



All items on the Incident Report were described by the Counselor as nuisance contraband. I made an effort with the Officer who wrote the Incident Report to expunge the shot and I described all reasons why I had said items, I also indicated to the Officer that I would do as much extra duty as possible in an effort to dispose of the Incident Report and avoid needless time and consuming paperwork for the Staff. The Officer would not entertain my request. I then discussed the situation with the Counselors on duty and they were unable to expunge the Incident Report. My team then found me guilty of the offense and imposed the following sanctions, removal from preferred quarters, eight (8) hours extra duty, and a sanction that was not stated but understood was losing my next scheduled furlough.

On Monday, December 10, 1984 the Tick Factory Manager, Mr. O. J. Oliver, came to the factory and talked to Inmate Thompson and transferred him to the Mattress Factory. Mr. Oliver then talked with me in regards to increasing production at the Tick Factory and he expressed concern for the amount of production at the factory and wanted to transfer me also, due to his allegation that I was criticizing the operation of the Tick Factory. Mr. Oliver stated he would transfer me immediately but at the present time had no place in industry to put me, because of an earlier transfer, by an unknown source from the Outside Warehouse, that indicated I was not acceptable for a responsible preferred clerical position. He indicated

The items in question were obtained by me in the following manner; one (1) Black Flag Roach Motel was located in the room (C1-16) when I moved into that room. In an effort to clear the floor of any visible objects for an inspection, later in the day; I placed the item in my locker in plain view of anyone opening the locker. The item had been folded up against the wall and bed for a lengthy period of time. The cold weather has created a bug problem in C1-16, I used this item in an effort to avoid any further infestation of roaches. My roommate works for Food Service and the food particles on his shoes and clothing also lead to a highly unsanitary living area. No one has sprayed for bugs in the room, this also prompted me to use the above said item.

Cosmetic items 2,3 and 4 were in my cosmetic lot described on my Form 40, in addition to this I had taken above items with me on a social furlough that I had approximately ten (10) days earlier. I had also returned with these items through the front door with the approval of the Officer on duty. The Officer did not object to any cosmetic items or the Allerest eye drops that I had in my possession. The eye drops in question were used for the following reasons, I work in the Tick Factory where fabric fibers in the air create an irritation to my eyes. I have seen the P.A. for medication to cure the problem and have used Allerest eye drops to provide temporary relief of the watering and swelling of my eyes.

I was among a group of 50-60 inmates who are precluded from obtaining a responsible preferred assignment.

At approximately noon on December 10, 1984 Inmate Thompson and myself were targets of a "routine" shake-down in which Incident Reports were written on both inmates. However, the Incident Report written on Inmate Thompson was for eye drops taken out of his roommates locker. It had his roommates name and number written on the bottle, consequently the Incident Report was torn up. There is a strong indication that Inmate Thompson and myself were to have disciplinary reports written on us for nit-picking items that would interrupt our adjustment and current programs.

On December 11, 1984 at approximately 3:35 P.M., when I returned from work, I saw the Officer that wrote the Incident Report, in the hallway, and he apologized for writing the Incident Report.

According to 28 CFR 551.90, Inmates may not be discriminated against on the basis of race, religion, nationality, sex, handicap, or political belief. Each warden shall ensure that administrative decisions and work, housing, and program assignments are non-discriminatory.

It is well documented from my being removed as a clerk in the Outside Warehouse, a job I had held for twelve (12) months, to the Tick Factory for no apparent reason or I was not given a reason nor any disciplinary action taken, a position where through conscience and dedication to my assignment I was elevated from 4th grade to super-grade as

as all my work reports will reflect.

I requested on two occasions a transfer from the Tick Factory to the Shoe Warehouse for medical reasons, due to fabric fibers in the air that are highly irritating to my eyes, which is the reason why I had the Allerest eye drops.

On December 10, 1984, Mr Oliver indicated he was unable to transfer me to an- other industry assignment because of some unknown reason that he would not tell me.

I feel I have been prejudged and discriminated against for the above mentioned infraction per 28 CFR 551.90, Non-discrimination Towards Inmates in Work, Housing and Program Assignment.

Due to the above discrimination for my being of Italian descent I would further request that I be transferred to another leve one (1) institution with industries that does abide by Bureau of Prison policy regardless of my nationality.

