SUBJECT: Puerto Rican Statehood Statement

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BACKGROUND/PUERTO RICAN STATUS

Since 1952, Puerto Rico has been a "Commonwealth" of the United States, a relationship which makes the island neither a state of the Union nor a territory of the U.S. The issue of Puerto Rico's political status -- whether it should remain a Commonwealth or seek statehood or independence from the United States -- is the single most important issue which dominates the island's local politics.

Political change is inevitable in Puerto Rico. Commonwealth was never intended to be a permanent condition for the island. Today, all political groups within Puerto Rico are dissatisfied with the current arrangement. It is rejected as having vestiges of colonialism not only by the small minority of Puerto Ricans who favor independence, but also by the majority who now favor statehood for the island. Even supporters of the current Commonwealth system of government favor major changes in restructuring the island's relationship with the United States.

There are three major alternatives to Puerto Rico's political future. They are: statehood, independence, or a continuation of the current Commonwealth system.

Shortly before leaving office in 1976, President Gerald Ford announced his support for statehood. The 1980 Republican Party platform supports admission into the union after a majority of the island's residents freely so determine. President Jimmy Carter said his Administration would support whatever status was chosen by the people of Puerto Rico in a democratic referendum, including statehood. The 1980 Democratic Party platform was consistent with the Carter policy. And both the United States Senate and the U.S. House of Representatives have passed resolutions pledging to support that status which is chosen by the people of Puerto Rico, including statehood.

When candidate Ronald Reagan announced his intentions to seek the 1980 Republican Presidential nomination, his televised

speech to the nation included a commitment to support statehood for Puerto Rico, should that be the choice of the people of Puerto Rico.

In the February 11, 1980, Wall Street Journal article, "Puerto Rico and Statehood," Ronald Reagan said:

"When I formally announced my intention to seek the Presidential nomination in 1980, my televised speech to the nation included a commitment to not only support statehood for Puerto Rico if the people of the island Commonwealth desire statehood. It also included a commitment that as President, I would initiate statehood legislation, which really means that I would take the lead in persuading the people of Puerto Rico -- the Mainland United States -- all American citizens -- that Statehood will be good for all of us."

On Monday, September 28, 1981, Vice President Bush confirmed the Reagan Administration's support for Puerto Rican statehood at a GOP rally in San Juan.

On October 8, 1981, Former Governor Luis Ferre and Mayor Hernan Padilla expressed their appreciation for Vice President Bush's visit to Puerto Rico and noted their wish for a "personal and official statement" by President Reagan on Puerto Rican statehood.

#### RECOMMENDATION

I suggest that it is to the President's advantage to make a public statement reaffirming his position on Puerto Rican statehood for the following reasons:

- A reaffirmation of Puerto Rico's right of self-determination and an expression of the President's personal preference for statehood would reinforce the President's expressed desire to strengthen the United States' position in the Caribbean (i.e., the Caribbean Basin Initiative).
- A statehood statement would strengthen the U.S. position with regard to the United Nations' Decolonization Debate. A statement will provide President Reagan the opportunity to stress the fact that the United States citizens in Puerto Rico enjoy the right of self-determination and thus have the ability to determine their relationship with the United States government.
- President Reagan's supporters and Republicans in Puerto Rico are taking a great deal of criticism as a result of

the President's Economic Recovery Program and the requisite budget cuts. Our friends have held fast in defending the President and a statement by the President restating his "preference" of statehood for Puerto Rico would reinforce their efforts.

- The absence of a public statement by the President on Puerto Rican statehood since his election is becoming an embarrassment to the "pro-statehood" Republican leaders in Puerto Rico (Mayor Hernan Padilla, Luis Ferre).

