

Dear Mike:

A short time ago I attended a brain-storming gathering of a large number of like-minded, true-believing Reaganites from all parts of Georgia. Our group, which has no name at this time, is composed of people who got to know each other in 1976 and 1980 when we were working our tails off to put RR in the White House. Our purpose was to take a mid-term view of the Administration and start thinking of what we can best do to secure and maintain Congressional support (and that of the public, in general) for the Reagan program. We were also considering the problems of 1984.

As I think you know, I have been very restrained about sending my suggestions along to you. I know how busy you are and I don't want to wear out my welcome. So it is that the suggestion which follows was, to me, the most important at this point in time which emerged from the meeting referred to above.

The problem concerns the continued presence in appointable positions of persons with dubious loyalty, indifference, or downright hostility to our President and his programs. Some of them are the Washington perennials. I knew them when I was in the Pentagon in WWII. They make a career out of working for the government. No matter what agency, just so long as it's the government. I'm not talking about the "big ones" like Al Haig who have been pointed to time and time again in Human Events and elsewhere, but to middle level people who are responsible for the pick and shovel work which is so necessary. We think that the weak link in the chain has been E. Pendleton James, who is strictly a non-political personnel man. He has operated on strictly a merit system basis which sounds nice but disregards the philosophical considerations which make the Reagan Administration different from its predecessors.

Now that, according to reports, James is leaving, would this not be a good time to replace him with a politically (philosophically/ideologically) sensitive person? If what I hear is true, that Helene von Damm has been acting as James' assistant and she will quite possibly now take command of this post, would this not be a good time to provide her with such a co-worker through whom appointments would be cleared? I feel sure that Helene, as a relative newcomer to the United States, would be the first one to want such assistance. Such a person could quickly establish lines of communication

with reliable, old-time Reagan workers throughout the country who, when they do not personally know a suggested appointee, could make discreet local inquiries and thus warn against any bad choices. For instance, I live in the Seventh Congressional District of Georgia which is presently represented by Congressman Larry McDonald, a Democrat with a 100% conservative voting record. The local Republicans (the wrong kind of Republicans) are going to support Dave Sellers who pretends to be a conservative but couldn't really be one if he is going to oppose McDonald. The President needs to be warned about endorsing such a man.

I can see how these "litmus-test" people might get to feeling that they hold the powers of life and death over local appointments and this could be bad. But, wouldn't it be possible to find selfless people, "with a passion for anonymity", who would undertake this job out of strong desires to see Ronald Reagan succeed? I'm sure there are many people like this -- you and I are two -- who have no political ambitions and no craving for power. We just want conservatism to have a good chance to succeed. Wouldn't Lyn Nofziger be such a person, or perhaps Howard Phillips? I'm sure there are many.

I hope this note hasn't taken up too much of your time.

I hope Carolyn and the children are well.

One thing that has greatly impressed me about West Germany is its record on youth unemployment. Contrary to a common pattern, joblessness among teen-agers here is actually lower than among adults. In May, for example, the unemployment rate among young people under 20 was 5.8 percent, compared to 7 percent for persons 20 and over.

We can learn something from German experience. Indeed it may be timely for your administration to launch an initiative in the area of youth unemployment, perhaps using the German experience as a springboard to stimulate private sector involvement.

The most important reason for Germany's relatively good record on youth unemployment is its extensive system of apprenticeship training for young people. More than 1.5 million young men and women under 20 are studying and working under a plan that combines four days per week in on-the-job training with one day of classroom courses, usually over a period of three years.

The beauty of the system is that the government share of the cost is minimal. The employers pay completely for the on-the-job training itself, which accounts for an estimated four-fifths of the cost of the entire system; the federal, state, and local governments handle the rest, which covers mostly the expense of the classroom education.

This extensive German system has already been carefully studied by several American scholars and government experts, but unfortunately their work lies fallow in various reports. The success of the German programs needs to be brought to the attention of the American counterparts of those who make the system work in Germany--employers and trade union officials. It would be useful, in my view, for a team of U.S. employer and labor representatives to take a close first-hand look at the programs that exist in private industry here. And the representatives should come from fields outside construction and other trades in which we traditionally have had apprenticeship training.

