After MX, the Senate will take up Radio Marti, the farm bill, and Volcker's confirmation. The House begins work on the MX tomorrow night, with a vote on Wednesday. This will probably be a close fight. Tomorrow, the House will hold a secret session on Nicaragua; consideration of the IMF is also possible this week.	Duberstein
4. <u>Economic Figures</u> : Housing starts, GNP, and CPI will all be released this week.	Feldstein
5. <u>Contadora Group</u> : State Department will provide guidance regarding the Cancun meeting.	Clark

The House is expected to vote on MX tomorrow, and at this point it is very close.	Duberstein

5. <u>PIK Program for Cotton</u> : The Administration will continue to oppose congressional efforts to alter this program, though on a low-key basis. We do not want to encourage compromise proposals, though we are willing to look at any that are offered.	Wright Duberstein
6. <u>A-122 Regulations</u> : A new version of previously withdrawn revisions will soon be circulated for WH staff comment. OMB is checking to be sure that business people are satisfied; however, no Hill consultations have yet taken place.	
7. <u>National Association of Counties</u> : Feldstein's speech yesterday was well received. The President will be asked to call the head of the organization today.	Verstandig
8. <u>NASA</u> : Some confusion has been caused by NASA statements that the President favors a manned space station. Guidance is that no decision has yet been made since the proposal has not been submitted to the President.	Fuller Speakes

2. <u>MX</u> : After the House concludes debate on the Ethics Committee report, it will debate on amendments relating to the MX. A vote on the key amendment to eliminate funding will probably occur in late afternoon. This is expected to be close, and we are making an all-out effort. The Senate is still in the midst of a filibuster on the issue, though Senator Baker has filed a cloture petition with a vote probable by tomorrow night.	Duberstein
3. <u>Nicaragua</u> : It was noted that yesterday's secret House session on this went well, and was less emotional than had been expected.	
4. <u>Withholding</u> : The conference committee has not yet settled the withholding issue, though they have agreed that CBI will be included in the conference report. We are also attempting to include a pilot program for enterprise zones, though this is being resisted by Rostenkowski.	Duberstein
5. <u>Commission on Central America</u> : We will probably announce Harry Schlaudeman's appointment as executive secretary today.	Clark Herrington
6. <u>PIK Program for Cotton</u> : Revisions in our program were passed yesterday by the House, and will probably be passed by the Senate. Our position remains one of low-key opposition.	Duberstein Wright
7. <u>Natural Gas</u> : This will probably be marked-up tomorrow in Senate committee.	Duberstein
8. <u>Tipping Law Change</u> : A news item seemed to imply that the President supports a change in the tax laws on tipping. OPD will check on the basis for the story.	Harper

7. <u>Standby Tax:</u> Guidance re today's <u>New York Times</u> story is that we are not abandoning our stated position: the tax is contingent on our not getting sufficient spending cuts, and we still hope to obtain such cuts.	Speakes
8. <u>Withholding Repeal:</u> The conference on this should be completed today. CBI is included, and we have obtained a commitment that Ways and Means will hold hearings in the fall on enterprise zones.	Dubenstein


