On Tuesday, the conference committee on the Defense Production Act will meet, and the conference report on the target price freeze is expected to be ratified. Also, mark-up is continuing on the foreign assistance bill.</p>	Oglesby
<p>4. <u>Jerusalem:</u> Regarding the proposed transfer of the U.S. Embassy, guidance is that such a move would imply a conclusion on the status of Jerusalem. U.S. policy has stated consistently that Jerusalem's status should be negotiated as part of a comprehensive Middle East peace settlement.</p>	Speakes

2. <u>GOP Congressional Leadership</u> : Today's meeting will include a briefing on Central America by Secretary Shultz, and a budget discussion during which Jack Kemp will present his alternative proposals. After the meeting, the Congressional leaders will be available to the press outside the West Wing.	Oglesby Speakes
3. <u>Salvadoran Aid Request</u> : During four votes yesterday in the Senate, the opposition never managed to muster more than 25 votes against the Administration proposal. This may cause them to alter their strategy in favor of a War Powers type amendment. The Senate will continue debate on the PL 480 supplemental today, with a final vote not likely before tomorrow. 4. <u>Legislative Calendar</u> : The House will take up the Panama Canal authorization bill today. Also the Rules Committee will decide on a procedure for debate of the deficit reduction package which will be on the floor tomorrow. In the Senate, it was noted that the Equal Access Bill has gained momentum, with Senators Hatfield and Denton working on compromise language. The Administration is assisting their effort.	Oglesby
5. <u>Pay Equity Act</u> : A House subcommittee hearing will be held today on this legislation. Walter Mondale, Lee Hart, a representative of Jesse Jackson, and Don Devine will testify.	Oglesby

2. <u>News Conference</u> : The pre-news conference briefing will take up foreign affairs at 2:00 and domestic issues at 3:00. The President may open the news conference with an announcement that he is sending the Vice President to Geneva with a U.S. proposal for banning chemical weapons.	McManus Speakes
3. <u>Budget</u> : The House will begin work today on the budget resolution. Eight proposals will be voted on, including the President's original budget, and the debate will likely extend through tomorrow. It is probable that the House Budget Committee version will prevail due to the rule under which the subject is being considered.	Oglesby
4. <u>Central American Aid Request</u> : The Senate has finished debate on El Salvador amendments to the supplemental, and will probably take up amendments regarding Nicaragua early today. There is a chance that work on the supplemental itself will be concluded by the end of the day.	Oglesby

6. <u>Social Security</u> : It was noted that Rep. Pepper criticized the President yesterday on the House floor regarding recent statements he made about the Social Security system.	
7. <u>MX Missile</u> : It is likely that the House Armed Services subcommittee on procurement may have to reduce the number of MX missiles, despite their strong support for the weapon, due to the dollar figure with which they have to work.	Oglesby
8. <u>Equal Access Legislation</u> : It is unlikely that this bill will be taken up by the House before next week.	Oglesby
9. <u>Disaster Assistance</u> : Jenkins will check with FEMA regarding a request by Sen. Hollings for a Presidential waiver of certain aid requirements. The request is apparently necessitated by a quirk in the state's constitution which prevents the use of state funds for direct payments to individuals.	Jenkins

10. Saturday Radio Talk: A draft is being prepared which will follow up on the President's Friday foreign policy speech. Darman
11. Immigration Reform: A House committee hearing will be held tomorrow on this legislation. Administration testimony in support of the Senate version of Simpson-Mazzoli will probably be delivered tomorrow. Wright

The brief meeting with the USC women's basketball team will also receive full press coverage. White House photos will be taken during the meeting with Lt. Governors.	Speakes
2. <u>Unemployment</u> : Figures for March reveal no change in the overall unemployment rate, which remains at 7.8% civilian. However, there was a significant increase in the total number of people employed.	Feldstein
3. <u>Saturday Radio Talk</u> : A draft on foreign policy has been circulated and will go to the President today. The draft reiterates the themes of today's CSIS speech.	Darman
4. <u>Central American Aid Request</u> : The Senate has now passed the supplemental, and we are pushing for prompt action by the House. Secretary Shultz met with House leaders yesterday on this. We are hopeful that the House will take up the request next week, and that we can then move the request to conference. Separate votes are probable on funds for El Salvador and Nicaragua, and these could take place before the recess.	Oglesby McFarlane
5. <u>Budget</u> : The Senate will take up the Finance Committee deficit reduction package next week, but will probably not complete action before the recess.	Oglesby
6. <u>Equal Access Bill</u> : A Presidential letter of support has been prepared and will be sent to the Hill as soon as it is finalized. Though the bill has passed the House committee, we do not expect floor action prior to the recess. In the Senate, language has been worked out with Senators Denton and Hatfield, and Thurmond is reportedly ready to begin moving the legislation.	Darman Oglesby
7. <u>White House Conference on Small Business</u> : The Small Business Administration has appealed a decision to oppose such a conference, preferring to at least remain neutral.