I have attempted at every level at this Camp to avoid submitting this nuisance paperwork for Staff. Mr. Swyhart indicated to me he would not intervene in the expulsion of my Incident Report, however Mr. Swyhart personally observed an inmate with an electrical cord on a radio in the weightroom one day prior to my immediate incident, Mr. Swyhart used his prerogative and did not issue an Incident Report on the inmate after the inmate pleaded with him because it would interfere with his program and his upcoming furlough. When I requested the expungement of this Incident

Report by Mr. Swyhart and cited the other incident, Mr. Swyhart stated he judges all inmates as individuals and considers the total program of each inmate and the inmates background. Which further indicates his prejudicial and discriminatory attitudes towards all Italians and especially me. I feel there should be no good or bad criminals at this Institution and we all should be treated fairly and without prejudice on an equal basis. According to the policy set forth by the Bureau of Prisons in CFR 551.90. To further show the prejudicial and discriminatory action at this Institution, on December 15, 1984 the Officer who wrote my Incident Report in question found a contraband radion in an inmates locker, rather than write the inmate an Incident Report, he discussed this violation with the inmate to do two (2) hours extra duty and avoid any report being written.

I respectfully request this Incident Report be expunged from my files and records and my program be reinstated to a flawless condition which it was.







BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH  
OF  
WILLIAM J. KILBERG

Mr. Kilberg is a partner in the Washington office of the international law firm Gibson, Dunn & Crutcher. Mr. Kilberg served as the Solicitor for the United States Department of Labor from 1973 until 1977. At the time of his appointment, Mr. Kilberg was the youngest person ever to be appointed to a sub-cabinet post in the United States Government. He has also served as Associate Solicitor of Labor, General Counsel of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service, and as a White House Fellow and Special Assistant to Secretary of Labor George P. Shultz. A 1969 graduate of Harvard Law School, Mr. Kilberg represents management in all phases of labor relations and employee benefits legal practice. From 1977 until 1980, he served on the Legal Affairs Advisory Committee of the Republican National Committee. Mr. Kilberg was Deputy Team Leader for the Reagan-Bush Transition Team at the United States Department of Labor in 1980. He was President of the White House Fellows Association in 1982-83, and was appointed by President Reagan in 1982 to the Commission on White House Fellowships. A lifelong Republican, Mr. Kilberg is a member of the Republican Jewish Coalition and the Republican Senatorial Inner Circle. He has also served as a member of the Steering Committee of the Lawyer's Committee for Senator John Warner. Mr. Kilberg is a

member of the Board of Directors of the Palmer National Bank and the Palmer National Bancorp. He also serves as a member of the Board of Directors of the Jewish Community Center of Greater Washington. He is a member of the Advisory Board for the Bureau of National Affairs Pension Reporter, and is Editor-in-Chief of the Employee Relations Law Journal. He has published many articles on employment law matters in a variety of periodicals and books in the United States and abroad. Mr. Kilberg is the recipient of awards from a number of organizations, among them the League of United Latin American Citizens, the D. C. Chamber of Commerce, and the School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell University.







Dear Mr. Strake:

There are many observations that can be made of the recently concluded political campaigns and their efforts to "reach" the voters by workers, whether by those workers involved in Reagan-Bush '84, Phil Gramm's race, or the efforts of local candidates. One point I wish to make, and to which I invite your attention, is that we Republicans have an excellent opportunity to make real in-roads with Hispanic voters.

Analyses of votes cast on November 6 tend to support views of a definite shift of Hispanic voters away from Democrat candidates and their party. Every effort should be made, I believe, by the Republican Party of Texas and the Republican National Committee to capitalize on this shift and to "mainstream" in the GOP those Hispanic voters gained in 1984. Furthermore, I believe that President Reagan's popularity among Hispanics could be the means and should be used to advantage in accomplishing this objective.

I suggest every effort be made by the Republican Party of Texas to obtain support of the RNC in persuading the President to develop a planned visit to Texas during the weekend of May 4-5, 1985. Three or four public rallies in Houston, the Rio Grande Valley, and El Paso, coinciding with commemorations of Cinco de Mayo could be used as vehicles for "reports to the people," generating grassroots support for Congressional action on Administration proposals. This type of action by President Reagan could have far-reaching and long-lasting benefits to our Party by strengthening and continuing our efforts to bring into the GOP those who would attend the rallies.

