Dear Mr. Elkadiri:

I am replying to your message to President Reagan concerning the transfer of U.S. arms to Iran.

As President Reagan has explained, the Persian Gulf region is important to the United States, and to many of our allies as well, for a variety of strategic, economic, and political reasons. A quarter of the free world's oil flows through the Persian Gulf, and it is vital that Western access to that oil continues. The region is also a strategic focal point for the Soviet Union. The Soviets have long sought to expand their presence and control in the area, and the United States has an important stake in denying the Soviets the opportunity for such an expansion. The long, destructive war between Iran and Iraq also threatens the stability of the area.

In view of these conditions, the United States engaged in an effort to establish contacts with certain groups within the Iranian leadership to explore the possibility of forging a new and better relationship. This was done in order to encourage negotiations to end the war in the Gulf, prevent Soviet expansionism, end Iranian support for international terrorism, and effect the safe return of all hostages from Lebanon.

At a certain point, the U.S. Government was requested to furnish military materiel to Iran as a demonstration of our good faith and the seriousness with which we viewed contact with Iran. The President authorized shipment of a limited quantity of defensive arms to Iran after examining the issue. He realized the risks involved in giving this positive signal to Iran. However, the initiative did not have the outcome that was hoped for, in spite of the soundness of our goals.

Current American policy toward Iran has been clearly stated by Secretary Shultz. In testimony before the House Foreign Affairs Committee on December 8, he said:

"No further arms shipment will be made to Iran by the United States, and we will exert all our influence to discourage arms sales to Iran by others. The reason is that it is Iran which refuses to end the Gulf War, and it is the capability of Iran to continue the war that we must address. Iran cannot expect a better relationship with us until it acts to end the war, ceases its support for terrorism, and uses its influence with those who hold our hostages to achieve their freedom."

It saddens us to hear that you are helping Iran instead of Iraq in the war imposed by Khoemeni against the peaceful government of Saddam Hussein who is valiantly struggling to champion the interests of the free world in this vital region.

I don't feel it is necessary to elaborate on this unnecessarily embarassing event that the media feels is "sticking" to your presidency teflon image. However, this untimely event must be turned in your favor to assure that you will not become a "lame duck" president. Both the nation and your party have benefited from your leadership and the respect and trust you restored to the presidency. You must act now to regain the respect of your party, the nation, and the world. The key to your success in this area is to make an honest effort to negotiate a peaceful solution to this Gulf war.

The Iraqi people and Saddam Hussein have managed through great personal sacrifice to ward off Khoemeni and Iran, a country four times the size of Iraq, and stop the spread of fanatacism in the region thereby furthering the interests of the free world in the Gulf.

I challenge you to prove to the world that American foreign policy is not dictated by Kineset and is independent of Israel. Offer an olive oil branch to Saddam Hussein, bring Khoemeni to the bargaining table, and you will recapture the trust of your people and the world. Dear Sir:

As a founder of the World Service Authority, a global administrative service which issues human rights passports worldwide, I have a few questions re the "fake" (read, "counterfeit") Irish passports used by Robert MacFarlane and his three conspirators in their recent trip to Tehran:

Why didn't they use US passports? Were they afraid the Iranian government would not have allowed them into the country identified as "satanic" Americans? Why not Lesothan, Bulgarian or Sri Lankan fake passports? Was it the "Mc" in McFarlane's name which decided the president which nation to misrepresent? Or was it because mission leader Ronald Reagan is of Irish ancestry and decided to mix international politics with a bit of the blarney?

How were the sham Irish passports procured? Who issued the procurement order? Or were they simply stolen from Irish Republic stock by friends of the administration? If so, who committed the theft?

If manufactured in the US, who printed, stitched and bound them? Government or private? If government, which agency? Does the National Security Council have its own printing press for other nations' passports? Where is it located? In the White House basement? If the Government Printing Office, does it also duplicate Soviet, Cuban and People's Republic of China passports for the CIA agents stationed there? Or does the CIA have its own basement printing press for counterfeiting passports of other nations?

Then do all national governments have facilities for printing such passports of fellow nations? If so, doesn't that render the whole national passport game a gigantic fraud perpetrated on a naive and supine world public?

Did Secretary of State Schultz, who supervises the Passport Dept., agree to the chicanery? If so, can U.S. citizens now seek from this department - for special fees, of course - facsimile passports of other nations of their own choosing and travel with them with the State Dept.'s blessing? If not, what is the Secretary's position now vis-a-vis his fellow officials who, as U.S. citizens, broke the law requiring the exclusive use of the Department's official document when travelling abroad? And, in view of this duplicity, what of his already tarnished allegiance to the president who literally bypassed his own passport office?

How much does it cost to print only four fake Irish passports? From which part of the US budget do such documents come? The President's private fund, the CIA's, the Pentagon's, the NSC's or the General Fund? Or maybe, from the Ersatz Document Dept. Fund?

Was the Irish Republic informed of this inside job? If not, can it not charge the USA with counterfeiting in the International Court of Justice at The Hague? Is that not an international crime when one nation sticks it, documentwise, to

another nation?

