The tragic death of my ninety-six-year-old father, just a few days ago in Tehran, prompts me to write you these words as we all look forward to the festivities of Thanksgiving Day, and pause to remember all those things we have to be thankful for in America.

In a world half of whose population has lost its freedom, including my country, the United States of America, still stands as a living monument to freedom of expression, freedom of movement, freedom of choice, freedom of the human spirit. You are blessed with an economic and social system dedicated to providing as many of the good things of life to as many people as possible, a system which rewards those who work hard and show enterprise for the greater benefit of all. When I graduated from an American University some thirty years ago, I strived with many other compatriots to implement just such a system in Iran, and we were well on the road towards achieving it. As for my father, he was an Iranian patriotstatesman, an internationally known diplomat, who helped steer Iran from a soviet occupied, economically backmard, socially explosive, politically chaotic country of some sixteen million people in 1941 to a proud nation in 1978 looking towards a bright future. A nation of thirty-five million, enjoying one of the world's fastest economic growth, regarded as the Japan of the Middle East and assuring peace and stability in the Persian Gulf through which the energy-poor world received more than thirty million barrels of Iranian and Arab oil a day. Alas, my father died seeing his country in utter ruin, chaos and despair. His demise in that tortured land, has left me with an immense feeling of sadness

His demise in that tortured land, has left me with an immense feeling of sadness and brings back to my mind the contents of a letter I submitted to President (arter before the hostage crisis and the answer I received through the State Department. It is my earnest wish that these views have now changed, for there is nothing to hope for with the regime of Knomeyni except to surrender Iran to the soviets on a silver platter.

When President Nixon stated in 1973, that Iran is a bridge" between the East and the West, between Asia and Europe and for that matter Africa" he was reiterating what every President of the Unites States of America has said about the strategic significance of Iran in the international system since the Second World War, when

President Roosevelt characterized Iran as the "Bridge of Victory" in the Allied efforts against Hitler's Germany. For the present, the Soviet Union keeps silent, wondering where its interests are while infiltrating every level of the Khameyni regime.

I eranestly hope that Washington will now speak out against the barbarism in Iran and dispel the impression that it does not care when the victims are iranians, or worse, that it excuses executioners who "appear" to be anti-communists. No interest is served by Iran's retreat into darkness except those of the soviets. The Regime of Khomeyni is detested today by our people, their leaders, past or present cannot be salvaged. At present, amongst iranian exiles and nationalists back home, there is no dearth of people with experience as well as with commitment to high moral values. Their cohesion, despite some still slight differences is gaining strength each passing day, it would be a mistake to discourage their hopes as it has been done in the past. They are credible and surely the only alternative to the vacuum which will be inevitably created by Khomeyni's eventual departure from the scene. They need your support for the greater benefit of the free world and the values we share.

Since I left my office as Ambassador of Iran to Morocco last April and came to reside in the USA, Istrictly reserved my criticisms on the behaviour of the new Islamic republic of Iran, out of diplomatic ethics and with the hope that sooner or later all factions in my beloved country would reunite in the common goal of peace, freedomand prosperity so much needed for the continued existence and further prosperity of our land.

However, in view of recent events, I am as well as all iranian patriots, increasingly concerned about the direction taken by a totally tyranical regime and the helplessness of mr. Mehdi Bazargan's team of ministers, which can hardly be discribed as a government and is not even capable of making a token attempt at condemning the rule of terror, fraticide, suppression of all elementary human rights and freedom which has become the daily lot of iranarians.

What's even more distressing and is now a matter of common knowledge amongst all iranians is that an actual minister of the new regime who has very close ties and links in your country, has personally attended the secret mock-trials of many of those executed for "corruption on earth" or "waging war against God and his emissaries on earth". Amongst those butchered were my cousin Amir Abbas Hoveyda ex Prime dinister and Abbas Ali Khalatbary the Foreign Minister, both generous men of high moral integrity and true patriots.

In the few months that have elapsed since the departure of the Shah, thousands of innocents victims have died and hundred of officials of the previous regime have moved down in the dead of night without even a semblance of a trial; the Konitch militianen, responsible for the continued bloodbath in Fran are institutionalizing lawlessness and assassination throughout the land.

In Iran, the effect of the so-called islanic resurgence have already been devastating. Our once prosperous country is on the verge of total socio-economic collapse. I once thriving educated student population and youth is being forced into the insanity of a movement steming directly from the nightmare of the dark ages, transforming people into bestial mob much like the crased followers of Neverend Jin Jones.

Before our country plunges to pletely into the abyss of sheer insanity, I besteck you, Mr. President, to once again voice the principles of human rights which you were so eager to expound when the previous regime was in power. Let not the true pets of dark ages sound over our land. Do not encourage the massicre of our minorities who have previously lived in peace and prosperity in a unified land.