I realize there may be reluctance on the part of the President's Advisors to such a blatant political trip. But if not now, when? If not the President, who better?

SUBJECT: Board for International Broadcasting Budget

The Board for International Broadcasting (BIB) is the agency which oversees and funds Radio Free Europe/Radio Liberty which broadcast to the captive peoples of Eastern Europe and the USSR. These radios are a critical element of our national defense apparatus and had been neglected for years. They are also the single most important government program that concerns millions of Americans of East European origin. The major problem with these radios is that the signal is simply not getting through to many of its truth-starved listeners. This is especially true in Poland since martial law.

As a result, the President has made many explicit promises to East European-American constituencies in the 1980 campaign and in statements through his first term to conduct a major modernization and expansion of the radios' capabilities to overcome jamming. The President then signed NSDD-45 which mandates this modernization program. Throughout the 1984 campaign, he told East European-American audiences that the program was underway, and in addition, the Administration supported a modernization pledge in the Republican platform (see Tab I).

The problem here is that although the preparatory work has been done for RFE/RL's modernization program, no money has been actually spent as yet for the transmitter expansion -- the key element of the entire program. And unless the money is spent, the President's claims that the program is underway will not have been true. The President's credibility is at stake here.

OMB wants to "straight-line" BIB's budget at FY-85 levels and claims that the monies requested for transmitter modernization are a "new program." This is simply not true. This money is to complete a program that has been in preparation for two years. BIB is asking for \$214 million, which contains some \$95 million for more transmitters. This \$95 million is only the first slice of what will eventually amount to a \$600 million dollar modernization plan over five-to-ten years. However, of the \$214 million BIB requested, OMB is only willing to grant BIB \$114 million to maintain existing services. If this sticks, a major Presidential commitment will have been broken.


It has taken us four years to make this initial budget request in support of many public Presidential promises. Unless we go ahead with it, we risk losing a great deal of political support among constituencies that are a key part of the President's coalition. Failure to keep this specific Presidential promise would risk charges of betrayal and the alienation of groups on whose support we continue to depend. In your budget deliberations, I hope you will support full funding for this critical program.



Monday afternoon, Governor Branstad called urgently requesting a meeting with the President because of the serious farm economy situation in his state. He is currently preparing his State of the State Address. He pointed out that, in fact, some banks may go under and many farmers would default on their mortgages March 1. To complicate matters politically, several Iowa State Legislators, including the House Republican Leader, are facing default.

The Governor, as you know, is not one to "cry wolf" to the White House. I had proposed that we might be able to have some kind of meeting with him and senior Administration officials around Inaugural time, or even raise this issue more broadly when the National Governors' Association convenes in February. However, the Governor said the farm credit problem was most critical and that he could not delay any longer. The Governor is likely to argue that the reforms implemented in late September by Secretary Block have not provide adequate short-term relief and that additional emergency relief is needed.

Thursday, the Governor is scheduled to meet with Senate Majority Leader Dole on this subject. Accompanying the Governor are several agriculture experts. They are likely to proposed an agriculture debt refinancing plan similar to the one that the Governor had suggested to the President last September. The reforms implemented in late September by Secretary Block have not provided adequate short-term relief as hoped for.

Prior to the Governor's conversation with me, he had been in touch with USDA and had made a request to come in to meet with Dave Stockman. The Governor is concerned about the signals being sent by the proposed budget regarding agricultural cuts.

I do not recommend that a meeting be scheduled with the President. There is not likely to be immediate relief that will address the Governor's concern. More importantly, I think we can not afford to have the President meet during the budget deliberations to address specific special interest concerns without prompting requests from other special interest advocates. (The Governor has been in touch with Ed Rollins with regard to these concerns.)



SUBJECT: Schedule Proposal on Pro-life Meeting

For the past four years the President has met with the leaders of the pro-life movement on the occasion of their annual March for Life, usually on January 22, the anniversary of the Roe v. Wade Supreme Court decision which allowed for abortion on demand. The March for Life attracts several hundred thousand people each year. Last year the President appeared on the South Portico to wave to the thousands gathered on the ellipse.

The attached Schedule Proposal has been regretted for such a meeting this January 22nd. I realize the tremendous press of events around the time of the Inauguration. However, not to meet with this group of pro-life leaders will be seen by the pro-life movement as a demotion of the importance of the life issue. This will create a tremendous outcry.

