This year marks the 350th anniversary of the arrival of two ships sent by the Kingdom of Sweden to the North American continent. The ships carried settlers who established the first permanent settlement of Swedes on the continent, New Sweden, along the Cristina River in what is now the State of Delaware. Swedish settlers were instrumental in founding the United States; John Morton of Pennsylvania, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, was of Swedish descent, as was John Hanson of Maryland, who presided over the Continental Congress from 1781 through 1782.

More than one million Swedes immigrated to the United States between 1845 and 1930. Americans of Swedish descent have made important contributions to American culture, including contributions to the development of government, business, education, and the arts. More than four million Americans of Swedish descent are living in the United States today. Our Nation and Sweden have always enjoyed close relations on the basis of many shared values.

By Senate Joint Resolution 289, the Congress has designated 1988 as the "Year of New Sweden," and has authorized and requested the President to issue a proclamation calling for its observance.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RONALD REAGAN, President of the United States of America, do hereby proclaim 1988 as the Year of New Sweden. I call upon the Governors of the several States, the chief officials of local governments, and the people of the United States to observe such year with appropriate ceremonies and activities.

Dear Mr. President:

As I complete my third year as your Ambassador to Sweden,
I wish you to know how much I appreciate this opportunity
to serve in your administration. This assignment and
what we have accomplished in building this Embassy into
a center of positive influence for the historic advances
America is making at home and in the world, is proving to
be the crowning achievement of my life.

Reviewing the situation, our work here is not finished.
We face a major test in the Swedish elections this fall.
For the first time in over fifty years, the conservatives
here are shaping the issues and have a good chance to take
over the government. As they have moved ahead in the
polls, however, the philosophy and achievements of your
administration, on which they model themselves, are
coming into the open as the agenda on which Swedes will
vote. The attraction of "The Reagan Revolution" for
young Swedes, blue collar as well as those in business
and the professions, has alarmed the socialists. It
tempts them into ill-conceived attacks on us.

I have had to caution Prime Minister Palme firmly against
dragging the United States and our bilateral relations into
the heated campaign. He, and the leaders of the nonsocialist
parties to whom I have given the same warning, promise
me that they will not stoop to such folly. Palme maintains
that our relations are excellent, the Embassy the best
in thirty years, and he does not wish to harm that. Even
on his best behavior, however, we have our work cut out
for us in keeping relations on an even keel through the
elections and the settling in of the next government.
There will be far-reaching changes in Sweden, whoever
forms that government. The signals we send will weigh
heavily.



Concluding my review of matters, I offer my continued service as your ambassador through this period of challenge to what we have accomplished and to the unfinished work we have to do. My senior counselors from the Foreign Service have given me their commitment to continue. They share my pride that we form a team of appointee and career professionals which, in contrast to the negative images the media dole on, is a positive model of what we Americans can do in the conduct of our relations abroad.

If it is your assessment that continuity in our representation here accords at this time with other interests and considerations of your administration, I would be pleased to remain in service here.
