RE: Iranian Initiative and Central America

President Reagan is correct -- he should not "back-off" his position on the diplomatic initiative to Iran. That action sought to improve America's position in an economically and strategically vital country. The Administration should take the offensive in the public debate, and force the president's critics to back-up their accusations.

ASSUMPTIONS:

- 1) President Reagan's policy is correct.
- 2) The rough outline of events, as we now know it, is accurate.
- 3) Public confidence in the president, as reflected in his continued strong rating in the polls during this political and media onslaught, stems from the president's character and the accomplishments of his Administration: in lowering inflation; cutting taxes for working Americans; increasing employment to an all-time high, spurring sustained economic growth; rebuilding our national defenses; promoting SDI; working for real arms-reductions. The American people trust President Reagan, and respect his abilities.

RECOMMENDATION:

That an information center separate from the White House Press Office be established which would be responsible for issuing all information and comments by the Administration relating to the diplomatic initiative to Iran and transfer of money to the freedom fighters in Central America.

1) The office should be open from early morning until late evening, to meet all press deadlines and insure that our side is represented in all news stories.

- 2) An office spokesman should be selected who has credibility with the press and/or a public reputation for integrity.
- 3) A daily briefing on this situation should be given by the office spokesman, scheduled so that coverage appears on the evening newscasts and in the morning papers.
- 4) All new information relating to this matter should be released through the information office immediately. To allow delays or leaks to get ahead of us would undermine the credibility of the office, the correctness of the Administration's position, and give the president's opponents a platform for moral posturing. It is important that the president maintain the high ground in this matter.

RATIONALE:

The Administration should stress the "why and how" in its public comments on the diplomatic initiative -- relate to the public the strategic imperative behind the actions, both in Iran and in Central America, and the steps taken to further US national security interests.

The critics of the president on this matter are critics of the president in general. This incident has given them a cover to attack President Reagan without revealing their overall opposition to the Reagan Agenda. The fact is that once the Iran/Nicaragua activities became public knowledge, they changed from a substantive issue into a political issue. Our opponents recognize this, so should we.

Opponents of the president have seized on these events as a means to attack the president personally and to undercut the entire Reagan Agenda. No one can deny the strategic importance of Iran or Nicaragua to the US. Questions concerning methods are subject to legitimate debate, but these are foreign policy matters which offer no real political reward. Therefore, critics concentrate on questions of procedure, not substance, to further their political ends.

The Administration should go on the offensive in the Iran/Nicaragua debate. Both policies are correct, and critics should be called on to justify their attacks -- and to pay the price for their shameless attempts to create another Watergate. In their rush to hurt the president they have put themselves out on a limb -- do they oppose the policy goals, or just the man behind the plans?

President Reagan has always believed that, if given the facts, the American people will reach the proper conclusion. A strong public

posture by the Administration will expose the political motivation of the president's opponents, thereby undercutting their efforts and putting the debate back in the foreign policy sphere. There, the imperative behind the president's actions will be understood, and approved, by the American people.

THE INFORMATION CENTER:

The information center provides the best means to achieve this end. Establishment of this office breaks the link between the Iran/Nicaragua situation and normal White House business. The center also has the potential for serving a greater number of journalists than the White House Press Office, especially those who are not part of the "major media" and less adversarial toward the Administration. Most important, such a move would signal Administration openness and a willingness to deal with this matter head-on.

ATMOSPHERE:

The physical lay-out of the information center should be designed to reinforce the "why and how" theme of Administration comment:

Any photograph taken in the information center should relay the logic behind the policy. Maps depicting the strategic importance of Iran and Central America should be hung from the walls. Management and flow charts which graphically detail the government process should be displayed as well. The public is interested in how policy is implemented. If explained properly, they will appreciate the difference between intelligence and diplomatic methods.

Diagrams and time-lines outlining the events and exchanges involved in the US-Iran contacts should be made available. In addition, information kits should be prepared and distributed. Such efforts serve to focus public commentary on the substance of the issue.

ADDITIONAL POINTS:

The past records and achievements of Admiral Poindexter and Lt. Colonel North should be detailed to the American public. These men have spent a lifetime serving America, and are deserving of public commendation.

