Dear Mr. President:

The observance of Latvian Independence Day this November 18, 1981 marks the 63rd anniversary of the founding of the democratic Latvian Republic. It is also the 31st year that the Latvian Republic has been forcibly occupied and ruled by the Soviet Union.

Like its neighbors, Estonia and Lithuania, Latvia emerged from centuries of foreign domination following the chaos of World War I and the Russian Revolution. For the first time in its history, on November 18, 1918, Latvia was declared a free and sovereign nation. An active participant in the world community, Latvia made major advances in industry, agriculture, commerce and education during its years of independence.

However, the secret 1939 Molotov-Ribentrop Pact, between Stalin and Hitler, effectively ended that independence. Within a year, Soviet tanks rolled in to enforce that pact and Latvia's 22 years of independence.

As the result of national resistance to Soviet occupation, the Soviet annexation of 1940 not only terminated independence, but also led to massive deportations and executions. National political, religious and business leaders, as well as entire families, including pregnant women and children, were sent to exile and death in Siberian labor camps.

Subsequently, the Latvian language has been replaced with Russian, all national cultural activities have been strictly limited, the religious freedom has been severely curtailed. In addition, a huge postwar influx of Russians has added to the Soviet plan of total Russianization of the nations. These and other activities on the part of the Soviet regime continue to threaten the very survival of Latvians as a distinct people.

The United States, as well as most other free Western nations, have never accorded diplomatic recognition to the Soviet annexation of Latvia. Every President, from Roosevelt to Reagan, has emphasized the right of Latvia to restituted sovereignty. Recently, the creation of the Congressional Ad Hoc Committee of the Baltic States and Ukraine further demonstrates this concern on the part of the American people.

This November 18th, Latvians in Europe, Australia, New Zealand and North and South America will pause to reflect on this bittersweet day in Latvian history.

In Soviet-occupied Latvia, however, the streets and auditoriums will be silent, and the Soviet Secret Police will be more vigilant than ever. For the Russians understand all too well the importance of this day, and make special effort to stifle any public displays of Latvian patriotism. But you can be assured that families throughout Latvia will silently observe their nation's birthday - and will dream of the day when it will rise again from the ashes of Russian occupation.

There are over 100,000 Latvian-Americans living in the United States. They have a deep respect for the tradition of freedom their adopted country represents. While human rights for all mankind is very dear to them, they feel particularly concerned that the plight of their nation, culture and language not go ignored by the free world.

Because we believe that life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness are rights of all men and women...and because these rights continue to be brutally abused in the Soviet-occupied Baltic States...we also ask that additional, concrete steps be taken in presenting and resolving the issue of self-determination for Latvia, Lithuania and Estonia.

To this end, we urge the Government of the United States to use all means possible to ensure that:

- 1. The United States publicly reaffirm its policy of nonrecognition regarding the Soviet-occupied Baltic States whenever possible or appropriate.
- The U.S. State Department formally pursue the matter of documented crimes against humanity committed by the leadership of the Soviet Union in the Baltic States.
- 3. The United States demand at international forums (United Nations Security Council or General Assembly) and in bilateral talks with the Soviet Union the issue of self-determination for the Baltic States.
- 4. Positive and effective action from the Genocide Commission of the United Nations to deal with flagrant and continuing Soviet violations of U.N. principles.

5. The full and true story of Soviet atorcities in the Baltic States - both past and present - be told.

PETITION

Expressing the unanimous and firm intentions of the Latvian people, we urge the delegates of all 35 nations to donate their valuable time and turn all of their attention to the tragic situation which exists in Latvia today.

The Baltic nations are the only dark spot on the map of Europe, the only nations, which after World War II still remain under the yoke of foreign occupation. It would be unbelievably painful and unfair, if during this European peace forum time could not be found to discuss the past, present, and future of our long-suffering peoples.

The past 40 years under Soviet occupation has cost our nations approximately 500,000 lives!! To avert further bloodshed, we urge you to immediately establish an INTERNATIONAL COMMISSION, which in great detail would get acquainted with the conditions existing in 1940 when in the Baltic States simultaneously legally established governments were overthrown by invading Soviet armed forces and our countries were incorporated into the Soviet Union.

We have at our disposal many convincing documents (the contents of which are no secret to anyone), which clearly show that the aforementioned events constitute a brutal and odious occupation of the Baltic States. The only course which we can take to further prevent the tragic consequences of the Soviet government's regime is a NATIONAL REFERENDUM under international

out the necessity for such a referendum and to bring it to a conclusion.

Particular emphasis should be put on Moscow's all encompassing goal: the Russification of the Latvian people. Throughout the republic many massive industrial complexes are being rapidly constructed along with many housing facilities for the workers. The bulk of the building is being completed by military units and labor camp inmates. Every year, tens of thousands of Russians move permanently into these newly constructed living quarters. The chief language in Latvia is now Russian - and Soviet Latvia's government's leader A. Voss does not speak the Latvian language. Most leading positions in all facets of life are filled by Russians. The people have been refused fundamental human rights and political freedoms.