A pro-statehood statement by President Reagan should contain the following points:

- The Reagan Administration supports the basic concept of self-determination for Puerto Rico, as has been the cornerstone of U.S. policy towards the island for nearly three decades. The Reagan Administration would actively support that status option -- whether it be statehood, independence or a modified version of commonwealth status -- the people of Puerto Rico choose as the result of a peaceful and democratic process.
- President Reagan's personal preference for statehood as the best of all available alternatives for Puerto Rico and the United States. The President could express his confidence that the U.S. Congress and the American people would support statehood for Puerto Rico were it the choice of a majority of the island's population.
- The Reagan Administration would support the idea of working with Puerto Rico on a mutually-agreeable transition from Commonwealth to any other form of status, once approved by the Congress of the United States. Such a statement would assure the people of Puerto Rico that whatever alternative is chosen and accepted by the U.S. would occur in a smooth and orderly manner.
- The Reagan Administration recognizes that the status issue is one that will be resolved by the peoples and governments of the United States and Puerto Rico. The Reagan Administration should discourage other nations (such as Cuba and her allies) as well as international organizations (such as the United Nations) from interfering in the resolution of this issue. This is current U.S. policy, and should be reemphasized in any future statement by the President on this issue.
- President Reagan should express the respect and appreciation we feel for the strong democratic institutions and traditions which exist in Puerto Rico and note the positive effect of such a strong democracy in the Caribbean.

- Particular note should be made of the vitality and richness of the Puerto Rican (Hispanic) culture, and that Puerto Rico's language and culture would be respected.
- The Reagan Administration's commitment to working with Puerto Rico, through the Puerto Rican Task Force, on its economic problems.
- President Reagan should emphasize that Puerto Ricans are United States Citizens and that they have honorably served in the U.S. Armed Forces.

If a pro-statehood statement is to be made by President Reagan, I suggest the following:

- The statement should be made at the White House.
- The following Puerto Rican officials should be invited to meet with the President and Vice President for the ceremony.

Mayor Hernan Padilla  
Commissioner Baltazar Corrada

- The statement should be made on November 19, 1981, the anniversary of Puerto Rico's discovery in 1493.

Vice President Bush, the Office of the Ambassador to the United Nations and the White House Office of Policy Development have reviewed and approved the above recommendation.

SUBJECT: Senator Baker/Naval Training Base - Memphis, Tenn.

Senator Howard Baker, the Senate Majority Leader, advises that he is opposed to the proposal by Secretary of Defense Weinberger to close the Naval Training Base in Memphis, Tennessee.

Senator Baker describes this situation as important to him as TVA, and that he not only wants the base retained but wants it expanded.

Senator Baker said he considers this situation as politically a must.

Senator Baker said he is under constant attack in Memphis by the media and that Memphis is the Democratic western part of the state where he has most of his political troubles.

Senator Baker said that if he cannot produce on this issue it will be very damaging to him politically, and also his ability to perform well and mute his critics in that area.

As I understand the issue, the Secretary is proposing to move the Memphis facility to Pensacola, Florida.

SUBJECT: Senator John Heinz (R-Pa.)

I have received a request and an appeal from Senator John Heinz, from Pennsylvania, for the President to be the featured speaker at a fundraiser (\$750-\$1000 per head) in Philadelphia next January 25 or 26, 1982.

Senator Heinz has appealed to Senator Baker to intercede on his behalf, and I have also received a request from Senator Baker on this matter.

Heinz said he received a letter dated October 30th from Gregg Newell turning down his request.

Heinz says that this will be a major event and will be featured as an anniversary birthday party commemorating the President's inauguration, etc., etc.

Heinz insists, and Senator Baker verified to me, that Heinz had given his commitment to vote favorably on the AWACS vote if needed and was released by the Majority Leader prior to the vote because the necessary votes were available.

I have no independent knowledge of this commitment by Senator Heinz, but Senator Baker has reiterated to me the commitment that he had from Senator Heinz.

Senator Heinz has requested that I appeal the decision to the Big Three and get back to him as soon as possible with a favorable answer so that planning for the event can be started.

Senator Baker has indicated that both the votes of Senators Heinz and Kasten were available if needed on AWACS.