NOTES:

The appointment of a special prosecutor could be interpreted as an admission of guilt. Attorney General Meese should take the full 60

days allowed by law to conduct his investigation before any decision is made.

While the convening of a special session of Congress holds some merit, the historical rarity of such an action might contribute to a sense of urgency or crisis that is unwarranted if the recommended steps are taken.

ADDITIONAL NOTES:

At this time we know of no laws which have been broken.

Questions remain over the constitutionality of many of the laws which critics allege have been violated.

The media should be reminded that, in America, people are innocent until proven guilty.

In any event, due process will prevail. It should be stressed that if any laws have been broken, the perpetrators will be prosecuted.

During a struggle, the threat does not come from your own people. We should circle the wagons and avoid turning inward, to foster unity instead of division and chaos.



Dear Mr. President:

The Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence is continuing its investigation of covert arms sales to Iran and related matters. The Committee has conducted a series of hearings to date focusing principally on the role of the U.S. intelligence community in supporting the Iran operation. The Committee has reached a point in its investigation where it wishes to acquire a better understanding of events of interest within the National Security Council and the White House.

Mindful of your pledge of full cooperation with Congressional investigation of the Iran operation, the Committee requests the production of all records, documents, recordings, or other materials referring to or concerning:

- -- meetings between William J. Casey and Robert M. Gates with Vice Admiral John M. Poindexter on or about October 7, October 15, or November 6, 1986 relating to concerns about the security or possible diversion of funds from the Iran operation;
- -- a draft Presidential Finding transmitted by William J. Casey to Admiral John M. Poindexter on November 26, 1986;
- -- meetings of the National Security Council or National Security Planning Group concerning the Iran operation, any draft Presidential Finding authorizing the sale of arms to Iran, any discussion of meetings between U.S. and Iranian representatives from January 1, 1985 through December 15, 1986, concerning arms sales to Iran or the release of U.S. hostages;
- -- the use by, or diversion to, the contras or any source other than the U.S. Treasury of proceeds from sales of arms to Iran;
- -- any request from any member of the NSC staff to the Central Intelligence Agency or the Department of Defense for assistance in connection with arms sales to Iran or the release of U.S. hostages held in Lebanon;
- -- Any legal issue arising from the sale of arms to Iran or the diversion of the proceeds from such sales;

- -- any telephone or message communications, either secure or unsecure, of Lieutenant Colonel Oliver L. North or Lieutenant Colonel Robert Earl between January 1, 1985 and December 15, 1986 relating to Iran, U.S. hostages, or the contras;
- -- the nature and terms of employment or association, including salary or remuneration, with the National Security Council or the White House for the following individuals: Richard V. Secord, Albert Hakim, Robert Dutton, Raphael Quintero, Charles P. Tyson, Robert Lilac, or Michael Ledeen.

In addition, the Committee requests any records of telephone calls to or from Lieutenant Colonel North between January 1, 1985 and December 15, 1986.

The Committee also desires to interview the following NSC or White House officials:

Lieutenant Colonel Robert Earl, USMC Howard Teicher Paul Thompson Don Gregg Wilma Hall Fawn Hall Lieutenant Colonel Douglas Menarchik

These interviews would be conducted by the Committee's staff. The Committee may seek to interview other NSC or White House officials in the future.

In addition, the Committee wishes to receive the testimony of Donald Regan, and may wish to call any of the above-listed individuals as witnesses, on Thursday, December 18, 1986.

The Committee's point of contact for this request is Michael J. O'Neil, Chief Counsel.

It is my hope that the White House's prompt response to this request will aid the Committee's inquiry and permit the swift conclusion of its investigation into these matters.

Mr. President:

During the last two weeks, I have been following your dilemma with special interest. I have, for the last six years, been a great believer in what you have done. I am sincerely sorry to see that, during these last couple of weeks, you are ruining your place in the history of our country. I can't remember a President in the past that has taken his place in history before history was even written.

This evening, I watched you on national television and was very upset with what I saw and heard, Mr. President. It seems to me that a man of your character need not get himself involved with a country that, for the most part, is only interested in making Americans look like fools. I lear, President, that they have done so once again and you might very well be their goat. I write you this letter with the hope that you might actually read it.

