

Dear Messrs Warach and Weisbein:

Your letter of July 29, 1983 to President Reagan regarding Iran's persecution of Baha'is has been referred to the Department of State for reply.

Please be assured that both President Reagan and the Department of State share your concerns about the plight of the Baha'is in Iran. President Reagan issued a statement on May 23, 1983 calling on other world leaders to join him in condemning this persecution. The Department of State has worked closely with the Baha'i community in the United States since the beginning of the Iranian revolution to seek means of alleviating the problems suffered by their co-religionists in Iran. This task is made difficult by the lack of diplomatic relations between the U.S. and Iran.

The Baha'i believe that world publicity plays a role in Iran and that continued public attention causes the Iranian regime to move more slowly against the Baha'i than might otherwise be the case. Steps taken by the U.S. Government to call international attention to this matter include the following:

-- September, 1980. The U.S. supported a resolution passed by the U.N. Human Rights Commission (UNHRC) Sub-commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities, which expressed profound concern for the safety of the Baha'is in Iran and requested the U.N. Secretary - 2 -

General to transmit that concern to the Iranian authorities and invite the Iranians to grant full protection of fundamental rights and freedoms to the Baha'i community and to protect the life and liberty of the members of the Baha'i community.

-- September, 1981. The U.S. supported a resolution passed by the same UNHRC Sub-commission, which noted the "systematic persecution of the Baha'is in Iran" including torture, disappearances, murder, kidnappings and other abuses, stated that the Sub-commission was convinced such treatment "is motivated by religious intolerance and a desire to eliminate the Baha'is' faith from the land of its birth", expressed "profound concern for the perilous situation facing this religious community", urged the U.N. Secretary General to continue to make representations to the Iranian authorities, and requested that he prepare material for consideration by the session of the UNHRC which would begin in February, 1982.

-- October, 1981. U.S. Alternate Delegate to the UNGA, Richard Schifter, made a speech to the Third Committee in which he called attention to the plight of the Baha'is in Iran and to the "systematic effort to eradicate their faith", giving details of the persecution.

-- December, 1981. A Department of State press statement denounced the arrest and execution of members of the Baha'i National Spiritual Assembly and called attention to the pattern of suppression into which these "despicable acts" fit.

-- March, 1982. The U.S. supported a resolution passed by the full UNHRC, which referred to the October, 1981 Sub-commission resolution and the Secretary General's report; expressed its deep concern at the continuing reports about grave violations of human rights and fundamental freedoms in Iran; urged the Iranian government to respect the provisions of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights; requested the Secretary General to establish direct contacts with the Iranian authorities, to continue his efforts to insure that the Baha'is are guaranteed full enjoyment of their human rights and fundamental freedoms, and to submit a report on the human rights situation in Iran to the next session of the UNHRC; and kept the situation in Iran on the UNHRC's agenda for the 1983 session.

-- March, 1983. The U.S. supported a similar resolution, passed on March 8 by the full UNHRC, expressing the violations of human rights and fundamental freedoms in Iran; urging the Iranian government to respect the provisions of the International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights; requesting the U.N. Secretary General "to continue efforts to establish direct contacts with the government of Iran on the grave human rights situation prevailing in that country, including the deteriorating situation of the Baha'is and taking into account the findings of the special rapporteur on the questions relating to summary or arbitrary executions"; requesting the Secretary General to submit "a comprehensive report including conclusions and recommendations" to the UNHRC; requesting the cooperation of the Iranian government with the Secretary General; and placing the human rights situation in Iran on the agenda of the UNHRC's 1984 session. The U.S. representative, in supporting this resolution, expressed our dismay over the condemnation to death of 22 Baha'is in Shiraz.

-- March, 1983. Assistant Secretary for Human Rights, Elliott Abrams in remarks to the House Subcommittee on Human Rights and International Organizations expressed the Department's dismay and alarm over reports of the death sentences of 22 Baha'is handed down by a Shiraz court.

-- The VOA has on a number of occasions included mention of persecution of the Baha'is in its Persian language broadcasts.

In addition to the above, there have been other actions taken by other countries to protest Iran's treatment of its Baha's such as the joint demarche made in Tehran by the EC-10. in March of 1983.

I hope you find the above information useful.

Dear President Reagan:

The latest outrage perpetrated by the Khomeini government in Iran is the execution by hanging of ten women, followers of the Baha'i faith. Since Khomeini's Islamic revolution in 1979, the government has persecuted the 300,000 members of this minority sect in Iran. Over 100 Baha'i leaders have been murdered and others have been driven from their homes. Property and businesses belonging to the Baha'i have been confiscated. Individuals have been dismissed from their jobs. Baha'i schools have been closed and temples have been desecrated.