Your Labor-Management Advisory Committee would be the ideal forum to advance this proposal. I would suggest that the subject of Youth Unemployment and the German Experience be put on the agenda of an early meeting of the committee.

One objection you may hear is that the German system can not be transplanted in the U.S. True, but that's not what I am advocating. Leaders from U.S. business and labor may not need any blueprints from Germany; but if they took a close look at the German apprenticeship system, they could come up with some new approaches to expanding private sector training for American youths.

I stand ready to welcome such a team to West Germany and to assist its members in having a productive visit -- meaning a visit that might produce some fresh ideas on how to cope with our serious youth unemployment problem.

Dear Yue-Kong:

Thank you for your letter of August 4 in which you elaborate on the reasons for your invitation to Mrs. Reagan to sponsor the launching of one of your ships in Shanghai in 1983.

As you know from the joint communique issued by the United States and the People's Republic of China on August 17, and the accompanying statement by President Reagan, we have resolved the recent difficulties in our relationship. We now hope to move ahead and develop our relations in a way that will bring increasing benefits to both of our nations.

These developments in all likelihood will include stepped-up high-level visits and exchanges of delegations of all kinds. Nonetheless, at the moment you can understand that I just cannot forecast the possibility of either a Presidential trip or an independent private trip by Mrs. Reagan, as far ahead as March/April or July 1983, when your ships will be launched. A private trip by Mrs. Reagan, should it occur, would obviously have to include a number of other functions which cannot be foreseen at this time.

Your invitation, your thoughtful follow-up letter, and the merit of your idea are very much appreciated here. If developments in the next few months result in a change of plans which would permit Mrs. Reagan's participation in such a ceremony, I will let you know. In the meantime, I am grateful for your offer and regret that I cannot respond more positively.

SUBJECT: Second Invitation to Mrs. Reagan from Y.K. Pao to Launch a Ship

Y.K. Pao's second letter (Tab B) invites you to reconsider the possibility of Mrs. Reagan launching one of his ships in Shanghai. He stresses the idea that she do it not on a trip accompanying the President, but a private trip which would be a sign of continuing efforts by the U.S. to maintain friendly ties despite our differences. It is an intriguing proposition, but she could obviously not make the trip for that purpose alone, and it would require orchestrating some other "missions" to justify it.

More importantly, if Mrs. Reagan made a private trip, it might well be interpreted by the Chinese as a substitute for a Presidential trip, whereas if a Presidential trip is scheduled, it would not make sense to have a separate private trip by Mrs. Reagan. In short, we need to sort out our plans for China in the aftermath of the joint communique before we can deal with this possibility definitively.

I suggest you thank him for his thoughtfulness, but reiterate that, as of this moment in US-PRC relations, we cannot forecast a trip either by the President or Mrs. Reagan privately in the first half of 1983, and without totally foreclosing the possibility, tell him you will let him know if these plans change in the next few months. This keeps the option open, should a Presidential trip materialize by the summer of 1983.

Dear Mike,

Thank you very much for your letter of last week in reply to my idea of inviting Mrs. Reagan to sponsor a ship in China.

I was most grateful for your views. I am of course aware of the current sensitivity in the relationship between your country and the PRC, but it was exactly for this reason that I thought a visit by the First Lady, ostensibly for a privately arranged function which is however close to the interests of senior leaders in Beijing, would provide a way of allowing a gesture to be made without involving the complications and commitments of an official trip by the President.

As I mentioned in my letter to you of the 22nd June, I am sure that the presence of the First Lady in China would be noted as a sign of the continuing efforts by the United States to maintain friendly ties between the two countries and their people, despite differences of opinion on certain issues. As a Chinese with a British passport who is a great friend of the United States, nothing would give me more pleasure than to do a small part in facilitating such endeavours, and of course I and my family would be greatly honoured if Mrs. Reagan could indeed become one of our vessel sponsors.

Perhaps you could give this some further thought and let me know at opportunity whether there could still be a chance for a visit earlier than you indicated in your letter.
