## ACTION

1. Vice President: The Vice President will depart shortly on a trip to Japan where he will discuss various trade questions. It was noted that Amb. Brock was speaking for himself in recent statements on extension of the voluntary auto import limits; no decision has been made on this issue, and the subject will not be negotiated during the Vice President's trip. Murphy
2. Unemployment: Figures released today show no change in the unemployment rate. However, total employment rose by 270,000 in April. Feldstein
3. Saturday Radio Talk: A draft on waste, fraud, and abuse has gone in to the President. Darman
4. Line Item Veto: It was mentioned that yesterday's unsuccessful vote in the Senate was partly due to Senator Mattingly's unwillingness to make changes in a version which many viewed as unconstitutional.
5. Nominations: Michael Armacost's nomination will probably be taken up on Tuesday, and prospects appear good. A hearing has not yet been set on Carol Dinkins, though we are hoping that one will be scheduled for next week. Also, all of our Legal Services nominees have been reported out of committee, and we are working with the Senate leadership to move them to the floor as soon as possible. Oglesby

6. Legislative Activity: The House will take up foreign assistance next week, which will include measures to implement recommendations of the Kissinger Commission. The Defense Authorization bill will probably be taken up the following week, and problems are expected regarding the MX missile. In the Senate, work will probably not be completed on the GOP deficit reduction package until next week. The budget resolution and debt limit will then be taken up. Regarding the latter, we will probably reach the debt ceiling by May 24; however, both the House and the Senate are considering an extension through next year. Oglesby
7. Textiles: Criticism from the textile industry is continuing. An executive order has been prepared which formalizes many enforcement actions already underway; the order, however, has been delayed pending resolution of DOC concerns. Fuller

8. Ambassador Pickering: Yesterday, in response to criticism by Sen. Helms, the White House issued a statement of full confidence in defense of Pickering. A Presidential letter on this subject is also being considered. McFarlane

9. Presidential Libraries: Various pieces of legislation on this subject are being considered by Congress. The Administration position is that we prefer no legislation, feeling that the present law is adequate. Oglesby
10. Central American Outreach: It was noted that four White House Digests have now been cleared for distribution to the Hill and others. Also, a briefing will be held this morning in Room 450 on religious persecution in Nicaragua. Whittlesey
11. Alternatives to Abortion: It was noted that the first in a series of briefings on this subject was held yesterday. Whittlesey
12. Highway Legislation: A bill entitled "Interstate Cost Estimates" is now moving through the Congress. This unnecessary and costly transportation legislation is apparently being loaded up with a number of unnecessary and costly transportation projects. It was decided that we would send a strong veto signal in order to forewarn the Congress of our feelings on this issue. Wright
