SUBJECT: Begin's Soviet Prison Memoirs

Israel Prime Minister Menachem Begin, who will visit Washington on September 9-10, wrote a book entitled <u>White Nights</u> -- his memoirs as a political prisoner in the Soviet Union in 1940-41. The book was published first in 1957.

The Soviet authorities arrested Begin in Lithuania in September 1940 for Zionist activities. Begin had been the head in Poland of Betar (bay-tar), a Zionist youth organization which drew inspiration from the teachings of the Zionist leader Ze'ev Jabotinsky.

White Nights begins with an account of Begin's arrest and covers his interrogation, his time in Lukishki prison, his transfer to a frozen prison camp in northern Russia, his release, and his departure from the Soviet Union. Though Begin was sentenced to eight years, he was released, along with other Polish citizens in Soviet prisons, soon after the Nazis invaded the Soviet Union. Hence Begin served a little less than one year of his term.

In White Nights, Begin reveals many of the traits that characterize him as Israel's Prime Minister today. He turned his interrogation by the fearsome NKVD, the KGB's predecessor, into a negotiation by refusing to sign his "confession" until the word "confess" was changed to "admit" (Chap. 8, pp. 90-96). Begin refused to submit to his NKVD interrogators on this point because it was a matter of principle; the dignity of the Zionist cause was linked, in Begin's view, to that choice of "admit" over "confess."

Personal dignity and correct manners are profoundly important to Begin. The book relates how one NKVD interrogator, in a moment of anger, switched from a formal to an informal form of address to Begin, who demanded (and received) an apology therefor.

I have highlighted certain passages in the book. Those in which Begin discusses his commitment to Zionism and his conviction that "there is room in Palestine ... for the Arabs, for millions of Jews, and for peace" (pp. 64, 74-75, 240) are especially noteworthy.

Dear Mr. Allen:

This is merely a letter to express my personal view that it is long overdue for our country to insist that Israel either seek accommodation with the Arab governments or give up the bountiful largesse that we have provided. I am not as sophisticated as I would prefer to be on the issue but I find myself in full approval of Professor Richard Ullman's strong admonition for such a move as was suggested in his July 14 column in the New York Times.

Many of us are unable to fathem how a minority lobbying group can so effectively make itself heard in the Congress and at the White House. My hunch is that there are far more of us who, although supportive of a secure Israeli state, can no longer accept that government's intransigence. Mr. Reagan may very well discover another "silent majority" anxious to see our policy carry conditions of conservative accountability in our relationships with Israel.

SUBJECT: Thoughts on Legality of Israel's West Bank Settlements

At the staff meeting this morning I promised you a memo concerning the Legality of Israel's West Bank Settlements.

- -- In February 1981, President Reagan noted that the Carter Administration had labelled the settlements "illegal." President Reagan observed, "They are not."
- -- The settlements are legal, but the issue is properly a political question, not a legal question.
- -- The USG has recognized no country's sovereignty over the West Bank since Britain controlled the area under the Palestine Mandate.
- -- The issue of sovereignty is open and will not be closed until the actual parties to the conflict formally consent to a peace agreement.
- -- In the meantime, there is no law that bars Jews from settling on the West Bank. No one should be excluded from an area simply on account of nationality or religion.
- -- An ambiguous response concerning the legality of settlements inadvertently causes more press interest than either: 1) a finding that settlements are legal or 2) a statement that the legal question is irrelevant.
