Dear Mayor Flynn:

I am responding to your letter to the President of April 23, concerning Northern Ireland and the President's trip to Ireland.

U.S. policy, as outlined by President Reagan in successive St. Patrick's Day messages, is consistent with that of previous administrations. U.S. policy emphasizes that it is not for outsiders to try to impose a particular solution to the Northern Ireland problem. Rather, we believe that the two communities in Northern Ireland, their elected leaders, and the governments of the Irish Republic and of the United Kingdom are fully capable of finding a solution within a democratic context.

We are encouraged by the strengthening of the Anglo-Irish dialogue over the past year, by the commitment of both governments to work together closely, and by the efforts of elected leaders in the New Ireland Forum to find a peaceful, democratic approach to the problems of Northern Ireland. In such circumstances, we believe the U.S. can help in a positive way, by encouraging job-creating investment and support for groups engaged in promoting reconciliation, such as Cooperation Ireland, rather than focusing on issues which are divisive.

On May 4, Irish Foreign Minister Peter Barry met with Deputy Secretary Kenneth Dam to brief him on the report of the New Ireland Forum. The Deputy Secretary assured the Foreign Minister that the U.S. will give the report full and careful study. He expressed our hope that the Forum process and the Forum report will strengthen Anglo-Irish cooperation in resolving the Northern Ireland problem and in furthering reconciliation between the two communities.

In recent human rights reports on the United Kingdom, including the one submitted to the Congress in January 1984 (copy enclosed), the Department of State has noted that both the British people and their government continually seek to maintain and improve the high quality of human rights practices domestically and to promote higher levels internationally. The Department has observed, however, that these long-standing traditions are daily

put to the test in Northern Ireland, where the British Government strives to combat terrorist violence -- the most significant human rights problem in the United Kingdom -- and to maintain public safety against a background of a deeply divided society. An all too typical example of such terrorist violence is the murder by the Provisional Irish Republic Army April 8 of a young school teacher, Mary Travers, as she and her father walked home from mass.

Both we and the White House appreciate receiving your timely and thoughtful views on the Northern Ireland problem. I hope that this letter responds to the concerns that you have raised.



Dear Mr. President:

I am writing to share some thoughts with you as you prepare for your trip to Ireland. It is my hope that your voyage will be productive and safe, and it is also my hope that you will see the trip as an opportunity to assert the United States' commitment to the upholding of human rights in the strife-torn north of Ireland.

As I write today, I join millions of Irish Americans and all Americans of good conscience in pausing to commemorate the 68th anniversary of the Easter Rising. That heroic event in 1916 led to the freedom of most of Ireland, and sounded a call for freedom and human rights that still echoes today. It echoes not only in the streets of Belfast and Derry, but in El Salvador, South Africa, and Afghanistan; in every village and nation in the world where fundamental human rights are denied.

As we reflect on the significance of the Easter Rising, it is timely to consider the thoughts of the late Terence Cardinal Cooke. In a statement shortly before his death in 1983, the cardinal spoke out on Northern Ireland.

"The continuing situation of injustice, suffering, and extremist terror in the north of Ireland is the primary issue facing us today and it must be addressed with urgency."

Cardinal Cooke also said, "As a son of Irish immigrants, whose parents and ancestors experienced this suffering and oppression, I would like to once again share my own convictions and call on my fellow American citizens, especially those of Irish heritage, to take very definite steps which will help the cause of peace, justice, freedom, and the restoration of basic human rights and equal opportunity in that troubled land."

As the leader of the Free World, and as President of the nation that is the home of freedom and opportunity, you are in a unique and important position to take up Cardinal Cooke's call. A deliberate and forceful statement from you will help to strengthen the final agreement among the parties who have been meeting in the New Ireland Forum. The upcoming forum report could provide an opening to frank discussion of the North in both Great Britain and the Republic of Ireland. The President of the United States has a part to play in any discussion of a legitimate quest for human rights, and your trip to Ireland and England in June will offer the opportunity to help this process in Ireland.

The need for fresh and determined initiatives in Northern Ireland has been described by many observers, but seldom as eloquently as by Sean MacBride, the winner of the 1974 Nobel Prize for Peace.

"Time after time, new internment camps, and prison camps, (have been) built and filled. Public Safety Acts, Emergency Powers Acts, Treason Acts, Offences Against the State Acts, Law Enforcement Acts and Special Powers Acts succeeded each other north and south, and have virtually destroyed the rule of law system which should prevail in any democratic state," Mr. MacBride wrote.

The tragic and violent, 62-year history of the statelet of Northern Ireland is rooted in violence. The leaders of the Irish movement for independence accepted the partition of their country under the threat of "immediate and terrible war." Today, that legacy of violence is the inheritance of the Catholic population of the North, on whom repressive laws and discrimination fall most heavily. To again refer to the statement of Cardinal Cooke, "The denial of human and civil rights is evidenced in employment, housing, education, and in the legal system of Northern Ireland."

You recently supported the Irish Prime Minister, Dr. Garrett FitzGerald, in his plea to Congress to disarm the men of violence in Northern Ireland. I would suggest that the next logical step is to call into question the environment of violence in which these groups are born.

While we condemn the symptoms of violence in Ireland we must also work to end the cause of that violence. We must make human rights for Ireland an important goal, to be pursued aggressively.

I trust that you will consider these ideas as you prepare for your trip, for, as the Bible tells us, "Peace will come only when justice prevails."

You have agreed to meet with Irish Ambassador <u>Tadhg</u> O'Sullivan on May 29. The Ambassador will be accompanied by his Political Counselor, Jim Sharkey, who in my view is a more astute observer of the American scene than the Ambassador.

O'Sullivan's reason for requesting the meeting is that he has never met you, and in my words, he wants "instant recognition" when he sees you in Ireland.

He also, I suspect, will be promoting greater White House "activity" in connection with the report of the New Ireland Forum. O'Sullivan sought a Presidential statement when the report was released on May 2 (we let State take the lead), and it was my impression that O'Sullivan was out in front of Foreign Minister Barry because as soon as Barry arrived in town, O'Sullivan's lobbying efforts ceased.

O'Sullivan will want to review the President's trip to Ireland and may well suggest that positive Presidential statements about the Forum's report will help dampen down expected protests about Central America. Our policy is for the President to praise the work of the Forum and offer encouragement, but to stop short of endorsing any specific plan.

The brief reporting message at Tab A on Ambassador Price's meeting with Northern Ireland Secretary Jim Prior gives a concise, and I believe realistic, analysis of the way forward from Britain's perspective.