The Baha'is are a peaceful sect who preach the unity of the human race. They separated from Islam in the 19th century and are now treated as heretics whose existence is intolerable to the Moslem militants who control Iran.

"It is the beginning of the Second Holocaust," said Baha'i exile Artin Mahmondi, whose mother and cousin were executed in December 1981. The Baha'i are denied the right to emigrate. They cannot obtain identification cards necessary to purchase food and fuel. They are trapped in Iran, the victims of the Moslem reign of terror. Last year Amnesty International attested to their plight stating that "There is a deliberate government policy of religious persecution." The UN Human Rights Commission adopted a resolution deploring the oppression of Baha'is in Iran.

As Jews we understand too well the horrors of religious persecution and genocide. We cannot be satisfied with well-meaning statements of concern from international bodies. We urge that our government and other Western governments use all possible means and sanctions to stop the Khomeini regime from persecuting and murdering the Baha'is in Iran.



Dear Mr. Schatz:

Your letter of September 13, addressed to the President was referred to the Department of State.

In 1982 the Administration submitted draft legislation to implement in major portion the recommendations of the President's Commission on Hostage Compensation. That proposal was not acted upon in the last Congress. It was resubmitted this year, and it has now been introduced in both the Senate and House (the House bill number is H.R. 3448). However, the Commission's recommendation to increase the ceiling on employee claims for loss of personal property was not accepted by the Administration for fiscal reasons and is not contained in the proposed legislation. The Congress, of course, may be of a different mind on this point, and, if you wish, you may want to contact the House Foreign Affairs and Senate Foreign Relations Committees.

We have verified that your personal property from your apartment in Iran has been placed in custody of the Swiss Embassy, but, of course, the United States through its protecting power, Switzerland, has not been permitted to repatriate that property.

Dear Mr. President:

On September 21, 1983, two years will have passed since one of your earliest Commissions released its recommendations. The President's Commission on Hostage Compensation reached unanimous agreement on eight recommendations aimed at remedying problems faced by United States Governmnet employees as a result of the seizure of the Embassy in Tehran in 1979. To the best of my knowledge, none of these recommendations have been acted upon. The result is that I and others like myself have personal property losses to remind us of our service in Iran.

I, and others like me, served in Iran at the request of the United States Government and payed a price. The price differed for each individual, but the Commission did a good job in recognizing this variability and made recommendations to cover most individual situations.

The Commission's findings, however, seem to have fallen on deaf ears. I haven't even been able to get answers to questions regarding your Administration's efforts to implement the recommendations. I find that very disquieting.

I was taught that individuals can make a difference and have always approached my Government service with that in mind. As an individual, however, I have met resistance, or been ignored, when it came time for my employer, the United States Government, to face responsibilities for its actions in Iran.

My major loss in Iran involved personal property. My loss was not the result of actions by revolutionaries, but resulted from the United States Government stopping payments on their rental agreement for the apartment I was assigned. My landlord contacted the Department of State more than one year after the takeover of the Embassy and indicated that my personal belongings were still in his possession and unharmed. I was never told of the response he received in requesting the back rent under the rental agreement. I assume that he was forced to take possession of my property to cover payments due from the United States Government.

I later received a call from the Department of State indicating that the Swiss Embassy in Tehran had acquired some of my belongings and wished instructions and funds for forwarding them to the United States. I have heard nothing further on the matter to indicate that the Government took any action to recover my belongings.

To add insult to injury, the United States Department of Agriculture, used methods to value my claim which were different than the methods used to establish values for State Department claims. The result is that I have uncompensated losses of nearly \$9,000 as a result of serving in Iran. (That may not seem to be a great amount of money to the Government, but it is a large sum of money to me.) The Presidental Commission addressed this and other issues. Their recommendations, however, have not been acted upon.

I ask that a full accounting of actions to implement the Commission's recommendations be provided to me. I also request that the Department of State be directed to provide me with an accounting of my belongings with the Swiss Embassy in Tehran.

I am well aware that this letter will be handled by staff officers. I hope that it at least receives attention rather than being ignored like my previous information and status requests to other Government representatives involved in the Iran incident.

Thank you for your letter of October 30, 1983 to President Reagan concerning Iran. Your offer of assistance in this complex area of US foreign policy is appreciated greatly. Your long, successful military career and your first hand experience in Iran are recognized as valuable assets.

As you are aware, we have no diplomatic relations with Iran and the current Iranian government is unwilling to improve relations with the US. While we are open to changes in this situation, Iranian links to terrorist activities in Lebanon and elsewhere virtually have eliminated the possibility of improved relations with the US in the near future.