Were signatures of Irish officials forged on the passports. If so, isn't that a felony the penalty for which — at least in the United States — is a \$10,000 fine and/or 10 years in prison? And as the instigator, should not the president be indicted then along with McFarlane et al? Or does "Executive Privilege" and/or "discretionary powers" allow the Chief Executive "rights" which, if exercised by his fellow citizens, would land them in the slammer?

Were there any left-over passports from this print run? If so, can not the rest be issued by the Sanctuary Committee to Salvadoreans, Cubans, Haitians, Afghans, Eritreans, etc., living clandestinely - as McFarlane and Co. tried to do in their airline "costumes" in Iran? - in the United States?

And what about re-entry to the US? Did McFarlane and gang present the false Irish passports to U.S. Immigration? If not, did they use their "real" U.S. passports keeping the Irish "passports" concealed somewhere, in a fake diplomatic pouch maybe?

On the other hand, since fake passports are normally confiscated by the nation which discovers them as such, did the Iranian Immigration authorities confiscate the phony Irish passports? If not, why not? In returning them, did not the Iranian government then collude in the conspiracy?

Since US officials are servants of the people, yet are constitutionally enjoined to set an example of good citizenship, and since McFarlane and cohorts, sanctioned by the President, had fabricated (we suppose) and used a fraudulent Irish passport arbitrarily, why cannot each and every citizen now make his or her own passport according to his or her own design and demand that it be recognized both by the US government and all other nations? (The Iroquois Nation, I understand, has its own birch bark passports.)

Finally, isn't the entire national passport system now proven the absurdity it actually is in a world you can get around in two days?

I have a few more questions about national sovereignty itself but these will do for a starter.

Mr. President:

However well-intended, your decision to send military parts to Iran was, in my view, a serious error that has shaken the confidence of our friends, our Allies, and the American people in your foreign policy judgment.

I believe it is of paramount importance that you take strong and visible measures to limit further damage to your Presidency. Hostage releases notwithstanding, I believe you should admit your mistake in this matter, rather than continuing most unconvincingly to defend it. Secretary Schultz should unequivocally be re-established as your preeminent advisor in foreign policy matters, and you should release immediately from the White House Staff Adm. Poindexter, his subordinates, and any other staff whose advice has been flawed. Loyalty to subordinates is commendable, but it must not serve to protect their inadequacies, to maintain them in positions of responsibility, nor to condone their incompetence.

I recommend you consult with Henry Kissinger regarding selection of a National Security Advisor of recognized capability. A name that comes to mind is General Andrew Goodpastor.

We need your integrity, your honesty, your decency, your patriotism. You need our respect and our support.





### FACT SHEET

### The Organization

The Chosin Few reunites allied survivors of the 1950 battle of the Chosin Reservoir fought that November-December in the North Korean mountains near Manchuria.

Founded April 22, 1983, and formally recognized as a nonprofit association by the Internal Revenue Service, the association has approximately 2000 members from all U. S. services, plus South Koreans and former British Marine commandos. It is believed the only U. S. association of Korean War veterans and perhaps the only international veterans association.

The name stems from the fact that so few were engaged at Chosin or survived.

### The Battle

Chosin pitted about 15,000 allied ground troops, mostly elements of the 1st Marine Division and a regimental combat team from the Army's 7th Infantry Division, against 120,000 Chinese in ten divisions who had been ordered to annihilate the allies "to the last man" in order to demoralize other allied forces.

The 15,000 allies suffered 12,000 casualties, including more than 3000 killed and 6000 wounded, plus thousands of severe frostbite cases from the -300 temperatures, but emerged from the ordeal with a Presidential Unit Citation for "decisively defeating seven enemy divisions, together with elements of three others."

The Chinese suffered an estimated 37,500 casualties, including 25,000 killed and 12,500 wounded.

### Perspective

Historians have termed Chosin the most savage battle of modern warfare. They compare it to Tarawa, the bloodiest battle of World War II in terms of the ratio of casualties to Americans engaged, also 15,000. Some 1100 were killed and 2300 wounded in that fight. Of the island's 5000 defenders, 4500 died.

President Reagan cited Chosin as among the epics of military history in his first Inaugural Address. Time Magazine described it as "unparalled in U. S. military history...an epic of great suffering and great valor." The press has likened it to the Alamo or Custer's Last Stand because of the seemingly hopeless odds.

A total of 13 Congressional Medals of Honor and 70 Navy Crosses were awarded for the campaign, the most ever awarded for a single battle in U. S. military history.

### Christmas Miracle

The Chosin fighters, by decimating and checkmating the Chinese forces in the mountains, enabled the evacuation of nearly 100,000 North Korean men, women and children by sea, the last on Christmas Eve. The U. S. government formally described the humanitarian feat as "the greatest rescue operation in the history of mankind." Never in recorded history have combatants rescued so many enemy civilians in the midst of battle. Those refugees who "voted with their feet against communism" are now living free, many in the United States. They are the living legacy of The Chosin Few.

