

SUBJECT: U.S. Travel Service

I did not give you a clear answer to your question on the Travel Service at the Senior Staff meeting on June 4th. Briefly, our position and legislative situation are as follows. We have proposed:

- ° An increase of \$3.5 million over the Carter Budget of \$3 million for the Travel Service (USTS) in 1982. However, the \$6.5 million request is still less than the 1981 appropriation of \$8 million.
- ° Integration of the USTS with the International Trade Administration (ITA) in order to consolidate Commerce's trade promotion programs.
- ° Nomination of Fred Bush for Assistant Secretary for Tourism (a post that was vacant during much of the previous Administration).

Our efforts to strengthen the USTS are partially designed as a counter-proposal to the tourism bills currently under consideration by the Congress:

S. 304, the National Tourism Policy Act - This bill establishes an independent U.S. Travel and Tourism Administration and an Advisory Board dominated by industry representatives and reporting to the Congress. S. 304 passed the Senate by voice vote on January 27, 1981. (An identical bill was passed by the Congress in 1980 and vetoed by President Carter.)

H.R. 1311 is the version of S. 304 under consideration in the House. While it does not set up an independent agency, it does add a new Under Secretary for Travel and Tourism to the Department of Commerce, introduces financial assistance for regional tourism programs, and mandates nine new USTS offices overseas. H.R. 1311 has been reported out of the Energy and Commerce Committee and referred to the Post Office and Civil Service Committee (which has until June 19, 1981, to report out the bill).

S. 1105, which is the least objectionable of the three bills, reauthorizes USTS' enabling legislation. Although it was introduced to keep USTS alive in the event that the other bills did not pass, it was passed by the Senate on June 2nd. It authorizes \$8.6 million for the USTS in 1982, prohibits the integration of USTS with ITA, and mandates a certain level of overseas resources.

We are currently concentrating our efforts on obtaining changes to H.R. 1311 in the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee. Commerce believes that the tourism industry will likely block S. 1105 and we will ultimately see H.R. 1311 pass the House with the Under Secretary deleted. If H.R. 1311 emerges as the final bill from the conference, the President could then be faced with a difficult veto decision.

The President today announced the appointments of the 1981-82 White House Fellows. This is the seventeenth class of Fellows since the program began in 1964.

The 15 Fellows were chosen from among 1650 applicants and screened by 11 regional panels. The President's Commission on White House Fellowships, chaired by Vice Admiral James B. BACKGROUND: We are attempting to secure passage of the Block Grants in a form as near as possible to the Administration's proposal as part of the reconciliation process. These proposed phone calls are to be a signal of your personal commitment to the Block Grant legislation.
