Subject: Presidential Proclamation on the 190th Anniversary of the Polish Constitution

We strongly urge that the President not issue a proclamation on the 190th Anniversary of the Polish May 3 Constitution.

As our Embassy has just reported, this weekend's May Day observances in Poland will be paired, for the first time in postwar Polish history, with observances of the May 3 constitution. The resultant dilution of the "international" Communist character of May Day with the nationalist, anti-Russian symbolism of the May 3 constitution will be a further cause of concern to the Soviets and perhaps be used by them as further ammunition to attack the Polish leadership. To link the President with the May 3 observances within Poland could complicate the efforts of the Polish leadership to foster reconciliation and make it easier for the Soviets to imply that the observances were the result of Western "interference" rather than a spontaneous manifestation of Polish national unity.

The ongoing, so far bloodless, revolution in Poland is still very fragile. Our aim should not be to capitalize on it for short-term gain but rather to help bring it to full fruition. The consolidation of this Polish "renewal" would have long-term profound implications for the United States, the Polish people, the rest of Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union itself. We can best contribute to this consolidation by continuing to exercise public restraint.

We are unaware of any postwar American President issuing such a proclamation. Nor are we aware of any interest in such a proclamation by the major Polish-American leaders and organizations such as the Polish American Congress. These major organizations support our current policy of maintaining a lowkey political profile while providing economic assistance to help feed the Polish people and consolidate the gains they have made in recent months.

SUBJECT:

190th Anniversary of the Polish Constitution

Without passing judgment on the specific language used in the proposed Presidential proclamation, I can confirm that the Polish Constitution of May 3, 1791, is indeed a document of great importance in the history of constitutional and parliamentary government. It was issued under conditions which very much resemble those of today, namely direct Russian pressure which the Poles sought to overcome (in vain, as it turned out) by democratic internal reforms.

It would be most fitting for the President to issue a proclamation that would honor both this historic event and those Poles who today are seeking to restore freedom to their country.

I recommend that we ask the Department of State to draft an appropriate proclamation.

That the request made in the letter at Tab A be passed to the Department of State for prompt action.

- WHEREAS the Polish Constitution of May Third was the first to follow the Constitution of the United States and was formulated using the principles of parliamentary government and established the basis for Western democracy and, as such, pioneered the development of democratic freedoms in Europe, and
- WHEREAS Generals Kosciuszko and Pulaski are inseparable from the American Revolution and today Polish-Americans serve and defend the Constitution of the United States of America, and
- WHEREAS nearly fifteen million Americans today take pride in their Polish Heritage and to them the Constitution of May Third expresses the Polish love of freedom shared by all free men living in a democracy,
- NOW, THEREFORE, I, RONALD REAGAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby designate Sunday, May 3, 1981, as Polish Constitution Day of May Third, a day of the invincible Polish traditions held in the quest of freedom and democracy.
- IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand this twenty-seventh day of April, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and eighty-one, and of the Independence of the United States of America, the two hundred and fifth.

Dear Mr. Piszek:

The President has asked me to thank you for your letter of May 26. He fully shares your concern over the critical food shortages in Poland and wholeheartedly supports "Food for Poland." It is the President's firm belief that private sector food aid is especially important for it promotes a strong friendship between the Polish and American peoples and underscores our commitment to Poland's well-being.

The Administration is also strongly committed to fostering stability within Poland by providing both agricultural and economic assistance. In the current fiscal year \$670 million in Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) credits has been extended to Poland. Of this amount, already over \$500 million has been utilized. Moreover, in April, the Administration agreed to sell Poland 30,000 tons of butter and 30,000 tons of dried milk at concessional prices, with payment in Polish currency. As you may know, this year the United States is the largest single Western supplier of food and agricultural commodities to Poland.

Once again, thank you for your expressed concern.

Dear Mr. President:

I returned from a four day trip to Poland. While there I visited with U.S. Ambassador Meehan, Prime Minister of Poland Jaruzelski, Deputy Prime Minister of Poland Oznowski, Primate Wyszynski, President of Polish Bishops, Bishop Dambrowski and Lech Walesa of Solidarity.