### Battlecry

Chosin has been immortalized in a movie, books and articles through the battlecry 'Petreat, Hell'. We're just attacking in a different direction." It was uttered by Major General Oliver P. Smith, commanding general of the 1st Marine Division, when asked if his men were retreating.

### Korean War

More than 54,000 Americans were killed during the three years of fighting from the North Korean invasion June 25, 1950, to the armistice July 27, 1953. Some 8177 are still listed as missing in action, compared to 2486 MIAs for the Vietnam War or 4512 for World War I.

### Korean Memorial

The Few plan the first national memorial to the so-called silent veterans of the forgotten war in Korea. In July they commissioned famed sculptor Dr. Felix de Weldon, of Newport, Rhode Island, to design the memorial which will cost an estimated \$5 million. His masterworks include the Iwo Jima monument in Washington, D. C.

I regret the recent events that have led me to write this letter. I am disappointed to discover that the President of our Nation was not kept fully informed of all facets of an operation as sensitive as the recent mission to Iran. In fact, the extremely large number of critical, unanswered questions leads me to urge you to appoint a special prosecutor as part of an effort to clearly and unequivocally bring all the facts before the American public.

I am specifically interested in determining the fundamental facts relating to the Iranian mission, such as who was responsible for the decisions made, when were the decisions made, how much and what kind of military material was involved, what amount of funds was involved and who were the recipients of these funds. With these facts in hand, a special prosecutor could determine if the Boland Amendment or any other U.S. statute was violated.

As a Senator and future member of the Intelligence Committee, I am most interested in avoiding a recurrence of this situation, and therefore seek the full disclosure and analysis of the facts relating to this mission. With the air cleared, we can move on to the long agenda that the White House, Congress and the nation must face over the next two years.

Dear Mr. Goldwasser:

I am replying to your message to President Reagan concerning the transfer of U.S. arms to Iran.

As President Reagan has explained, the Persian Gulf regions important to the United States, and to many of our allies as well, for a variety of strategic, economic, and political reasons. A quarter of the free world's oil flows through the Persian Gulf, and it is vital that Western access to that oil continues. The region is also a strategic focal point for the Soviet Union. The Soviets have long sought to expand their presence and control in the area, and the United States has an important stake in denying the Soviets the opportunity for such an expansion. The long, destructive war between Iran and Iraq also threatens the stability of the area.

In view of these conditions, the United States engaged in an effort to establish contacts with certain groups within the Iranian leadership to explore the possibility of forging a new and better relationship. This was done in order to encourage negotiations to end the war in the Gulf, prevent Soviet expansionism, end Iranian support for international terrorism, and effect the safe return of all hostages from Lebanon.

At a certain point, the U.S. Government was requested to furnish military material to Iran as a demonstration of our good faith and the seriousness with which we viewed contact with Iran. The President authorized shipment of a limited quantity of defensive arms to Iran after examining the issue. He realized the risks involved in giving this positive signal to Iran. However, the initiative did not have the outcome that was hoped for, in spite of the soundness of our goals.

Current American policy toward Iran has been clearly stated by Secretary Shultz. In testimony before the House Foreign Affairs Committee on December 8, he said:

"No further arms shipment will be made to Iran by the United States, and we will exert all our influence to discourage arms sales to Iran by others. The reason is that it is Iran which refuses to end the Gulf War, and it is the capability of Iran to continue the war that we must address. Iran cannot expect a better relationship with us until it acts to end the war, ceases its support for terrorism, and uses its influence with those who hold our hostages to achieve their freedom."

I am sending the enclosed material in the belief that you will find it of interest.

Dear Mr. President,

As long time supporters of your Administration's policy on terrorism, The Jewish War Veterans of the USA were initially stunned by the release of information regarding the arms sale to the Iranian government. We were inclined to wait and observe, after news of the arms for hostages deals had been divulged. Last week, however when you acknowledged sending military supplies to Iran, and refused to admit that this action was a mistake, we felt compelled to inform you of our outrage.

This policy reversal of negotiating with terrorists was an unwise decision. The disappointment expressed by members of your Administration, when the Iranians broke their word and delayed, denied, or were unable to attain the release of American hostages, will undoubtably leave the nation with a feeling of regret.

The consequences of these clandestine negotiations are manifold: Congress and the Joint Chiefs of Staff were alienated, when you circumvented them and ignored the American public, in making this crucial foreign policy decision. Our credibility with our European and Middle Eastern allies has suffered a great deal of damage. There is rank hypocrisy in calling for sanctions against Libya, less than one year after sending the Iranian government, what is in effect a ransom payment of arms shipments. The actions of the National Security Council have undermined United States foreign policy on terrorism. Mr. President, an incident that has caused so much controversy and yielded so few results can only be considered a mistake.

One can only hope that such a debacle will not be repeated, and that other Americans will not be kidnapped and ransomed by Iranian supported terrorists. If this policy of appeasement continues, we will eventually find

ourselves engaged in a war with a nation of religious fanatics, or involved in one incident after another, where American lives are held in the balance for frozen assets and spare parts.

I await your response on this most critical of matters.
