The new "Congressional Caucus on National Security" (CCNS) will officially be launched in early November. It will instantly become the largest caucus on Capitol Hill with 226 lawmakers in both the U.S. House and Senate. The new caucus will emphasize its bi-partisan nature, but its commitment to the President's defense and foreign policy agenda is indicated by its legislative objectives.

In addition to the defense budget, the major CCNS legislative objectives include SDI, completion of the strategic modernization program, funding for anti-satellite and chemical weapons, opposition to the Comprehensive Test Ban Treaty, and military aid to democratic resistance movements in Afghanistan, Nicaragua and Angola.

The Republican House Co-Chairmen are Reps. Bob Michel (Ill.), Trent Lott (Miss.), Jack Kemp (N.Y.), and Bill Dickinson (Ala.). The GOP Senate Co-Chairmen are Bob Dole (Kan.), Jake Garn (Utah), Jim McClure (Ida.), and Phil Gramm (Tex.).

The caucus has many ambitious plans, and they are detailed in the attached brochure. The American Security Council and the ASC Foundation are serving as the CCNS legislative and educational coordinators. Under the auspices of the ASC Foundation, Sven Kraemer, the former Director of Arms Control at the National Security Council, is serving as the CCNS's first Congressional Fellow. In addition, a half-hour T.V. film has just been completed that highlights the findings of a delegation of CCNS members to Central America, and a 60 second T.V. ad featuring Jeane Kirkpatrick will be used during the upcoming debate on "Contra aid".

As part of the activities to kick off the CCNS, we would like to request a brief photo opportunity with the President. This ceremony would recognize the individuals who have made the CCNS a reality, and the 20 person delegation would be led by Senator John McCain (Ariz.), the CCNS Republican Coordinator, and Senator Howell Heflin (Ala.), who is serving as one of the Democratic Co-Chairmen. The other individuals will primarily be private citizens who have demonstrated their commitment to our national security interests in a variety of ways.
