1. <u>Today's Schedule</u> : Howard Baker and Bob Michel will meet with the President at 9:15, and will be available to the press after the leadership meeting. There will be wire coverage of the dropby with the National Council of Farmer Cooperatives. Also, the PRC Defense Minister will meet with the President at 10:40; White House photos will be taken.	Speakes McFarlane
2. <u>Immigration</u> : A rule for debate of this bill was passed yesterday with overwhelming support from House Republicans. We continue to support the Senate-passed version and will watch developments closely in the House.	Oglesby
3. <u>Legislative Calendar</u> : The House will consider a rule for debate of the Intelligence Authorization Bill, which could be used as a vehicle for an amendment on Nicaragua. Also, the supplemental will be up in full committee. The Senate is continuing debate on the Defense Authorization Bill: anti-satellite weapons will be voted on today, and the MX may be considered tomorrow. The State, Justice, and Commerce Appropriations Bill will be considered today; Project Democracy barely survived a committee vote, and a Rudman amendment restricting Legal Services poses additional problems. Also, the Senate Intelligence Committee will hold a hearing today on Nicaragua.	Oglesby
4. <u>Bankruptcy</u> : There has apparently been no progress on this legislation, and another deadline for resolution of the problems will soon be reached.	Oglesby Fielding
5. <u>Title IX</u> : Senator Helms will hold a hearing today re this bill's impact on farmers. Also, Jim Baker and Jack Svahn will meet with Republican senators today to discuss the legislation.	Oglesby
6. <u>Nuclear Agreement with China</u> : By the end of the week, we should have guidance for the Hill on non-proliferation aspects of this agreement.	McFarlane
7. <u>Product Liability</u> : Senator Kasten has apparently reached an agreement with Howard Baker that this bill will be taken up by the Senate as soon as the schedule allows.	Oglesby
8. <u>Wilkinson Nomination</u> : This will probably not be considered until after the recess.	Oglesby
9. <u>Cabinet Activity</u> : CCNRE will meet today on outer continental shelf revenue sharing, and tomorrow on environmental policy. Thursday's Cabinet meeting with the President will also discuss OCS, and perhaps maritime issues.	Fuller

10. Drinking Age: This issue will be discussed with the President today in preparation for both Secretary Dole's testimony and the President's speech to MADD. Baker

The House is making progress on the immigration bill, and has already defeated some troublesome amendments. The budget conference is making progress, though the conference on deficit reduction has run into difficulties on various aspects of the package.	Oglesby
5. <u>Defense Authorization Bill</u> : It was noted that yesterday's compromise on anti-satellite systems avoided major problems. The MX will be taken up today, though work on the entire bill will probably not be completed this week.	Oglesby
