The crisis between the United States and Iran that began in 1979 has not been fully resolved. In these circumstances, I have determined that it is necessary to maintain in force the broad authorities that may be needed in the process of implementing the January 1981 agreements with Iran and in the eventual normalization of relations with that country.

Under section 202(d) of the National Emergencies Act (NEA, 50 U.S.C. § 1622(d)), any national emergency declared by the President shall terminate on the anniversary of the declaration unless the President publishes in the <u>Federal Register</u> and transmits to the Congress a notice stating that such emergency shall continue. On November 14, 1979, the President declared a national emergency to deal with the Iranian hostage crisis. This declaration triggered broad authority under the International Emergency Economic Powers Act (IEEPA, 50 U.S.C. §§ 1701-1706) to impose economic sanctions against Iran. If the emergency is not continued, these IEEPA authorities will terminate on the anniversary of the declaration -- November 14. The national emergency for Iran was previously continued on November 12, 1980, November 12, 1981, November 8, 1982, November 4, 1983, November 7, 1984 and November 1, 1985.

Since the IEEPA authorities are still required to deal with Iran (e.g. claims settlement), I have prepared the attached memorandum to David L. Chew to indicate that we concur with Treasury's recommendation that the President extend the national emergency for Iran.

Therefore, in accordance with Section 202(d) of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1622(d)), I am continuing the national emergency with respect to Iran. This notice shall be published in the Federal Register and transmitted to the Congress.

#### TO THE CONGRESS OF THE UNITED STATES:

Section 202(d) of the National Emergencies Act (50 U.S.C. 1622(d)) provides for the automatic termination of a national emergency unless, prior to the anniversary date of its declaration, the President publishes in the <u>Federal Register</u> and transmits to the Congress a notice stating that the emergency is to continue in effect beyond the anniversary date. In accordance with this provision, I have sent the enclosed notice, stating that the Iran emergency is to continue in effect beyond November 14, 1986, to the <u>Federal Register</u> for publication. Similar notices were sent to the Congress and the <u>Federal Register</u> on November 12, 1980, November 12, 1981, November 8, 1982, November 4, 1983, November 7, 1984, and

The crisis between the United States and Iran that began in 1979 has not been fully resolved. Although the international tribunal established to adjudicate claims of U.S. nationals against Iran and of Iranian nationals against the United States continues to function, full normalization of commercial and diplomatic relations between the United States and Iran will require more time. In these circumstances, I have determined that it is necessary to maintain in force the broad authorities that may be needed in the process of

implementing the January 1981 agreements with Iran and in the eventual normalization of relations with that country.
