## Business Aide to Reagan Criticizes Food Stamps

DALLAS, May 27 (UPI) — J. Peter Grace, a businessman who heads President Reagan's Government spending watchdog committee, said today the Federal food stamp program was basically a subsidy for Puerto Ricans.

Mr. Grace, the chairman and chief executive officer of W.R. Grace & Company, dwelt on the percentage of the food stamp budget going to Puerto Ricans in a speech before the American Feed and Grain Manufacturers Association. Mr. Grace heads President Reagan's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control in the Federal Government.

While the thrust of his address was that the American public "should get off President Reagan's back so he can get Government off our backs," Mr. Grace said that of the Carter Administration's \$12.7 billion food stamp budget, \$1.04 billion had been scheduled to go to Puerto Rico.

He said Mr. Reagan reduced those figures, and the total for the fiscal year 1982 was estimated at \$11.5 billion, of which \$904 million went to Puerto Rico.

"This figure does not include 2.1 million Puerto Ricans living in the U.S.," Mr. Grace said. Then departing from a

prepared text, he added that "900,000 live in New York, and they're all on food stamps, so this food stamp program is basically a Puerto Rican program."

"I've got nothing against Puerto Ricans," he said, "but this is a little much."

Within hours, Representative Robert Garcia, Democrat of the Bronx, head of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus, sent a telegram to the President requesting Mr. Grace's resignation. He said Mr. Grace's statement was "as racist as anything I have ever heard in my 17 years of elective office."

REAGAN OFFICIAL: "I'VE GOT NOTHING AGAINST PUERTO RICANS"

DALLAS (UPI) -- THE HEAD OF PRESIDENT REAGAN'S GOVERNMENT SPENDING WATCHDOG COMMITTEE CALLED THE FEDERAL FOOD STAMP PROGRAM A SUBSIDY FOR PUERTO RICANS AND WITHIN HOURS OUTRAGED OFFICIALS BRANDED HIM A RACIST AND CALLED FOR HIS RESIGNATION.

DESPITE CONDEMNATION AND TELEGRAMS AGAINST NEW YORK BUSINESSMAN J. PETER GRACE, HEAD OF THE PRIVATE SECTOR SURVEY ON COST CONTROL IN THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, REAGAN REFUSED COMMENT ON GRACE'S COMMENTS BEFORE THE AMERICAN FEED AND GRAIN MANUFACTURERS' ASSOCIATION.

"MR. GRACE WAS GIVING HIS PERSONAL VIEWS AND WE HAVE NO COMMENT ON IT," A WHITE HOUSE SPOKESMAN SAID OF THURSDAY'S REMARKS.

WITH THE THRUST OF HIS ADDRESS CENTERING ON THE BELIEF THE AMERICAN PUBLIC "SHOULD GET OFF PRESIDENT REAGAN'S BACK SO HE CAN GET GOVERNMENT OFF OUR BACKS," THE CHAIRMAN AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER OF M.R. GRACE & CO. DWELT ON THE PERCENTAGE OF THE FOOD STAMP BUDGET GOING TO PUERTO RICANS.

GRACE SAID \$1.04 BILLION OF THE CARTER ADMINISTRATION'S \$12.7 BILLION FOOD STAMP BUDGET WAS SCHEDULED FOR PUERTO RICO.

HE SAID REAGAN CUT THE FIGURE FOR FISCAL 1982 TO \$11.5 BILLION -- WITH \$904 MILLION GOING TO PUERTO RICO, WHICH CURRENTLY HAS A 22.6 PERCENT UNEMPLOYMENT RATE.

"THIS FIGURE DOES NOT INCLUDE 2.1 MILLION PUERTO RICANS LIVING IN THE U.S. (MAINLAND)," GRACE SAID.

THEN, DEPARTING FROM A PREPARED TEXT, HE SAID, "900,000 LIVE IN NEW YORK, AND THEY'RE ALL ON FOOD STAMPS, SO THIS FOOD STAMP PROGRAM IS BASICALLY A PUERTO RICAN PROGRAM."

"I'VE GOT NOTHING AGAINST PUERTO RICANS, BUT THIS IS A LITTLE MUCH," HE SAID.

RESIDENT COMMISSIONER BALTASAR CORRADA, WHO REPRESENTS PUERTO RICO IN CONGRESS, CALLED FOR GRACE'S RESIGNATION FOR REMARKS THAT WERE "AN AFFRONT AND INSULT TO PUERTO RICANS BOTH ON THE ISLAND AS WELL AS ON THE U.S. MAINLAND."