We remain committed to a policy of neutrality in the war between Iran and Iraq but, are not indifferent to the outcome of this conflict. We have friends and interests which are endangered by the continuation of hostilities. We continue to support constructive efforts to bring about an end to the fighting and withdrawal of forces behind international borders under conditions that will preserve the sovereignty and territorial integrity of both Iran and Iraq.

Nevertheless, we cannot accept your offer of assistance at this time. If the situation arises where your services could be helpful we certainly will contact you. We appreciate your support of our efforts and again, thank you for your offer.

Dear Sir:

I think that there is a dangerous possible situation which should be anticipated over the next few months, an attempt to change the outcome of the 1984 election.

It is in Iranian (and Russian) interests to see a strong Reagan Administration replaced with a weaker government. An overt Russian move would be self-defeating, but they could suggest the idea to the Iranians, and then give them political and political support.

The idea would be along these lines: An action in the Persian Gulf to close the oil flow would have a delayed but very serious economic effect on the US. The economic recovery would be aborted, and Mr. Reagan's position in November would be much more difficult.

The timing of this would require action soon, in order to allow the effects to work their way through the economy, and to allow the initial surge of popular support for the President to dissipate. Remembering that the Ayatollah's action against Mr. Carter began during this part of the political season (the November before the election), we know that he appreciates the use of timeing to maximize his advantage. The action itself would not have to be a closing of the Strait of Hormuz by Iranian forces. It might involve a direct attack or a more indirect terrorist attact against the oil terminals of the other Gulf countries, of which there are only a few. These should be anticipated particularly at this time. An Iranian-inspired coup attempt in Riyadh should probably not be ruled out, remembering the attack against the Grand Mosque in 1980.

I am very interested in all of this. I have traveled in Europe, North Africa and the Middle East (including Iran and Afghanistan). I know these areas directly. I know French, German and Spanish, and have several years experience in administrative law.

I would be happy to try to help you in this area. I would be willing to come to Washington, at my own expense, to talk with someone about this, if they think that this would be worthwhile.



U.S. to take no action in Iranian stamp case

The United States will not block mail bearing Iranian stamps showing a blindfelded American and a burning U.S. flag (Luin S Dei 112, page 5).

The policy was announced Dec. 16 by Fostmaster General William F Bolger, who called the stamps "repulsive, a vicious distortion of a criminal act by Iran and an insult to all Americans

When lews arrived Nov. 10 that Iran had issued the stainp original news reports said three stamps) to celebrate the fourth inniversary of the seizure of the U.S. embassy in Tehran, a spokesman for the USPS was immediately asked what action the United States would take under Article 28, Section 1d of the Universal Postal Union convention.

Dear Mr. President:

I write this letter out of my grave concern over the issues presented in my letter and urge you to carefully read and consider my comments.

<u>The</u> policy of containment of communist expansion, which has been the corner-stone of the United States' Foreign Policy since World War 11, h proved to be a dismal failure. Today, the Soviet Union is not only stronger than ever, but she has managed to extend also her frontiers to the very doors of the United States of America.

It is time to ponder on the reasons for this failure. The main point in this respect seems to be the following: The Soviet Union's foreign policy is coherent and based on a clear and definite ideology with long range goals, while the United States' foreign policy lacks such an ideology and relies on short-term objectives. Experience however, has proved that without a reasonable balance between the short and long-term, no sound and viable foreign policy can exist.

The soviets believe in the absolute superiority and truth of the Marxist-Leninist doctrine. They firmly believe that their ideology is the best one for the entire world and should therefore be imposed everywhere for mankind's sake. They offer both a method of government (dictatorship of the communist party) and a general goal (social justice and economic progress through communism).

The West, on the other hand, offers only a method of government (democracy). Its basic values, as shown with the turmoils of the sixties and the seventies, have eroded. In the past five or seven years, the United States' foreign policy has been limited to a series of reaction to soviet initiatives. Several attempts in the direction of a more coherent foreign policy were short-lived and ended in fiasco: detente, human rights.

In recent years different groups have tried to develop some basic principles in foreign policy. Thus the "liberals" prompted the Carter administration to help the so-called "popular movements" in the Third World. But they ignored the fact that these so-called "popular-movements", were in fact minority groups imposing their own authoritarian ideas through guerilla warfare and terrorist methods. This policy helped marxist movements in the overtake of many countries. The basic idea of such a policy is not only dangerous but also contradictory. If applied before World War 11, then the United States should have accordingly helped Hitler whose national-socialism was very popular in the Germany of the thirties.

