In addition to AIDS, which HHS is addressing, and SDI, which I am sure that you are addressing, I wanted to alert you to a number of other science issues with France which may come up in the President's meeting with Prime Minister Chirac on March 31st. These issues are sufficiently important that the senior staff ought to be aware of them in any case.

The U.S. and France conduct a biennial high-level review of our bilateral S&T activities. The next meeting is tentatively scheduled for September. I would welcome any suggestions for agenda items.

Attached are brief status reports and suggested talking points on the following items:

- . Space: (a) space station
(b) TOPEX
- . Human Frontier
- . Nuclear Fusion

SUPERCONDUCTING SUPER COLLIDER

Status:

A conceptual design for the Superconducting Super Collider (SSC) was evaluated and approved by the Department of Energy in 1986 for technical feasibility, estimated cost, and construction schedule. The SSC will be the next logical step in the U.S. high energy physics research program--a proton-proton collider with a total center-of-mass energy of 40 TeV and high rate of events, enabling the observation of events which may lead to a more fundamental understanding of the origin of matter.

The SSC will consist of two adjacent storage rings which contain counter-rotating 20 TeV beams of protons in an underground tunnel 52 miles in circumference. These high energy proton beams will collide in six interaction regions where large detectors will analyze the collision products in order to learn more about the fundamental constituents of matter and the forces that act on them. The SSC will need approximately 10,000 superconducting magnets to guide the proton beams in their orbits and to the points of collision.

The SSC construction project has been endorsed by the President and the issue is now before Congress in the FY 1988 budget. There will be a site solicitation made public in the first week of April, 1987 with proposals to be into the Department of Energy by August, 1987. These will then be considered by the National Academies of Sciences and Engineering, who will forward a "short list" to the Administration by December of 1987.

Talking Points

We know there is interest by French high energy physicists in using the SSC. This is certainly welcome.

1. The U.S. has participated in the construction of detectors and the research at CERN in high energy physics, but not the construction of the CERN accelerators. Some U.S. investigators feel that as a consequence they have been left out of the most exciting experiments and breakthroughs.
2. We invite France to participate in the construction and use of the SSC.

VERY LARGE TELESCOPE PROJECT

STATUS: France, FRG, and Italy plan a joint effort to build an assembly of four 8-meter optical telescopes at the European Southern Observatory in Chile. Each of these telescopes would be larger than the Palomar mirror, and the four could be coupled together. The French have indicated that they will probably be seeking cooperation from other countries, including the US, for this project.

The technology behind this concept has been under development in the US for many years. NSF is currently supporting the development of technology to enable the construction of 8-meter glass mirrors, but that capability is still a few years in the future. The current US concept is to build four 8-meter glass mirrors, all in the same mount, so that they would function as a unit. The facility would otherwise be similar to the proposed European installation, but in the northern hemisphere.

TALKING POINTS:

1. The European consortium's project will be a very important new tool for astronomy.
2. Current thinking calls for a location in the northern hemisphere for the US telescope. With a US telescope in the north and a European telescope in the south, astronomers in the two hemispheres could swap time.
3. By allowing coverage of the heavens from both hemispheres, this arrangement would do more to advance astronomy than would the US's simply supporting a share of the European project in Chile.

NUCLEAR FUSION

STATUS: EC participants in the Joint European Tokamak (JET) project have been concerned that the US, following up on the President's remarks at the Geneva Summit, might develop a bilateral agreement with the Soviets without consulting the European partners. In a meeting on March 13, Dr. Frejacques, the head of the CNRS (equivalent to our NSF), and Dr. Graham, the President's Science Adviser, agreed that the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) was the appropriate forum for cooperation with the Soviets.

The International Torus (INTOR) program under sponsorship of the IAEA began some ten years ago as a multilateral fusion research effort. European, US, and Soviet designers contributed jointly to the first phase of a design which was completed about five years ago. However, some now question whether the 5-year-old design is still appropriate, or should be modified in light of recent technological developments.

TALKING POINT:

1. We can work through the existing multilateral mechanisms of the IAEA to pursue multilateral cooperation in nuclear fusion that includes the Soviets.

HUMAN FRONTIERS

STATUS: The Japanese have mounted a vigorous international public relations campaign to drum up support among Summit partners for their Human Frontiers Science Program, a Japanese initiative which Nakasone may propose at the Venice Economic Summit. The Program is described as an international cooperative effort in basic research, focusing on biological processes with long range potential for industrial technologies. Japan sees this as a long term program, on the order of 20 years, with Japan contributing "no less than 50 per cent of the total cost".

The Summit partners, including France, are wary of the Human Frontiers idea, reserving judgment until Japan provides more specifics about subject areas. Some partners have voiced suspicion that this is yet another camouflage for Japan to buy the fruits of other countries' costly investments in basic research infrastructure. Japan, for its part, has been slow to tie the grand Human Frontiers vision down to specifics, asserting that it will seek international consensus to fill in the particulars.

TALKING POINTS:

1. The US would welcome proof that the Japanese are serious about increasing their contribution to the world's basic research effort.
2. We think it would be appropriate for the Japanese to assume full financial responsibility for the program during the formative years.

SPACE STATION

Status

The current technical concept for Space Station is based on more than three years of extensive definition and technology development. The cost estimate for the Space Station has grown. A plan to review this increase and study possible alternatives to reduce this cost growth is being worked by the Administration. The requests for industry proposals, for the detailed design and construction phases, are expected to be issued by NASA soon.

The intergovernmental negotiations of our international partners--Canada, ESA and Japan--are underway. The negotiations were delayed briefly when the Department of Defense became involved. While DOD has not identified specific requirements for use of the Space Station, they want to be sure that they are not precluded from access.

