2. SBA Section 8a: Concerns expressed for minority business firms will go bankrupt without phase-out of program. Elizabeth Dole will furnish additional input; Ed Harper will have the action in view of OMB's formulating regulations. Dole/Harper
3. Cabinet Council on Economic Affairs will be held at 8:45 a.m. today chaired by Ed Meese.
4. Davis-Bacon: The letter has been agreed to by all parties and sent to the Associated Builders and Contractors.
5. Use of Aircraft by WH Personnel: Fred Fielding is preparing (2) memos to go out on this subject. Before being released, Ed Meese would like to review. Fielding
6. UDAG: Marty Anderson has spoken to Secretary Pearce. Secretary Pearce has agreed not to release report. Craig Fuller is to contact Pearce to assure report is not released. Marty Anderson is to have report reviewed immediately. Fuller/Anderson

(b) Elliot Abrams will be announced as the Assistant Secretary of State for Human Rights and Humanitarian Affairs. If questioned, the announcement should be a strong statement with Presidential quotes. Our human rights statement should be gotten out with the announcement with Presidential quotes.

(c) Foreign Policy lunch is scheduled in the Roosevelt Room with Haig in attendance. Many press heavies include George Wills in attendance.

8. PATCO: All contacts with would-be negotiators should be resisted. Staff should make no comment on appointments with would-be negotiators brokering PATCO recommendations. All calls and requests should be forwarded to Secretary Drew Lewis.
9. Productivity Council: Bill Simon has asked to hold all appointments until January 1982. If Council is part of the Economic Program and important, why the delay? Ed Meese will talk with Roger Porter at the 8:45 a.m. Cabinet Council meeting to determine action necessary.

Following the third plenary session, the President and his advisers held a meeting and luncheon at the Cancún Sheraton Hotel with Prince Fahd of Saudi Arabia and members of the Saudi Arabian delegation.

The President attended the fourth and final session of the International Meeting on Cooperation and Development.

In the evening, the President attended a dinner at the Cancún Sheraton Hotel in honor of President José López Portillo.

October 24

In the morning, the President and his advisers held separate meetings at the Cancún Sheraton Hotel with Prime Minister Azizur Rahman of Bangladesh and members of the Bangladeshi delegation; Executive President Forbes Burnham of Guyana and members of the Guyanan delegation; and Secretary General Kurt Waldheim of the United Nations.

The President left the Cancún Sheraton Hotel and, following a departure ceremony at the Cancún International Airport, returned to the United States.

The President declared a major disaster for the State of Texas as a result of severe storms and flooding beginning on or about October 12, 1981, which caused extensive property damage.

"The President was thoroughly examined at Bethesda Naval Hospital on October 29-30, 1981, by a team of 14 specialists in five medical fields. Preliminary oral reports have been provided, pending complete written reports which will be submitted within the next few days. There are a number of routine laboratory tests which will be analyzed over the weekend.

The President is in excellent health. His blood pressure, pulse, and respiratory functions are normal. He is fully recovered from gunshot wounds suffered on March 30.

The President was accompanied by Mrs. Reagan for their annual physicals. Mrs. Reagan is also in excellent health."

SUBJ: The 1965 Voting Rights Act

As you know, the Voting Rights Act has been the subject of review and debate for some time now.

Although I have not seen a report from the Justice Department, it is my understanding that the report offers four alternatives. Three of the alternatives essentially call for modification of the bail out procedure. The fourth recommends simple extension for five years.

I recommend that the President voice his strong support for a simple extension of the Bill. My rationale for this position is influenced by several observations:

1. The President should not be drawn into a protracted debate on this sensitive issue and be forced to argue for alternative approaches---preclearance/no preclearance, bailout/no bailout, etc. That path is laden with pitfalls. The President should simply support extension of the Bill and allow the Congress to debate possible modifications.
2. History should show that President Reagan clearly supported the Voting Rights Act without restrictions, conditions and stipulations which may have compromised the Act's effectiveness.
3. Action or inaction on this issue carries great political significance. If the President and/or the Republican Party are perceived as the enemy of the Voting Rights Bill, a national political backlash could develop, particularly in the South. There would be impetus for a massive mobilization of black voter registration and "education" using the Republican Party as the object of opposition. The results of such a mobilization could be disastrous to the ground gained in recent years. Southern Republican elected officials could suffer losses and setbacks because large numbers of southern blacks, many of whom ordinarily would not vote, would surely vote against the Republican candidates.
4. The President regards voting as the most sacred right of free men and women. The American people share this sentiment. It is safe to assume that the public expects the President to protect this right in the normal course of his duties as head of State.

SUBJECT: WHITE HOUSE PASS SYSTEM

It has come to my attention that certain White House Staff members sometimes neglect to follow the guidelines of the White House Pass System. Let me remind you of the procedures which should be followed by all staff members:

- All staff members shall display their White House or EOB passes at all times with the exception of Assistants to the President and others so designated because of function.
- All staff members clearing appointment(s) into the East/Wing complex shall meet the appointment(s) in the appropriate lobby area. Appointment(s) must be escorted at all times, including back to the lobby when leaving the complex. This includes administration officials from other departments and agencies.
- All staff members bringing guest(s) to the East or West Wings for a tour shall remain with the guest(s) at all times, including back to the lobby at the conclusion of the tour.
- Staff not permanently housed in the West Wing should enter only in the conduct of official business.

I have asked the Secret Service to report any violations to John Rogers, Special Assistant to the President for Administration.
