Dear John:

Throughout the period of steadily worsening relations between the United States and Panama it has been my policy to try and separate the day-to-day operation and maintenance of the Canal from the political dispute and to emphasize its role as an international waterway dedicated to serving world commerce. We have been moderately successful in this effort.

I believe this policy can best be maintained by holding the July meeting of the Board of Directors at a location other than Washington or Panama, where political and governmental pressures are less prevalent. Therefore, I plan to convene the meeting in Savannah, Georgia on July 13 and 14.

By having the meeting in Savannah. I hope to avoid the situation that occurred in April When that cancellation caused us some operational problems and some delays in accomplishing certain tasks. A July meeting is essential in that decisions on the budget and on a number of other matters to ensure the continued efficient operation of the Canal are required.

SUBJECT: Drugs-Noriega-Panama

Several threads coming together would indicate a coordinated FG006/2 move this week by Congressional Demorats on what they perceive as an Administration vulnerability on the question of drug activities by Panama's General Noriega.

Yesterday, the Democrat candidate for President emphasized (and the networks highlighted on their news programs) <u>allegations</u> that (1) U.S. intelligence agencies had Noriega on the payroll while knowing that Noriega was engaged in drug activities and (2) the Administration has tried to conceal from Congress information on Noriega drug activities.

Tomorrow afternoon, the House Foreign Affairs Committee is holding hearings on <u>allegations</u> that the NSC held up the semiannual report on foreign officials' drug activities to try to avoid reporting to Congress on General Noriega's drug activities.


Late tomorrow, or more likely on Thursday, the House is expected to vote on the <u>Alexander "Anti-Stonewalling" Amendment</u> to the Drug bill that would give the General Accounting Office (GAO) and all committees of Congress a statutory right of access to information possessed by executive agencies concerning foreign illegal drug activities. Congressman Alexander explains his amendment as a response to GAO's inability to get access to certain records in its investigation (requested by Alexander) into allegations that the Drug Enforcement Administration did not receive information on Noriega drug activities possessed by U.S. intelligence agencies.

Rumors abound among House Republican Leadership staff that House Democrats may introduce in the House a resolution of inquiry into the Panama-Noriega-Drugs allegations, but no such resolution has yet been introduced.

Attached for your information is a copy of the letter sent to the House leadership recently by Attorney General Thornburgh and Director of Central Intelligence Webster in opposition to the Alexander "Anti-Stonewalling Act" Amendment.

Dear Mr. Speaker:

The Administration strongly supports and urges Congress to act swiftly to adopt effective and responsible legislation to combat drug abuse. United States law enforcement and intelligence agencies have devoted and will continue to devote substantial efforts toward achievement of the vital national objective of halting the flow of illegal drugs.

The amendment proposed to be offered by Congressman Bill Alexander to the Omnibus Drug Initiative Act of 1988 (H.R. 5210) will weaken the hand of the United States in the battle against illegal drugs. The Alexander Amendment is both unwise and impermissibly encroaches on the President's constitutional authority.

The amendment requires Executive Branch personnel obtaining information about "illegal foreign drug activities" to forward such information promptly to the head of their agencies. In turn, the agency heads must furnish it to law enforcement agencies specially designated by the President and, upon request, to any committee of the Congress or the General Accounting Office (GAO). If the agency head personally determines that disclosure of the information risks specified damage to national security or law enforcement interests, he need not disclose the demanded information to a congressional committee, but he nevertheless must furnish it to the GAO. The amendment also provides for lawsuits by the GAO against Federal agencies to secure information covered by its provisions.

The Alexander amendment would diminish the ability of the United States to collect narcotics intelligence. Sources of foreign narcotics intelligence, including cooperating foreign government agencies, would be less likely to share sensitive narcotics intelligence with U.S. agencies if it must be disseminated on demand to the General Accounting Office and, in many cases, to multiple congressional committees. The proper executive-legislative arrangements for handling sensitive narcotics intelligence in a responsible and secure fashion are those specified by Title V of the National Security Act of 1947, under which the Director of Central Intelligence and the heads of intelligence agencies keep the congressional intelligence committees fully and currently informed of intelligence activities, including narcotics intelligence.

The prospect of lawsuits between the GAO and intelligence agencies over some of the most sensitive national security information in the possession of the United States presents a substantial danger of unauthorized disclosure of sensitive information. Congress recognized this danger when it enacted the General Accounting Office Act of 1980 that provided for the exemption of intelligence information from the GAO's current authority to bring suits to obtain information.

The inter-agency reporting requirements established by the amendment will disrupt effective, carefully crafted mechanisms for secure dissemination of narcotics intelligence within the U.S. Government. These mechanisms ensure that sensitive narcotics intelligence is disseminated to law enforcement agencies and that the information is properly protected from unauthorized disclosure.

In addition to its practical flaws, the amendment impermissibly encroaches on the powers of the President under the Constitution to faithfully execute the laws, to supervise his subordinates in the Executive Branch, to preserve the integrity of executive deliberations, and to protect national security information.

We urge the House not to adopt the Alexander Amendment.

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



Further, in keeping with the spirit of our war against drugs, I have ordered that Panama be subject to intensified scrutiny by our Immigration and Customs Services in order to apprehend drug traffickers and money launderers. Moreover, because we recognize President Delvalle as the lawful Head of Government in Panama, I have directed that all departments and agencies inventory all sources of funds due or payable to the Republic of Panama from the U.S. Government, for purposes of determining those that should be placed in escrow for the Delvalle Government on behalf of the Panamanian people. In that light, I have directed that certain payments due to Panama from the Panama Canal Commission be placed in escrow immediately. This step is in complete compliance with our obligations under the terms of the Panama Canal Treaties. I am prepared to take additional steps, if necessary, to deny the transfer of funds to the Noriega regime from other sources in the U.S.

There is a good chance the Panama decisions will leak on Thursday evening. Certainly, "principles only" NSPG is no guarantee against those leaks. We therefore recommend you go ahead with the announcement of the Panama actions on Friday, March 11.

We recommend the following press plan:

- Issue a statement by the President explaining the over-all purpose of the actions.
- Release a fact sheet on each of the specific actions taken, which includes information on the impact and timing of the moves.
- Release these materials at the White House at 10 o'clock Friday.
- 4) Release of the Presidential statement would be accompanied by either:
 - A background briefing by the President's National Security Advisor,
 - or
 - b) An on-the-record, on-camera briefing by the Secretary of State.

Either briefing should be in the White House Press Room.

We will explore with Chuck Redman whether or not Secretary Shultz would be interested in doing such a briefing at the White House.
