It is a distortion to suggest we were dealing with the Khomeini -- we could never do that. In fact, the people we were talking to were risking their lives. Now all the publicity has destroyed what we were trying to do and may have destroyed those people as well. The business of the money transfer was none of our doing and a complete surprise to us.

There are things a lot more important for this country that President Reagan could be doing than having to fight his way out of the mess in which he now finds himself. But fight he must and he'll need the nation's support.

If Ronald Reagan didn't know about this bizarre Mideast-Nicaragua plan, that's not good for one who should be running things. If he did know, it's even worse.
