SUBJECT: NEGOTIATIONS ON SOVIET GRAIN AND MARITIME AGREEMENTS

I have attached the memorandum given to me by Ed Meese on the above matter.

State believes that any action now, given the Poland situation, would be inappropriate. It was suggested that Senator Dole be informed that the State Department was reviewing the matter in light of recent developments.

With regard to grain, Secretary Haig has already indicated that he would not want negotiations to begin until after his talks with Gromyko on January 26, 1982.

The first American-Soviet Maritime Agreement meeting did indeed reach an impasse as Senator Dole pointed out. State will check on how best to approach this matter.

I will follow-up with State in a week, if this approach is satisfactory.

Re: Negotiations on Soviet Grain and Maritime Agreements

Since consultations on the one-year extension of the U.S./U.S.S.R. Grains Agreement were held in early October, there has been no official communication with the Soviet Union regarding scheduling of talks on the terms of a possible successor agreement, to become effective in October 1982. Ambassador Brock agreed in August to begin these negotiations in late November or early December. An invitation for new talks drafted by the Department of Agriculture has been held up by the State Department for the past six weeks.

Our failure to pursue a consistent policy in reestablishing agricultural trade relations is creating increasing confusion in the U.S.S.R., which is continuing efforts to maximize grain imports from other suppliers. As a result, U.S. corn and wheat prices have fallen to life-of-contract lows at a time when we are urging farmers to accept a more market-oriented approach to farm legislation.

Discussions on the related American-Soviet Maritime Agreement reached an impasse last week when the Department of Transportation proposed to increase the minimum U.S.-flag freight rate for grain shipped under the Grains Agreement from the current \$25-\$30 per ton to a minimum of \$60 per ton. Such an increase in the subsidy guarantee to the U.S. merchant marine is not warranted, and failure to resolve the issue before the expiration of the current accord at the end of December will add further uncertainty to the future of U.S.-Soviet trade.

I would strongly encourage and greatly appreciate timely action by the Administration to ensure that talks on a new long-term grain supply agreement are initiated before the end of January. Due to the impact which the terms of the Maritime Agreement will have on the grain talks, I would also recommend that the current accord be extended for one year so that negotiations on both agreements can be carried out concurrently.

Current law provided for a \$3,000 maximum deduction members of Congress could take for their living expenses each year as a result of living in Washington while retaining homes in their district. They could take this \$3,000 without substantiation (on the assumption that their actual costs were much higher.)

In the Continuing Resolution, as signed by the President, the Congress simply lifted that \$3,000 cap and put members of Congress on the same footing as everyone else. They can take whatever living expenses they can substantiate. This is, of course, especially important with regard to housing, which is their major extraordinary cost, in the case of those who maintain two residences.

But the Congress acted without consulting Finance Com. staff.

And so, no one noticed that the new law would run head on against Section 280 A of the Tax Code, concerning vacation homes. NO ONE, at all, can take a deduction for expenses concerning a vacation property, which is defined as housing which is used 14 days or more for vacation purposes.

So: under the Continuing Resolution's provision -- which, by the way, changes substantive law, and does not expire on March 31, 1982 -- single members of Congress will be able to deduct expenses for their DC homes, assuming they have a residence back in their State. But married members, whose families use their DC homes, technically, as a vacation residence, could take no deductions at all for their Washington residences.

That is why the House yesterday included in its Miscellaneous Tax Bill a provision to clear up this confusion. The Senate will act today. The upshot of the final language will be to make clear that a D.C. residence is not a vacation home within the purview of Section 280A.

(Note: The lifting of the \$3,000 limit applies to all business expenses as a result of living in D.C. The confusion under Section 280A, however, is limited only to the housing expenses.)

(Note: The real problem will be how members substantiate their expense deductions. That will be their headache, not ours.)

(Note: Treasury is taking an absolutely hands-off stance on this.)

You asked that I poll Senior Staff regarding parking fees. I requested comments after Senior Staff this morning. The deadline was this evening. The following is a summary of comments received.

OMB (Counsel): In favor -- for various reasons
[See memo attached.]

Fuller and Weidenbaum: In favor

Anderson: On balance, favor modest user fee."

Cicconi: Opposed -- on political grounds; if fee nonetheless, suggests token (see note.)

Nofziger: Opposed -- on grounds that reimposition would threaten the seats of Congressmen Stan Parris and Frank Wolfe, 30% of whose constituents are Government employees.

Rogers: Opposed -- On grounds (a) that administrative burden is high relative to the return in fees, and (b) that fees would have a negative impact on staff who are already making significant sacrifices.

Jenkins: Opposed -- "because I don't know how they could be made equitable."

Fridersdorf: See memo attached reporting on attitudes of Wolfe, Parris, and Lott; and recommending that if fees are reimposed, they should be "coupled with a strong recommendation that this also apply to Congress."

You may wish to discuss this at breakfast. (There will not be a clear consensus among senior staff.)

The Court of Appeals has today unanimously reversed the District Court ruling on the above subject, and held that the United States has full authority under present law to impose parking fee charges on federal employees.

The press has been heavily telephoning OMB and OPM, and a decision regarding federal policy must be made quickly -- probably either late today or at tomorrow's Senior Staff meeting. I am somewhat hazy as to the working decisions previously made by Senior Staff, but was advised by Fred Fielding, who called, that the operating decision is not only not to seek payment of fee obligations that may have accrued during the appeals period, but also to abandon any prospective claim to fees.