I, Mr. President, have never been involved with people the likes of these Iranians. I worked with the U.S. Customs Department on an operation called EXODOS>. This operation was with an agent who worked undercover in a case against a man from Iran who hopped that the war between Iran and Iraq would not end - at least not before he had made a tidy profit off the arms he wanted the agent and me to help him purchase, for sale. This is but a very small part of this case; this man also said he had the means from Iran to purchase some \$500,000,000.00 for whatever armaments that we could help him purchase. One of the items this man told the U.S. Attorney and myself he needed was the TRIGGERING DEVICE for an ATOMIC BOMB. He claimed to have talked to the Ambassador to Iraq and, if Iraq did not want this device, he was sure that Iran would.

Mr. President, I put my life on the line for my country, but for what? It seems that you are above the law. I fully realize that we, the public, will never know the facts behind what you and your people did, but it seems to me that, as President, you OWE THE PUBLIC A FACTUAL ANSWER. If not, then maybe I was foolhardy in what I did for my country.

If you disagree with my thinking, I am sorry; but, from where I sit, it seems to me that the only persons benefitting from this covert action were the companies that you instructed to ship the armaments. Had I known that our own President was going to go against the law of the land, I might have had a change of heart and not gotten involved in Operation Exodus, a possible life threatening action. By the way, Mr. President, this action began, it seems, just about the same time your action began, about May of 1984?.

This is the first and probably the last time you will ever hear my name, if your secretary chooses to bring this letter to your attention. I'm sorry that the reason for this letter was to tell you that I believe you've let our country down; if nothing else, I feel that you've let me down and you don't even know me.

The Iranian people persist in thinking that Americans are just greedy, money-grabbing people. I'm afraid that we have just proved they were right. Our country, Mr. President, is certainly bigger than the both us; it needs leaders like you in its history. Please don't let us down.

Thank you, Mr. President, if by some small chance you might see this letter, for being understanding of my feelings and disappointment in the last few weeks. I hope that the next two years of your term in office are as fruitful for you as the last six years have been. After Operation Exodus was completed, I was proud to tell my friends that I had, in a very small way, helped my country. I have a feeling that this is what being President must be like - only in a much grander way.

Iran, Iraq attract arms smugglers with big-buck lures

SAN DIEGO - A convicted Iranian weapons smuggler and his Iranian partner in London offered to sell nuclear trigger devices called krytrons to Iraq as part of a bizarre, so-called , "peace plan" to end the war between Archran and Baghdad, according to account records and interviews with inairstigators.

🚉 San Diego dellestessen owner Vasser Abdulrahim (Max) Shoosh-.tary - who in May pleaded guilty to charges of trying to sell restricted radar equipment to Iran - met with ulragi intelligence agents and others oat Iraqi embassies in London and New York to negotiate the sale of

krytron devices, the records show. Authorities doubt Shooshtary and offis partner had access to - or that aghe Iraql military now possesses pruclear weapons. But the case illusdrates the brazen and mercenary methods of those dealing in weapons non the international black market yan, underground arms bazaar that afederal in: coments charge has lured amould-be profiteers from inside the inPentagon, the U.S. military supply .isystem and American business.

The Los Angeles Times Sunday re-

vealed details of how Iran operates as a major trader in that black market. mounting a multibillon-dollar, clandestine campaign to acquire the American-made weapons and military supplies - often regardless of price - that it needs to support its war against Iraq. Hundreds of Iranian agents and their collaborators. among them Shookhtary, are engaged in the effort to circumvent a U.S. arms embarge, the Times reported.

For Shooshtary and others attracted by the promise of substantial profits, the bitter Mideast conflict represents a potentially lucrative opportunity - regardless of their national loyalty.

To an undercover U.S. Customs Service agent - posing as a fellow smuggler - Shooshtary bluntly declared: "We want to make some money." He said Iran insists on buying primarily American military equipment because "you have the better quality, you know?" he added; !'These people are fanatics. They (even) want

American police motorcycles."

Citing conversations he said he had with Iranian officials in London, Shooshtary said Iran is shopping for "parts from motorcycles, from gunships ... (they want) helicopters. planes, accessories, anything we can get . . . computers

But noting the irony that America is regarded as "the great satant" by Iranian leaders, Shooshtary also said: "They (Iranians) get evirything from satan. . . . They are Mi-
