Dear Mike:

You and others who work closely with President Reagan must encourage flexibility.

I sense a distinct change in the public mood regarding economic matters down here in my part of Texas.

Those of us who strongly supported President Reagan and the Republican candidates expected some belt-tightening and painful adjustment as a result of restructuring economic policy.

The bottom line that appears to be emerging is that people appear to be more concerned about the stability of their jobs and employment and are becoming less enthused about the scheduled tax cuts.

Support for the budget cuts remain strong.

There is evolving the view that it may be best to delay the tax cuts to stabilize the economy and reduce the budget deficit.

The feeling down here is that the high interest rates will continue until the government ceases its massive borrowing to cover the huge deficit.

Flexibility.

Delay the tax cut for twelve months and stay with the program of continued spending cuts. The increased income will take the pressure off.

This is what I mean by flexibility. Accepting the fact that we need to delay the tax cut is not admission of error. It is an adjustment in the timetable.

You folks there in Washington need to hear what the rural people are thinking from time to time.


Dear Mr. Deaver:


