2. <u>Legislative Calendar</u> : The House is dealing with suspensions today, and will take up the continuing resolution on Thursday or Friday. Natural gas legislation was pulled from the House Rules Committee for now, and the Banking Committee plans a hearing this week on the Continental Illinois situation.	Oglesby
<p>The Senate will debate whether to open its sessions to television, with a cloture vote likely. If a budget resolution is approved, they will move to a series of appropriations bills. If not, they will take up Clean Water and other legislation. There will be an effort this week to reach agreement on the Title IX issue, as well as the defense numbers. Also, the Genocide Convention will be taken up on Wednesday in the Foreign Relations Committee, and Senator Dole will chair hearings on tax issues at which Jack Kemp will testify.</p>	
3. <u>Immigration</u> : The conference committee is continuing work, and will concentrate today and tomorrow on resolving the funding issues. The conferees seem intent on reporting a bill to the floor.	Oglesby
4. <u>Social Security Disability</u> : Agreement has apparently been reached on the Hill regarding legislation that sets procedures for assessing eligibility of those currently receiving disability.	Oglesby
5. <u>Cabinet Activity</u> : A Cabinet meeting will be held tomorrow to discuss the steel imports issue. It was noted that Congress has tied U.S.-Israel Free Trade legislation and other trade measures to resolution of the steel question. Yesterday, the House defeated a crime bill we viewed as unsatisfactory. It was suggested that the Attorney General might publicly call on the Speaker to sit down and discuss whether acceptable legislation on crime can be passed before the session ends.	Oglesby
3. <u>Genocide Convention</u> : This treaty will be taken up today in Senate committee. Proponents still lack enough votes for cloture, and are continuing to talk with Sen. Helms about possible amendments.	Oglesby
4. <u>Budget</u> : There is still no agreement on defense numbers, though O'Neill and Howard Baker met and exchanged figures yesterday. The House is expected to take up the continuing resolution this Friday, with the defense subcommittee finishing its mark-up today.	Oglesby
5. <u>Title IX</u> : Senator Kennedy will hold a press conference today in which he will blame the Administration for the lack of progress on this legislation. The main problem still unresolved is the burden of proof on state and local coverage.	Svahn Oglesby
6. <u>World Population Control</u> : Rep. Long's subcommittee added language to the foreign appropriations bill which reverses the Administration's recent decision on world population policy. It was noted, though, that the same type of provision has been added by Long in the past, and has always been removed in conference. As before, we will oppose such a provision.	Oglesby
7. <u>Balanced Budget Amendment</u> : A large number of petitions in support of this amendment will be delivered to the Hill today.	
8. <u>Ecnomic Figures</u> : Personal income for August was up 0.5%. Housing starts were down 12.8%, and permits were down 3.6%. GNP figures will be released tomorrow.	Niskanen

1. Today's Schedule: The President will travel to Iowa and Michigan today. Speakes

2. Beirut Bombing: Bud McFarlane reviewed the latest information on the car bomb explosion near the U.S. Embassy Annex in East Beirut. There are, as of now, no confirmed U.S. deaths, though 4 or 5 Americans were injured. There were around 30 Lebanese civilian casualties, including 5 or 6 dead. Staff were cautioned to avoid speculation on the bombing. Secretary Shultz will brief on the attack this morning, and the President will make a statement prior to his 8:30 departure. McFarlane Speakes

3. GNP: Flash 3rd quarter figures showed a 3.6% annual rate of growth, with inflation at 2.9%. Second quarter GNP figures were revised downward from 7.6% to 7.1%. Niskanen

4. Legislative Calendar: The Senate is working on the trade bill, and is expected to conclude floor action today. The House is considering rail safety and other bills today. Most activity, though, centers on the continuing resolution, which will be taken up in Rules today, and on the floor tomorrow. A veto signal has been sent due to the spending levels. Regarding defense, we are still hoping for closure on a compromise figure. Oglesby

Other issues moving are Superfund, Title IX, and the genocide treaty. Also, it was noted that Sen. Howard Baker is being very helpful to the White House on a broad range of legislative issues.

5. Disability Legislation: This bill has passed the Congress, and will be forwarded to the White House. A signing ceremony will probably not be held. Oglesby



7. <u>Proposed Executive Orders re Advisory Committees</u> : An executive order has been proposed that would extend the term of certain advisory committees beyond the fiscal year, and terminate others which have concluded their work. A decision was made that we will drop the termination section, and instead wait until the end of the calendar year to make a decision on those committees.
