange your schedule, which we realize is increasingly busy, to be our guest at one or both of the preliminary black the events - the Sponsors' Celebration October 1 and the Patrons' Party October 4. A bit of background....

In 1835, Congress, realizing the need for a U. S. Mint near the source of gold (there were at one time between 75 and 100 mines within a 20 mile radius of Charlotte) authorized the building of a Charlotte branch. This handsome building, designed by William Strickland, was removed from its original site in downtown Charlotte in 1935 to allow for expansion of the Federal post office. Through far-sighted efforts of a group of citizens, the historic building was saved, rebuilt at a new location and reopened as The Mint Museum of Art.

Just as the Mint played a vital role in the 19th Century financial community, so it now plays a major role in North Carolina's 20th Century world of the arts. The museum is presently engaged in an extensive expansion program, critical to the Mint's viability, more than doubling its size.

A major project to raise funds for the purchase of directed acquisitions, to enhance volunteer services, strengthen educational programs, is the annual Antiques Show, now in its 18th year. This show, rated as one of the top ten in the country, receives enthusiastic sponsor, patron, volunteer and general public support.

Charlotte is a vital center of Southern growth; North Carolina is increasingly significant in its impact on political trends. We are proud of our city, of our state, and we would like to share our excitement with you.

There is much more we would like to say. But, for now, can you, will you, please do - COME! We want you as a charming personality who would add grace to our efforts to encourage the arts.