CORRADA SAID THE FEDERAL FOOD STAMP PROGRAM CURRENTLY SERVES MORE THAN 23 MILLION AMERICANS BUT ONLY 1.8 MILLION OF THEM LIVE IN PUERTO RICO, THE U.S. VIRGIN ISLANDS AND GUAM.

AS OF JULY 1, THE FOOD STAMP PROGRAM IN PUERTO RICO WILL BE REPLACED WITH A SYSTEM BY WHICH THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT ISSUES A CASH GRANT TO THE PUERTO RICAN COMMONWEALTH GOVERNMENT, WHICH THEN WILL ISSUE CHECKS RESIDENT MAY EXCHANGE FOR CASH.

REP. ROBERT GARCIA, D-N.Y., HEAD OF THE CONGRESSIONAL HISPANIC CAUCUS, ALSO URGED REAGAN TO REQUEST GRACE'S RESIGNATION.

GARCIA SAID GRACE'S STATEMENT IN DALLAS "MAY PLAY WELL THERE, BUT IT IS AS RACIST AS ANYTHING I HAVE EVER HEARD IN MY 17 YEARS OF ELECTIVE OFFICE."

RAUL YZAGUIRRE, PRESIDENT OF THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF LA RAZA, SAID GRACE'S COMMENTS "EXEMPLIFY A MEANNESS OF SPIRIT AND A CONTEMPT FOR ALL HISPANICS."

"THE FACT THAT PUERTO RICANS CONSTITUTE ONE OF THE LOWEST INCOME GROUPS IN THE U.S. AND THAT THEY SUFFER GROSS DISCRIMINATION IS THE ISSUE WE OUGHT TO BE FOCUSING ON," HE SAID. "PUERTO RICAN DEPENDENCE ON FOOD STAMPS IS A NATURAL CONSEQUENCE OF THAT ECONOMIC AND RACIAL DISCRIMINATION."

YZAGUIRRE SAID HE WOULD ASK GRACE TO MEET WITH HISPANIC LEADERS.

# Carmen Got Breaks On Federal Loan

WASHINGTON — Gerald Carmen, the New Hampshire Republican who heads the General Services Administration, has been granted two deferrals in the last year in the repayment of a \$425,000 low-interest loan from the federal government.

Carmen has not made a payment since July 1981, two months after he took over at the General Services Administration. As a result, he now owes about \$30,000 in additional interest to the Small Business Administration.

Carmen originally obtained a \$425,000 loan in 1975 when an urban renewal project forced him to move his auto and tire service business in Manchester. The Small Business Administration advanced the loan at 6.5 percent interest to Car-Go Home and Auto Centers Inc. Carmen personally guaranteed repayment. He sold his company in 1979, and it has since gone out of business.

Carmen has not listed the 30-year government loan as a liability on his financial disclosure statements.

Carmen said yesterday he asked the Small Business Administration for the first six-month deferral of his \$2,700-a-month payments last summer. He subsequently obtained another six-month deferral that expires next month. So far, he has repaid \$20,000 plus interest, and owes a balance of \$405,000.

"We expect to meet that commitment," said Carmen, who makes \$59,500 a year in his current job. He said he would obtain a bank loan to cover the payments.

"Deferral is available to any American citizen," he said. "I don't see where it's (the late payments) really of much interest. If I had been up in New Hampshire, I'd probably be handling it now. I'm not without resources. If they said you can't have a deferral, I would have covered it."

A Small Business Administration spokesman said: "This is a normal SBA procedure when a loan client through no

fault of his own finds himself in financial difficulty and asks for a deferral. It is not a delinquency."

The spokesman said 17,000 of 149,750 loans made or guaranteed by the agency are currently late by 60 days or more.

Though Carmen sold the business in 1979, he still owns the building and property, which he pledged as collateral on the loan. Carmen rented the property to the new owner of the service center, who stopped paying rent when he went out of business a year ago.

Carmen said he now has an offer to buy the property, which is on Elm Street.

From 1975 to 1979, Carmen was chairman of the state Republican Party in New Hampshire. He resigned to work for Ronald Reagan's presidential campaign and directed the campaign to a win in the New Hampshire primary.

Reagan appointed Carmen to the General Services Administration, which provides government workers with office space and supplies. Carmen had owned the

## Job Bonanza For Carmen's Friends

The friends, family and former employees of Gerald Carmen have not suffered from the Reagan administration's efforts to cut the size of the federal bureaucracy.

The *Baltimore Sun* reported today that Carmen, the head of the General Services Administration, had used his position to hand out patronage jobs to dozens of friends and political associates.