This is somewhat old ground, but Annelise and I believe, with respect to prospective fees, that a decision to require parking fees should be made. There are a number of reasons for our view, some of them reflecting significantly changed circumstances since the Senior Staff decision was made:

- o A sharply enhanced interest in user fees on our part and the likelihood that we may soon be asking for statutory authority to impose such user fees on large numbers of private sector parties. How in the world will we be able to ask for such user fees if and as we decide to play Santa Claus to our own employees?
- o A major premise of the earlier Senior Staff decision related to the pay cap and pay compression for senior federal employees. This condition has of course been significantly abated by the Continuing Resolution.
- o A revenue loss estimated by our examiner to be in the neighborhood of \$40 million per year. In this regard, parking is not a free good to the government, and the tentative Senior Staff decision does not merely involve foregoing revenues of \$40 million per year. Agencies are required by statute to pay Standard Level User Charges to

GSA from their appropriations for parking facilities used by their employees. GSA actually pays for employee parking.

In addition, other arguments weigh heavily in favor of a parking fee charge:

- o All we need to do in this matter is to do nothing -- standing, operative parking fee directives of the Carter Administration need to be affirmatively reversed in order to permit free parking by federal employees. The fact that we will have voluntarily waived approximately nine months of parking fee charges which we have the right to seek under the stipulation with the employee union plaintiffs should give us more than enough political credit with federal employees.
- o As to the country at large, it may not bode well to be giving free parking to federal employees under circumstances where most urban employees do not receive that benefit. The fact that the Continuing Resolution just effected a major pay raise for senior federal employees may make the political fallout from a free parking policy even greater.
- o It is somewhat inconsistent to provide free parking while we at the same time subsidize mass transit. Here in Washington, with a Metro system now in serious financial difficulty (in part by reason of our budget decisions), free parking is likely to be viewed by local officials (if on a somewhat off the record basis) as a harmful policy.

On this matter, Dave's views have been consistent and strong. He favors full commercial rate parking fees.

Per your request this morning, I am sending along the attached memo from Nancy Risque and B. Oglesby concerning the attitude on the Hill on parking fees for Federal workers.

I would add that if the decision is to reimpose parking fees for Federal workers, it should be coupled with a strong recommendation that this also apply to Congress.

The last time when Carter applied these parking fees, it was applicable to Federal workers, and Congress indicated it would study the situation and impose the fees on itself. Of course, this never happened, and if we are going to do this to the Federal workers, the equity insofar as the public is concerned, would be more apparent if Congress were included.

I do not feel it is politically wise to reinstitute parking fees. Due to the court injunction, it would seem that it was Reagan, not Carter, now imposing it. Thus, it would not be an action the President could easily disassociate himself with, or blame on Carter. Further, the timing of such a gesture from the President at Christmas would be fantastic.

If we do not feel we can entirely back away from a fee, then I would argue that it be only a token fee (akin to a user fee) designed not to raise revenue, but to:

- a. encourage use of mass transit
- b. discourage abuse of spaces
- c. help pay for parking lot maintenance.

Perhaps the token fee could be as much as \$10 to \$15 a month, but certainly no more than that.

Reagan Finds No Time for Auto Summit

By Ed Petykiewicz
 WASHINGTON — White House aides, saying the president is too busy in the immediate future, have refused to convene a summit meeting to deal with the problem-plagued automobile industry.

The White House rejection was delivered Monday to members of Congress in a terse letter and immediately triggered sharp criticism from both Republicans and Democrats who asked for the presidential summit.

"This is incomprehensible; it is incredible," said Rep. J. Bob Traxler, D-Bay City. "If the president has time for movies, ceremonies and taking naps, he must have time for the plight of the troubled auto industry and the hundreds of thousands of laid-off workers."

At least 45 congressmen and senators requested the

session, including the entire Michigan congressional delegation, which in October asked that Reagan convene the conference. Gov. William G. Milliken has made similar requests.

The bipartisan group sought the White House summit in an attempt to forge a unified solution to problems of the slumping auto industry, which has seen new car sales drop to the lowest level in 20 years.

The White House letter rejecting the summit conference was signed by Gregory J. Newell, special assistant to the president in charge of scheduling.

"Although the concern you have expressed over the depressed state of the American automobile industry is appreciated, a time is not foreseen in the immediate future when the meeting you urge can be arranged in view of the heavy schedule now confronting the pres-

ident," the letter states.

Rep. Dale E. Kildee, D-Flint, described the White House rejection as outrageous. His district, which includes many auto plants, has been racked by unemployment which has hit 17.5 percent.

"I find this incredible," said Kildee. "To say he (Reagan) doesn't have time to address the needs of an industry that touches almost all other industries is outrageous. I have never seen such an insensitive letter from the White House."

A spokesman for Rep. Jim Dunn, R-East Lansing, said the first-term lawmaker was disappointed in the White House's decision. The aide said Dunn will press Reagan during an upcoming meeting to focus attention on the auto industry. Dunn's meeting is tentatively set for early January.

Traxler and several other lawmakers, including Sen. Donald W. Riegle, D-Mich., said they would continue to push for the summit.

"Almost 45 percent of the United Auto Workers voted for him (Reagan) and now he is saying that he is too busy to talk to them," said Traxler. "We will not give up."

White House support for the summit is generally considered crucial because problems hitting the automobile industry are widespread and are tied to the nation's overall economic condition.

Michigan congressmen asked that top labor and industry officials be invited to the session "to discuss the problems facing the industry and determine what might be done on a cooperative basis to reinvigorate this essential sector of our national economy."