In terms of the Catholic constituency, there are already rumbles that the social agenda is being ignored because tuition tax credits are not part of the tax reform package. If the pro-life meeting is not held this year, it will confirm the suspicions of some that they were simply used in an election year and that their issues have now been relegated to matters of secondary concern. These are people whose support we are going to need on any number of issues.

Not holding this meeting will create a great deal of damage that will be very difficult, if not impossible, to repair.

SUBJECT: Luncheon with Judi Buckalew

This memo is recorded to place in files a conversation I had with Judi Buckalew on October 16, 1984, during luncheon at The White House. I am recording this now as part of the record in light of the White House Letter written to Eunice Cole, President, American Nurses' Association. I will summarize as follows: During the course of the conversation which dealt with Ms. Buckalew's concern regarding the American Nurses' Association Endorsement of Mondale-Ferraro Ticket for President, the following statements were made:

- (A) The American Nurses' Association would no longer be welcome in The White House.
- (B) The American Nurses' Association would learn the gravity of their actions during the President's second Administration.
- (C) The Health Education Bill and the NIH Bill containing the National Institute of Nursing would most likely be vetoed because of the Presidential Endorsement - (when I questioned this statement, Ms. Buckalew did indicate that the veto's would probably be because of the funding levels and the NIH not wanting additional institutes.)
- (D) Ms. Buckalew did also state that should the Institute become a reality, Nurses would be screened to be certain they were not members of American Nurses' Association. I stated that most qualified nurse leaders in Research would most likely be members of the American Nurses' Association. She stated "well, then perhaps we would not have a qualified nurse leader as the Director.
- (E) Ms. Buckalew also stated that she would begin promoting the Specialty Nursing Organizations and the American Association of Colleges of Nursing as spokespersons for nursing. She felt the American Nurses' Association was no longer able to be considered the creditable organization and spokespersons for professional nursing.

TO DISCUSS THE HOMELESS

---

About a month ago Governor Mario Cuomo (D-NY) testified before a Congressional Subcommittee in New York City regarding the increased number of homeless in the United States. Following press reports of the hearings, the Governor's Washington, D.C. office called requesting a meeting between the Governor and the President to discuss what the Governor called an "epidemic" of homelessness.

The D.C. office for New York said that they were calling on behalf of the Governor and that the Governor suggested that other governors from the National Governor's Association (NGA) should also be included in any meeting. Governor Cuomo served as Chair of the NGA Task Force on the Homeless which expired last August.

It was said that the Governor "would not make the meeting political." Reportedly, the Governor feels that the problem can be addressed without a "bundle of new money" but with program changes.

My office suggested that the Governor should write to the President requesting a meeting and that the governors written request would receive prompt attention. However, to date the White House has not received a letter from the Governor, but there remains the possibility that a written or another verbal request for a meeting will come before the New Year. I will alert you to any further developments.

SUBJECT: Proposed Meeting between the President and Black South African Leader Gatsha Buthelezi

Background

It has been brought to my attention that my friend and the Chief of the 7 million member Zulu tribe is planning to attend the National Prayer Breakfast on January 31. As the leader of the largest black constituency in South Africa, Chief Buthelezi brings to us a unique point of view which counterbalances that of Bishop Desmond Tutu.

Chief Gatsha Buthelezi

Buthelezi supports our stated policy of constructive engagement. He is a moderate committed to a non-violent approach to the problems that beset South Africa. He has unwaveringly opposed Divestiture believing that it causes most harm to blacks. Recent polls demonstrate forcefully that the majority of blacks support him in this position.

Unlike Butheluzi, Tutu has called for U.S. trade sanctions against South Africa. Chief Buthelezi is in continual contact with the white leadership in a quest for imaginative breakthroughs to the problem of apartheid.

Perspective of the NSC and State

Both the NCS (Paul Ringdale) and State (Frank Wisner) support such a meeting.

Recommendation

In keeping with the Administration's plan to meet with a variety of South African leaders, I recommend that the President meet with Chief Buthelezi for an exchange of views on the situation in South Africa.



On January 2, 1985 Governor Hernandez-Colon (D) was sworn in as the new governor of Puerto Rico succeeding Governor Romero. As Chairman of the White House Task Force on Puerto Rico, I designated Deputy Assistant Secretary Mary Ann Knauss of Commerce for Intergovernmental Affairs to represent the Administration and to deliver a letter from the President at those Inaugural ceremonies. Mary Ann serves as a member of the White House Task Force on Puerto Rico, and understands the economic and political concerns and sensitivities of the Commonwealth.