The *Sun* said Carmen's \$59,500-a-year job was the "top of a stack of more than 35 patronage jobs paying a total of some \$1.5 million a year traceable to Mr. Carmen's role in the Reagan primary victory." Carmen engineered President Reagan's successful campaign in the 1980 New Hampshire primary.

The *Sun* said those with jobs — some in the GSA, the government's housekeeping agency, and some in other federal agencies — include Carmen's daughter, a friend of hers and two former employees of Carmen's tire shops.

The paper said some of the people earn more than \$50,000 a year in such agencies as the Small Business Administration, and the Commerce, Housing and Urban Development and Health and Human Services departments.

The newspaper quoted a former New Hampshire GOP official, who asked not to be identified, as saying, "It's wrong to look at this thing solely in terms of numbers. Everyone knows that's politics. You get the jobs. What is amazing and disturbing is the dubious qualifications of many of the people."

auto service center for about 20 years.

For the last year, Carmen has put in long hours at the government agency, cutting employees and office space allocations to reduce its budget. The agency accounts for \$5 billion in government spending.

In a speech in March before the National Association of Manufacturers, Reagan said that before Carmen took over, the agency had been "racked by scandal" involving fraud and waste of government money. Carmen promoted the agency's whistleblowers, who had previously been demoted for exposing wrongdoing, Reagan said.

Three months before Carmen stopped paying off his Small Business Administration loan, Reagan ordered a crackdown against those who owed the government loans and back taxes.

"We must make it clear that debts owed to the federal government must be repaid," the president said. "It is not right that responsible, honest citizens should suffer because of those who do not honor their obligations."

In an interview, Carmen drew a distinction between people who are behind in making payments "legally" and "those that deal outside that arena."

"We applied for a deferral," he said. "It was okayed."

Carmen said he would have listed the loan in his financial disclosure statement if he had thought it was required. The instructions require a listing of any business liability "in which your participation or ownership interest extends to personal liability for its debts."

J. Jackson Walter, director of the Office of Government Ethics, said he would look into Carmen's disclosure statement by asking the General Services Administration for more information.



parts and tire shop in Manchester. She is earning \$46,000 a year as an administrative assistant.

□ Gary Feit, also a former employee of Carmen's Manchester business. He earns \$33,000 a year as an administrative aide.

□ Carroll Jones, one of Carmen's successors as Republican Party state chairman. He earns \$58,500 a year as the chief of staff.

□ Kerry Moody, an aide to former New Hampshire governor Meldrim Thomson Jr. He was hired as the GSA's liaison to the White House, a newly created position with a \$33,586 salary.

Marshall Cobleigh, a losing candidate for Congress in 1980, was also appointed by Carmen to a top position at the GSA. He resigned earlier this year.

During his presidential campaign, Rea-

gan criticized the GSA as a corrupt federal agency and vowed to "put the corruption fighters" in charge of it.

When the White House announced that Carmen had been chosen to head the agency, Carmen promised to take New Hampshire's style of government to Washington. "I hope I'll bring the things we learn best in New Hampshire — hard work, thrift and honesty, and the approach we take to our everyday living that I think would be very useful in Washington," he said.

In an interview yesterday, Carmen said charges he had created a staff costing about \$900,000 a year were exaggerated because many of the new staff members filled existing job vacancies.

Carmen's firm, Car-Go Home and Auto Centers Inc., was sold in 1979 and has since gone out of business.



As part of our long-range Hispanic strategy, we recommended appearances by the President at the national conventions of two major Hispanic organizations--the American G.I. Forum in Salt Lake City on August 13 and the U.S. Hispanic Chamber of Commerce in Chicago on August 14. Both these proposals have been regretted because of the President's planned California vacation in August.

No President has ever addressed a national Hispanic convention, and President Reagan's appearances would have been a historic first. However, if these events are not possible, we must nail down an alternate strategy to assure maximum Administration visibility at key Hispanic events during the summer months and into September. I would therefore like your approval for the following substitute events.

1. A Presidential speech at the annual banquet of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus on September 16 in Washington D.C. This banquet culminates Hispanic Heritage Week and is attended by 1500 key Hispanics from across the country.
2. An acceptance by the Vice President to keynote the two August conventions regretted by the President.
3. Participation by Ed Meese at the convention of the National Council of La Raza in Los Angeles on July 21. Both the President and the Vice President have regretted this invitation.
4. A Mexican fiesta for several hundred Hispanic supporters at Rancho Sierra Grande sometime during the summer. This would be an informal outdoor event along the lines of the Merle Haggard concert.
