SPACE—CBS's David Martin: For 20 years, the space program has been a symbol of national pride. President Reagan plans to keep it that way. NASA says it could orbit a 6-man space station by 1992 at an estimated cost of \$8 billion. In the vacuum of space, astronauts could conduct experiments not possible on earth, develop drugs for the treatment of diabetes, make crystals for high-speed computers, study the universe close-up. But a report by the National Academy of Sciences says there is no scientific need for a permanent manned presence in space. A study by McDonnell-Douglas admits that so far none of the concepts for manufacturing goods in space has panned out. Even the Pentagon said it cannot identify a military mission for man in space. Russians want a man in space and are expected to launch a giant rocket sometime this year which they could use to build a space station big enough for 20 people. The Pentagon acknowledges that it too will need men up there for President Reagan's Star Wars vision of a space-based defense against Soviet nuclear missiles. While Administration officials concede there is no pressing need for a space station, they say the psychic rewards of being ahead in the space race are enough to justify the project. The question is whether the U.S. can afford to pay for those rewards in an era of \$180 billion deficits. (CBS-2)

DISABLED—CBS's Bruce Hall reports on disabled who have lost their benefits. Congress under the Carter Administration ordered medical reviews of all Social Security disability cases. That policy has been strongly supported by the Reagan Administration. (President Reagan on December, 1981 at the White House Conference on Aging: "We can't afford to support as disabled people who are not disabled." But for the Social Security Administration, it has become a bureaucratic nightmare. Of the 700,000 cases reviewed so far, benefits were cut off to nearly 300,000 people. 30,000 to 40,000 have gone to federal court to get their benefits restored. The result has been a crazy quilt of court rulings, most critical of the Administration. Today in Washington, legislation was proposed to establish national standards for eligibility. However, it immediately ran into opposition from the Reagan Administration. (Martha McSteen of the Social Security Administration: "I would like to make it clear from the outset...that the Administration opposes enactment of disability legislation.") That was not well received, even by some Republicans on the committee. (Sen. John Heinz: "The President in the White House now is my President. I don't think he understands just how bad the position of his Administration is on this issue and how much it is going to hurt him if it is allowed to stand.") (CBS-4)

SCHOOLS—In Bakersfield, California, a long controversy over the desegregation of schools has resulted in a compromise that CBS's Terry Drinkwater reports the Administration wants to serve as a national model. To attract students to minority schools, offering special curricula like computer classes. It was a decision hailed today in Washington. (William Bradford Reynolds: "This is a blueprint for desegregation of the future without relying on mandatory busing, which has not worked anywhere in a very meaningful way.") The Administration endorsed the plan at a time when critics say it is becoming less and less sensitive to minority civil rights. (CBS-5)