When Mary Ann Knauss was enroute to Puerto Rico, Governor-elect Colon attempted to call the President in California and apparently spoke with Bill Sittman, requesting that the White House send a representative of the President with greater stature. Bill Sittman and I discussed this request and he indicated that Bud McFarlane had recommended that Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs and Senior Director for Latin American Affairs Dr. Constantine Menges be sent along with Mary Ann Knauss as another representative of the President.

At the Inaugural ceremonies, Menges made brief remarks in Spanish and then read, in English, the President's greeting to a crowd of approximately 20,000.

Local press and pundits took Menges' participation in the Inaugural ceremony as an indication that the President has softened his 1981 commitment with respect to the self-determination of the Island. Menges' National Security Council association prompted the perception that we were

dealing with Puerto Rico as a Nation rather than as part of the Federal system. (This is often the same perception when the State Department deals with Puerto Rico.)

Governor Hernandez-Colon, a member of the Democrat-aligned Popular Democratic Party (PDP), had previously served as Governor from 1972-76. During that term, the Governor displayed a very liberal record including the nationalization of the telephone company and local steamship lines and was part of the faction of the PDP that has been advocating independence for the Island. He has been active in his support for Kennedy, Carter and Mondale.

The Governor's Inaugural address on January 2, 1985 made no reference to his past policies. Some highlights of the Inaugural address were:

- o "I reaffirm the commitment we made to all Puerto Ricans, that we will not promote a plebiscite, referendum or political process of any sort aimed at changing or altering our present relationship as Commonwealth to the United States of America."
- o He voiced support of the President's desire for "... democratization and political stability for Latin America ..." and the Contadora proceedings.
- o He stressed his support for the President's Caribbean Basin Initiative and wants to "... assume a leadership role..." in attaining the objectives of the CBI.
- o He called for the continuation of the Section 936 Federal Tax Code Exemptions. (This provision provides tax deductions for capital gains earned and reinvested in Puerto Rico. However under the Treasury Department's tax simplification proposal this provision would be eliminated and the Governor cited his economic concerns for Puerto Rico if that recommendation is followed.)

While these statements reflect a more conciliatory attitude toward the Administration, there are those critics in Puerto Rico, including former Governor Luis Ferre (R), who have expressed open concern that this new governor is not likely to be supportive of this Administration. Governor Colon has openly expressed his intention to rally mainland Puerto Rican residents, and other Hispanics, to view the Administrations' actions toward Puerto Rico as indicative of general Administrative policy towards all Hispanics in the United States. Another concern was a statement by the Governor's recently appointed National Guard Adjutant General who was quoted as saying that U.S. troops should not go to Nicaragua,

that there should be no U.S. military advisors in Central America and no U.S. participation in military exercises in Honduras.

(However, according to a senior ranking U.S. Naval officer stationed in Puerto Rico the Adjutant General was speaking "on his own" and not for the Governor.)

On January 14th, Ronald L. Alvarado, my Special Assistant to the President for Intergovernmental Affairs responsible for liaison to mayors and other local elected officials, will represent me at the inaugurations of two Puerto Rican Mayors: Mayor Baltasar Corrada (NPP-San Juan), and Mayor Jose Dapena (NPP-Ponce).

As you know, I am particularly sensitive to the political implications of Administration participation in official activities on Puerto Rico because of the complex political situation there. It is essential that others within the Administration continue to be equally sensitive.

During the forthcoming Presidential Inaugural activities, Governor Colon and former Governor Luis Ferre will be in Washington. I have heard that both intend to have receptions to which White House representation will be requested.


To allay any perceptions that the White House Task Force on Puerto Rico, which I chair, might become involved directly or indirectly in the November Puerto Rican elections, the Task Force has not been convened since June 4, 1984. I believe that with the elections behind us, and the new governor of Puerto Rico now installed, it is imperative that we begin to reassess the future role and responsibilities of the White House Task force on Puerto Rico. I had planned to reconvene the Task Force after the Inaugural. I would recommend that a meeting be convened soon with appropriate Senior White House staff so that we can review the role and responsibilities of the Task Force in order to assure that the Administration is represented with one voice given the importance of the Island to economic as well as National Security matters.