Talking Points

- o The U.S. will proceed with the Space Station which we consider to be the centerpiece of our civil space program.
- o The Department of Defense will have access to the Space Station for activities consistent with our Outer Space Treaties.
- o The U.S. desires and welcomes international participation in the Space Station. We want the current international negotiations to succeed. At the same time, we expect to exercise a leadership role in the station, consistent with our contribution to the program.

TOPEX/POSEIDON

Status:

The Ocean Topography Experiment (TOPEX/POSEIDON) is a joint U.S.-French satellite planned to be launched into a 1300 km orbit by Ariane, in 1991. The payload consists of radar devices to measure the attitude of the spacecraft above the ocean, and supplementary instruments to help interpret the radar altimeter data. The French will make two contributions. One, called POSEIDON, is an altimeter, and the other is their satellite tracking system. The TOPEX/POSEIDON program is designed to provide significant capabilities for remote sensing of the ocean's global circulation as well as its variability. Congress has given approval for the U.S. portion of the program to proceed, and France has approved their portion of the program. Contractors have been selected for the U.S. provided spacecraft and instrumentation. All issues between the U.S. and France have been resolved, and it is expected that the Memorandum of Understanding will have been signed by the time Chirac meets the President.

Talking Points:

The U.S. will proceed with its portion of the ocean topography satellite experiment, called TOPEX, consisting of the satellite, a portion of the altimeter and the supplementary instruments. We are pleased that we will be working with France. There is a strong mutual interest between French and U.S. scientists to study the oceans from space. The flight of TOPEX would provide oceanographers with their first opportunity to observe circulation on a global scale, thus permitting a fundamental breakthrough in our knowledge of how the overall oceanic system functions. This is essential if we are to understand the influence of interactions between the ocean environment and society; climate changes, fisheries, commerce, and waste disposal.

Andre Rossinot, President of the center-right Radical party and also the Mayor of Nancy, will be in Washington in February 26 and 27. Rossinot is also Minister for Relations with Parliament in the Chirac Government. Ambassador Rodgers has taken a special interest in Rossinot's trip and has endorsed Rossinot's requests for the following appointments.

Courtesy Call on the Vice President: We will pursue this directly with the Vice President's staff through a Platt-Gregg memo.

White House Congressional Liaison: Rossinot would be interested in meeting with the senior White House aide who does liaison with Congress.

Courtesy Call on the First Lady: Rossinot is the mayor of Nancy, which is apparently known for its roses. Local rose growers have developed a "Nancy" rose named in honor of Mrs. Reagan. Mrs. Rossinot, who is active in support of anti-drug and drug rehabilitation programs in Nancy, would like to present a sample of the "Nancy" rose to Mrs. Reagan in a brief photo-opportunity.

Ambassador Rodgers has met with Rossinot and has endorsed his requests for appointments. Ambassador Rodgers believes the call on the First Lady would be appropriate, given the shared interest in anti-drug programs. The "rose" angle would also make a nice photo op. I understand from the Ambassador's office that there is apparently a greenhouse area near the Rose Garden, where such a photo op might occur.

Since we have no routine channel for dealing with the First Lady's staff, I would appreciate your inquiring of them whether such a photo op might be possible. If they would like to talk personally to Ambassador Rodgers, I'm sure that can be arranged.



June 6, 1987

Mr. President:

I thank you sincerely for sharing with me your thoughts and your plans at a time when you are preparing, as I did, to attend the ceremonies marking the 750th anniversary of Berlin.

I believe, like you, that it is essential for the allied powers to seize every opportunity to reaffirm the significance of their presence in Berlin which, as I discovered, most Berliners understand very well. The younger generations, however, did not experience the tragic events of the past and are perhaps not as sensitive to this.

For this reason, I was anxious to place particular emphasis during my May 11 visit on the commitment of the Allies to maintaining and enhancing the bonds between Berlin and the Federal Republic of Germany, as well as their vital obligation to ensure the freedom and the security of Berliners wherever our authority is exercised, especially with respect to protecting a permanent point of access to Berlin from the Federal Republic.

In the same spirit, I stressed Berlin's historic role of serving as a bridge spanning different worlds, a center of exchange and dialogue dedicated to bringing what was divided closer together.

There can be no doubt that affirming the interest of the United States in new initiatives involving exchanges of young people or athletic events organized jointly in the two parts of the city would be most welcome. A declaration in this respect could only strengthen the Berliners' conviction that the allies understand and support their hopes of overcoming the division imposed upon them.

Anything you would be able to say regarding your desire for improved air service to Berlin as well as other means of access to the city would also be well received.

The idea of initiating talks with the Soviets on changes in the air corridors or on opening new air routes to West Berlin would in my view raise sensitive issues and entail risks. Yet, I would have no objection if an in-depth examination of these issues were undertaken with our British and German partners.

I hope that your visit to Berlin will be successful and that it will reveal to all the commitment of the Western allies to ensuring Berlin a future of peace, well-being, and freedom.

Accept, Mr. President, the assurances of my very high consideration and my best wishes for the success of this trip.

French Rejection of AT&T Bid

The French government yesterday announced its decision, pending for two years, to sell its second-largest firm -- as a privatization move -- to a Swedish led consortium, rejecting primary rivals: A U.S. led consortium, including AT&T, and Siemens of West Germany.

Significance: In 1986, the U.S. (led by DOC) threatened to retaliate against rejection of the U.S.-led bid, should it occur, as representing a market barrier. The Germans made a similar threat.

- o This decision could accelerate interagency and Congressional discussion on potential sectoral reciprocity legislation in the telecommunications industry. The EPC Working Group on Telecommunications is expected to take up next week the more remote issue of existing manufacturing restrictions on local phone companies.