Russification is not the road to peace and well-being of the oppressed Latvians, but a national, social and moral disaster.

As you read our petition you can feel safe and secure. However against us, the publication of this document will bring about an extensive, repressive campaign by the KGB. Years spent in prison, psychiatric hospitalization... and therefore, we ask your total support in this life and death situation: DO WE HAVE THE RIGHT TO EXIST? May the Latvian Independence Movement and the Democratic Youth Committee continue its struggle and work? Are our endeavors towards freedom for our nation a crime? Or are they our right?

MADRID, THE ENTIRE LATVIAN NATION IS IMPATIENTLY AWAITING YOUR ANSWER!

The Latvian people have complete confidence in the Latvian-emigrant representatives. Only they and no one else may represent our interests at the European peace conference.

We believe that the task ahead of you will essentially contribute to our small nation's struggle for independence and freedom!

During these days we will be with you - delegates, freedom fighters and patriots. We wish you courage, unity and success!

Dear Mr. Pavlovskis:

I have been asked by Mr. Jack Burgess to reply to your mailgram of April 1 requesting information about the travel to Latvia by a member of the staff of the American Consulate General in Leningrad. I would also like to use this occasion to respond to the mailgram that you sent me.

Mr. Silins travelled to Riga in mid-February as part of the routine travels by members of the staff at the Consulate General in Leningrad to the Baltic nations. While in Riga, Mr. Silins met with the Deputy Chairman of the Riga City Executive Committee. We have no information at this time indicating that Mr. Silins visited the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Latvian SSR, but we would like to assure you that such contacts for purely consular business are in full accord with U.S. policy guidelines governing travel to the Baltic states. Calls on consular officials in the Baltic states are a legitimate responsibility of U.S. consular officers, as their purpose is to extend assistance and protection to American citizens. It is the position of the United States Government that these calls do not constitute a derogation of the nonrecognition policy.

An important element of our non-recognition policy is the fact that our Ambassador in Moscow and Cabinet-level officers of the U.S. Government do not visit the Baltic states. In actuality we extend this policy to officials of the U.S. Government at the Assistant Secretary level and above. As Deputy Principal Officer of the Consulate General in Leningrad, Mr. Silins is considered a lower-level official.

Dear Doctor Dimants:

This is in response to your recent letter to President Reagan concerning the plight of Latvian Catholics, especially Bishop Kazimirs Dulbinskis, who has been denied the right to perform his pastoral duties by the Soviet authorities. We deplore the harsh treatment of religious believers by the Soviet regime and attempt to follow such cases as closely as possible. The repression of Bishop Dulbinskis marks him as a true victim of the crackdown on religious dissent in the Soviet Union.

We take advantage of every appropriate opportunity to call for an end to Soviet persecution of religious believers and to bring such abuses of human rights to international attention. These matters are raised frequently by our delegations at the UN Human Rights Commission and other international conferences. In private diplomatic exchanges we have made clear to the Soviets that their violations of human rights constitute a major obstacle to improved U.S.-Soviet relations.

Unfortunately, the Soviet Government has not been responsive to our efforts, or to those of other concerned governments or human rights organizations. Despite their nominal assent to numerous international agreements guaranteeing religious freedom, the Soviets persist in maintaining that the incarceration or mistreatment of religious leaders and dissidents is exclusively an internal policy matter. While our condemnation of such arbitrary and inhumane behavior is well known to Soviet officials, our ability to alter the situation is very limited.

We appreciate your interest in the plight of Bishop Dulbinskis. Please be assured that we will take every appropriate opportunity to express our concern over the restrictions imposed on Bishop Dulbinskis and other Latvian Catholics by the Soviet authorities.

- d/ The religious instruction has been denied to the childeren and young people.
- e/ People who are performing their religious duties are being persecuted by the Soviet authorities.

The American Latvian Catholic Congress is asking you to help in securing all and full rights for Bishop Kazimins Dulbinskis to perform his pastoral and episcopal duties in full and the restoration of human rights and religious freedoms to all Latvian Catholics in Soviet occupied Latvia.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing in response to your letter to the Secretary concerning H.Con.Res. 209 expressing the sense of the Congress with respect to demonstrations in Latvia commemorating Latvian Independence Day.

The Department of State is committed to furthering the cause of human rights, which includes the right of free expression. We believe that movement toward greater freedom of expression in the Soviet Union would not only accord with international human rights obligations, but would also be an important step toward developing an atmosphere conducive to stable, secure relations with other nations.

We had viewed with cautious optimism last summer's demonstrations in Latvia, which were allowed to proceed relatively unhindered. Since your letter was received, it has become clear that the Soviet government was willing to go to great lengths to see that the November 18 demonstrations failed. It is not encouraging to see this return to traditional Soviet resistance to free public expression.

The Secretary's determination to keep the issue of human rights at the forefront of our relationship with the Soviet Union is well known. The Secretary and other Department officials have taken advantage of every appropriate contact with Soviet officials to point out the importance of improvement in this area. You can be certain that this emphasis on human rights will continue.
