

Dear President Reagan:

The last time I was in Tanzania as a guest - such being the country I helped most by setting up colleges, universities and a national library system going back to the early days of "uhuru", i.e. Independence - upon being taken to many of its units of higher education as well as both the University of Dar es Salaam and the new Sokoine University of Agriculture in Morogoro I came onto the idea that with Tanganyika having been a British Colony, thus finding members of faculty and its students able to read English, and remembering that American colleges, universities and all our public libraries discard many books in good condition and of classic subjects each year to get more recent editions, the greatest help we could submit to Tanzania - thus helping to raise the academic life of their people up to our level (important because the country is made up of over one hundred tribes), and to insure the stability of governance - would be to have our periodically discarded books picked up by the U. S. Postal Service and taken down to the Lykes Line center in New Orleans, and once or twice a year simply pay for Lykes freighters to make delivery, and if we also loaned Tanzania small computer units, in less than five years would find the country raised up to our level at far less cost than any other plan!

I presented this plan to Messrs. F. Gilbert and Schulman, the USAID Director and his assistant, in the Martin Luther Building of Dar es Salaam, who felt it was a great idea!

Coming on to the present, I want you to know that many government people in Tanzania continue to circulate my hopes that we can help them, and as a sample of the reaction of support by education groups, herewith attached is a copy of a recent aerogramme which moved me to dictate this letter.

Finally, Ronald, with both you and me being conservatives, I feel certain you will be morally moved to help Tanzania in the way I suggest with such a nearly costless plan, and closing with not only good wishes for the New Year but indicating my being prepared to serve Africa, I remain,



SUBJECT: Mwinyi Visit Cancellation: Memorandum to Ryan

We were very disappointed by Tanzanian President Mwinyi's May 31 decision to regret President Reagan's invitation to make an official working visit on July 25. The disappointment was all the greater in view of Mwinyi's informal acceptance of the July 25th date two weeks earlier. I have prepared a memorandum from you to Fred Ryan giving the chronology and background to this unfortunate development.

You will recall I sent a PROFS note to you and Marybel Batjer in Moscow suggesting the possibility of Malian President Traore substituting for Mwinyi on July 25. Traore has recently been elected President of the Organization of African Unity for 1988-89. It is customary for the OAU President to make an official visit to the United States. Traore has never had such a visit during his 20 years in power, and has indicated a strong desire to be invited. I realize that we have batted zero so far on African official visits in 1988, unlike 1987 which was a banner year. Nevertheless, I feel we should not give up despite the run of bad luck. I feel Traore could be a winner.