This contradictory "liberal policy" which was more or less put into effect by the Carter administration led to disasters in many parts of the world, but their authors are still not discouraged. They further developed their "liberal" outlook concerning the Third World by adding tactical suggestions in their views, the United States should by all means use different ideological currents to confront soviet ideology. In this respect they thought that Islamic fundamentalism would be a miracle deterrent to confront soviet ideology. They believed that Islamic fundamentalism would be a strong antidote to communism in several countries and in particular, the region of the Persian Gulf, for the tennets of Islam are absolutely incompatible with those of godless marxism. They pushed the administration to perform in this new direction with the dire results that we can now observe: Iran was destabilized and is prey to a tyrannical regime Of monstrous proportions, Pakistan became a backward dictatorship and Afghanistan fell to the communists and the list continues. The outcome of this policy is a total disaster and today, the entire Persian Gulf is more vulnerable than ever before.

The mistake committed by the exponents of this theory is easy to explain. They entirely forgot that Islamic fundamentalism is as totalitarian an ideology as marxism. Its followers, alike the communists also have in view the export of their system of government.

How can the United States and her allies support such a policy and keep intact their values? The contradictions are more than obvious and the dangers of such tactical moves have been experienced long before. Let us look for example at the thirties. The great powers in those days (Britain, France) thought it smart policy to allow the rise and strenghthening of Hitler for he would in their eyes counter-balance the expansion of the Soviet Union; but Hitler first destroyed the western powers and the war contributed to the consolidation of the Soviet Union.

As for Islamic fundamentalism, history gives us two examples. First, in the Seventh century, with the Jihad, Islamic armies conquered, in less than half a century, the greatest part of the civilized world, destroying monuments and burning libraries. It took several centuries before civilization could resurface! Secondly, in the nineteen century, the Turks used Islamic fundamentalism to bolster their drive, and soon the Ottoman empire extended from the heart of Europe to Iran and the confines of the Arabian Peninsula.

Theoretically it may be true that Islamic fundamentalism stands against communism, but it considers the West a greater threat. If not stopped now, fundamentalism is going to pour out in all Islamic countries, and then, unleash its hatred against the United States and the West. At the same time, the ensuing economic chaos and political anarchy which is bound to follow in the region, due to "Islamic policy", will pave the road wide open for the Soviet Union to extend its domination. For example, in Iran, the chaos and utter confusion engendered by Khomeyni's murderous and incapable regime, have allowed the communists to develop and infiltrate every level of the government and clergy.

The unleashing of Islamic fundamentalists advocated by so many liberals in the United States of America can be likened to the opening of Pandora's box.

Bearing this state of things in mind and the fuse burning shorter on that great powder keg called earth, it has become imperative that the United States of America and her allies, devise and apply a new coherent foreign policy. Such a foreign policy should at the same time cope with the present and develop its own long range ideological imperatives. On of the most urgent and immediate problem being indeed the restoration of stability in Iran and the Persian Gulf.

The time has come to put back the lid on Iran Pandora's box opened by the Carter administration for the Russians are strongly getting into a position to pick up fast the crumbling pieces in Iran. The Soviets are at present influencing security, military and economic affairs in our country. The grisly goings-on there are not their fault. The Iranian civil war of assassination and execution, murder and mayhem, belongs to a religion much older that Marxism-Leninism, a result of the so-called green "Islamic Belt" encouraged by the previous administration through Islamic Fundamentalism.

While the communists in Iran, are infiltrating all levels of Tehran's regime, the Russians have drawn up in the Transcaucasus region between the Black Sea and the Caspian most of the 24 divisions usually stationed along their south-west border. The clergy in Iran, is divided between conservatives and radicals. However, the group led by Iran's president, Hojatoleslam Khamenei, strongly favors closer links with Russia, it is prominently on the rise and backed by the Russian-supported Tudeh party. The entire Iranian clergy may come soon to depend totally upon the Tudeh, or upon Soviet weapons, or indeed upon the Sovient soldiers vonveniently waiting in the nearby Transcaucasus.

The Iranian wall between Russia and the Persian Gulf has crumbled away thanks to the disastrous foreign policy of the previous administration which had little love for the Shah. While the parade of horrors goes on unabated in country where the blook of those to be executed is extracted before the sentence of death is passed, the present administration proposes to bolster the defense of moderate Arab countries in the Middle-East against the designs of the Soviet Union which seeks to destabilize the entire region through its proxies: Khomeyni and Khaddafi.

It would be unfortunate to repeat now the mistakes of the past damages to Iran and consequently to the free world will perhaps be irrevocable. The time has come for the United States to lend its support to the countless Iranian patriots and nationalists within and without Iran who seeks the overthrow of an evil and tyrannical regime. The disappearance of Khomeyni and Khaddaffi from the scene and whose brand of Islam is used as a tool for communist penetration would serve more the cause of the free world than all the AWACS dispatched and could certainly be accomplished at a much lesser cost. It is the root-cause of the problem and the disease that has to be eliminated for the sake of humanity and all the values cherished in the free world.