The people seem cool, calm and go about their business. There is no mention or indication that a total tragedy is possible. I have been travelling to Poland every few months for almost 20 years.

The three sectors of the Polish society, the Government, Solidarity and the Church, plus Polish Ambassador Spasowski in Washington asked me in writing six weeks ago to do all I could to get free nutritious food sent to Poland. There is a most serious shortage of food in Poland due to devastating floods as well as their internal situation.

The American Agricultural Movement, a group of U.S.A. family farmers has pledged two billion pounds of nutritious food. American food corporations are also pledging large quantities of food. American labor unions, the Catholic Church and others are raising the money needed to transport the food from its origin to the port cities for Polish ships to transport the food to Poland.

Possibly "Food for Poland" can prevent anarchy in Poland and thus defuse a great potential catastrophe. Food for Poland may defuse the start of the third world war. Food may be the 21st century's method of solving international crises.

Poland is not asking for guns. Poland is not asking for fighter planes. Poland is not asking for anti-tank weapons. Poland is politely asking for "Food for Poland."

Mr. President, your problems are monumental, how dare a citizen bring you yet another problem. Maybe "Food for Poland" is not a problem but an opportunity for America.

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

Lech Walesa, the head of Polish Solidarity is scheduled to visit the United States as a guest of AFL/CIO in mid-November. His plans call for spending November 18 and 19 in Washington. He and his close advisors are very eager for you to receive him in the White House as a symbolic expression of support for the movement of patriotic and democratic forces in Poland. Walesa in particular wishes to discuss the possibility of U.S. financial assistance and food aid, preferably in a private meeting with only an interpreter present.

While Communist media will undoubtedly seize on such a visit as an opportunity to "prove" U.S. "interference" in internal Polish affairs this need not deter us: they have been doing so for months in any event. With the Polish Government going over to the offensive, Solidarity feels hard pressed and needs all the moral support it can get. Walesa represents the more moderate (realistic) forces in the trade union which has nearly 10 million members and with families and dependents includes perhaps two-thirds of the Polish nation. R

To refuse a meeting with Walesa would be interpreted by Solidarity, by Moscow, as well as by the Polish-American community as a deliberate snub to the movement which he heads, and a signal that it can be repressed without significant U.S. objections. (C)

I strongly endorse Al Haig's recommendation (Tab A) that you meet privately with Walesa during his visit to Washington, November 18-19. (N)

Lech Walesa plans to visit the United States, and his advance man, Andrzej Celinski, has just informed the Department that Walesa wants to meet with you. I plan to meet with him, and given his importance as a symbol of Poland's and Eastern Europe's striving for greater freedom and democracy, I think you should see him for at least fifteen minutes. He will probably also want to see ranking Members of Congress.

Walesa is being invited by the AFL/CIO to attend the AFL/CIO convention in New York, and will deliver a speech there on the morning of November 17. He plans to be in Washington on November 18 and 19. Walesa also plans to visit Philadelphia, Chicago and Detroit.

Celinski states that Walesa's primary purpose in requesting a meeting with you is to seek U.S. food aid and financial assistance. According to Celinski, Walesa wants to meet with you privately -- with only a translator present.

The most important commercial event in Poland is the yearly trade fair in Poznan. The American presence at this fair is usually quite large, with U.S. businesses purchasing space in the American Pavilion. This year, as a result of Poland's economic difficulties, only a handful of U.S. firms participated. Because we felt that a significant U.S. presence would have important symbolic value at this highly visible event in underscoring American interest in Poland, USICA prepared an exhibit on American farming for the Poznan show.

Among the distinguished visitors to our exhibit was labor leader Lech Walesa. He examined the displays in great detail and was visibly impressed by the choice of equipment and information available to the American farmer. Walesa warmly praised the exhibit and was obviously very pleased with what he had seen.