We iranians, have been distressed to learn that your govern ent which shunned the sale of arms to the Shah, proposes now to sell billions of

dollars worth of lethal armaments and even oil to a regime whose goal as it has cleriff shown is the total suppression and who is engaged in fraticidal onslought against its own people, including all minorities and the proud kurdish brothers who previously lived in peace and prosperity.

Needless to say, in resident, many thousand of iranians have fled their tortured land, students, technocrats, businessmen, skilled technicians, widdle-class people and intellectuals, all patriots are praying, that one day, in the not too distant future they will be able to return to their hoseland and contribute to the growth of their country without fear of retribution, torture and death.

To the obscurity now casting its gloom over tran, we firely believe there is a middle - of - the way alternative based upon tran's large middle class, the suppressed leftists, its disgruntled army and most certainly the less obscurantist parts of our moster clergy. Tran is country of many thousand years of history, a civilized country which will find a civilized solution in the very near future to the present darkness.

In the name of God Albrighty Let us disperse the clouds of darkness over our land.

The unjust treatment and merciless executions which have been occuring in that country for the past several years have intensified into what is now an apparent systematic plan to eliminate the Baha'i faith in Iran. The confiscation and destruction of Baha'i holy places, the arrest and execution of prominent Baha'is, and the intimidation of the rank and file believers to force them to renounce their faith are actions that we in the Pacific Basin find appalling.

Guam and all citizens of the Northern Marianas are united in our belief that such wanton disregard for human life and religious freedom cannot, and must not, be allowed to continue. On behalf of the citizens of Guam and the Northern Marianas, I am appealing to you to make urgent representations to the Iranian authorities to put an end to these illegal and unacceptable persecutions.

Mr. President, your courageous and consistent cry for human rights throughout the world has been laudable. We of the Pacific Basin hope your admirable philosophy will be translated into practical action on behalf of the nearly one-million Baha'is of Iran.

Your letter of February 23, to the President regarding the reported detention of Mr. Arnold Combrinck-Graham, III, in Tehran, Iran, has been referred to the Department for further response.

Unfortunately, I am unable to provide you with any additional information regarding Mr. Graham's detention other than that contained in my letter of March 9, a copy of which is enclosed for your reference. Although the American Interest's Section at the Swiss Embassy at Tehran has received unofficial reports of Mr. Graham's detention, they have, as yet, been unable to confirm this information through the appropriate authorities in Tehran.

Please let me reiterate our concern for Mr. Graham's welfare and that of the other Americans imprisoned in Tehran and assure you we will continue to monitor the situation through the Swiss Protecting Power. As I previously indicated, should the Swiss gain access to Mr. Graham and obtain a Privacy Act release from him, we will immediately notify both your office and Ms. Chapin and provide you with all available information regarding his case.

Thank you for your letter of February 23, on behalf of Ms. Virginia Chapin, regarding the reported detention of her son, Arnold Combrinck-Graham, III, in Tehran, Iran.

The Swiss Protecting Power in Tehran has informed us that it has received unofficial reports of Mr. Graham's detention. The exact reason and charges are, as yet, unclear, and the Swiss have, unfortunately, been unable to obtain confirmation of them from the Iranian authorities. In view of this, and since we do not have a Privacy Act authorization from Mr. Graham, I regret that I cannot be more responsive to your inquiry at this time. As you know, the Department's Citizens Emergency Center has been in contact with Ms. Chapin regarding this matter and will continue to keep her apprised of any future developments.

Please let me assure you the welfare of all Americans detained in Iran is of prime concern to the Department. We will continue to monitor Mr. Graham's situation through the Swiss Protecting Power in Tehran. Should they gain access and obtain a Privacy Act release from Mr. Graham, we will advise both your office and Ms. Chapin accordingly.



Dear Mr. President:

Recently, I was contacted by Ms. Virginia Chapin, who has a problem that I believe needs and merits your immediate personal attention.

Ms. Chapin's son, who travels under the name of Terry Graham, has been living in Iran for approximately ten years as a journalist. His passport identification bears his given name which is Arnold Cumbrinck Graham III.

Recent newspaper reports have indicated that Mr. Graham is being held in prison by the Iranian government. He was, according to some reports, arrested on December 8th, 1981, for carrying anti-government material.

The Overseas Citizens Emergency Office of the Bureau of Consular Affairs has been most courteous, both to my office and to Ms. Chapin. That office has not, however, been able to provide any confirmation as to the veracity of these reports.

If Terry Graham is indeed being held captive, then his mother, Ms. Chapin, would like to communicate with him. At a minimum, we would like to confirm whether or not Mr. Graham is, in fact, being held at all.

I ask that you intercede in this matter through our friends the Swiss, through the United Nations, or any other proper diplomatic channels to bring the strongest possible pressure to bear on the Iranian government in this matter.

Ms. Chapin and the American people deserve to know whether Terry Graham, who in this country would be protected by the First Amendment, is being held captive in Tehran.

I anxiously await your reply.