SUMMARY

As you know, state and official visits by foreign leaders provide unique opportunities for advancing our foreign policy interests. Since we cannot, and should not, accommodate all high level visitors who wish to travel here, I have compiled a priority list of 16 essential visits for the period from January to June, 1982.

Three of these visits (Premier Zhao of China, President Marcos of the Philippines, and President Moubarek of Egypt) have already been approved by the White House and invitations extended. The other thirteen visits have been carefully selected from a wide range of potentially useful events.

RECOMMENDATION

That you approve the following visits or office calls in addition to the three visits already approved:

1. Spanish Prime Minister Calvo Sotelo. His visit would be timed to celebrate both the Spanish NATO entry and the successful negotiation of a new bilateral agreement.

2. Italian President Pertini. Has sought a visit for more than one year. An invitation to him would be viewed by the Italians as an important signal of the value we place on our bilateral relations.

4. Greek President Karamanlis. It has been 20 years since a Greek head of state or government has visited the U.S. His visit would create a favorable climate for the resumption of DECA negotiations.

5. The Next Belgian Prime Minister. He will serve as President of the EC Council of Heads of Government from January-June, 1982. The President traditionally receives the holder of this office and should certainly receive the Belgian for bilateral reasons (TNF) as well.

6. President Zia of Pakistan. In view of our new relationship with Pakistan, an official visit by Zia would serve to deepen and strengthen these ties. An invitation would underscore the US commitment to Pakistan and would enhance Zia's prestige.

7. Prime Minister Gandhi of India. This would contribute significantly to our mounting effort to maintain constructive ties with India, now strained by differences over regional policies.

10. President Gaafar Mohamed Nimeiri of Sudan. Sudan faces a serious threat from Libya, is a major recipient of U.S. security assistance, has offered U.S. access to military facilities in the event of an emergency in the Near East/Persian Gulf region, is a supporter of the Camp David agreement and process, and is attempting to gain acceptance for Egypt in Arab councils.

11. President Sese Seko Mobutu of Zaire. A meeting would underscore the U.S. pledge to help maintain Zaire's stability at a time when economic and political issues are becoming more volatile. Continued stability is essential to safeguard Zaire's pro-Western stance in regional and world fora, because of its strategic position in Central Africa and to preserve Western access to its vital mineral deposits.

Senator Baker said he considers this situation as politically a must.

Senator Baker said he is under constant attack in Memphis by the media and that Memphis is the Democratic western part of the state where he has most of his political troubles.

Senator Baker said that if he cannot produce on this issue it will be very damaging to him politically, and also his ability to perform well and mute his critics in that area.

As I understand the issue, the Secretary ~~is~~ proposing to move the Memphis facility to Pensacola, Florida.

SUBJECT: MX/B-1 Bomber issue

Senator Laxalt called me today after horseback riding with the President and said he had discussed the issue of MX and B-1 Bomber and had recommended the President convene, as soon as possible, a meeting of the Senate Defense Appropriations Subcommittee, where we are having difficulty with the MX/B-1 issue.

Senator Laxalt advised me that the President indicated his desire to have such a meeting as soon as possible to advise the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee members that he was determined to go forward with the MX/B-1 program and obtain adequate funding for these projects.

Senator Laxalt's advise is well taken, and actually our problems in this subcommittee stem somewhat from negative comments made in recent hearings by the chairman of the subcommittee, Senator Ted Stevens of Alaska.

I don't believe Stevens will out right oppose the President on this, but I do believe a meeting with the President by the subcommittee, probably including just the Republicans, would be helpful in setting the record straight at this time on the President's position.

We might want to consider including the Democrats, because some of our staunchest allies on the Democratic side of the aisle are on this Appropriations Subcommittee, such as Stennis, Huddleston, Johnston and Hollings.

I recommend that such a meeting be scheduled as soon as the President's schedule permits. We will also need to advise Senator Tower of this meeting. He is strongly supporting the President on the B-1 Bomber and needs to be kept advised of our work within the Appropriations Subcommittee.
