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CONCEPT INVITATION LETTER

## NEW TECHNOLOGIES AND THE ECONOMICS OF DEFENSE

During the next year, the Center For Strategic Concepts Ltd., a subsidiary of BDM International, will be conducting a study on behalf of the US Department of Defense to assist decision-makers in examining policy options associated with new technologies, and developing a framework for feasible policy choices and initiatives. The major objectives of the research are to: provide an independent assessment of the policy and strategy implications of emerging technologies within NATO and the Warsaw Pact; and assess the broad economic consequences (in terms of dollar costs, manpower, force structure and other resource allocations) for NATO of ET innovations and applications. The approach in this effort will involve a series of technical symposia that will be conducted to address various aspects of new technologies. The discussions will be held in Europe, will involve both US and European defense experts, and will be co-hosted by an institute in each country that participates in the program. This method is intended to provide a basis for accurate characterization of European views with respect to the implications of emerging technologies. The concept for conducting the symposia is as follows:

- Conferences currently planned for West Germany, Belgium, The Netherlands, Great Britain, and Italy.
- Two days of discussions involving approximately 40 participants (10-15 US, 25-30 European);
- Four research papers on various subjects will be presented (two by US authors and two by European authors) to stimulate the discussions on specific topics of inquiry;
- Specific topics for discussion will be selected in advance in consultation with host country representatives;
- Participants will include US experts in the areas of the Soviet military, NATO strategy, Western technology and industry, and defense economics;
- For each symposia, specific examples of emerging technology will be used to focus discussions. Examples include: armor/antiarmor; battle management; surveillance, acquisition, and targeting; and expansion and extension of air defenses (including ATBM).

Emerging technological developments within NATO and the Warsaw Pact are currently having a dramatic effect on perceptions with regard to future

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NATO defense requirements and capabilities. Recent advances in technology are influencing the entire range of weapon system characteristics in both alliances including:

- weapon platforms
- surveillance, acquisition and targeting
- range accuracy/lethality
- weapon basing modes
- kill mechanisms
- mobility and survivability

New technologies in these areas offer the prospect of greatly improving NATO's defensive posture, but have also stimulated considerable debate as to their implications for NATO strategy, the role of forces on the battlefield, and operational concepts for force employment in both the nuclear and conventional arenas. As a consequence, the impact of emerging technologies on the balance of future force capabilities and force employment concepts must be examined and carefully assessed to determine the range of implications for the entire spectrum of strategy and policy options that must be addressed within NATO in the years ahead.

In essence, the symposia are designed to facilitate an exchange of expert US and European opinion, based on original research, in three broad areas:

1. The Revolutionary Turn in Technology
  - The application of emerging technologies for security requirements;
  - The impact of new technologies in terms of deterrence and flexible response;
  - The implications of emerging technologies for NATO strategy and tactics.
2. Soviet Views on the Revolutionary Turn in Technology
  - The Soviet force development process;
  - Soviet science and technology strategy;
  - Soviet views on conventional technology;
  - Soviet views on strategic defense.
3. New Technology and Western Security
  - Western force development processes;
  - Economic implications of new technology for force development;
  - Western consultation and cooperation measures;
  - Burden-sharing in NATO;
  - European cooperation in defense production.

The results of this research will be incorporated into a report for the US DOD which addresses emerging technologies, identifies specific policy options flowing from the technology, and examines the relationship between options and the various approaches reflected in individual technology choices.

## Clingendael

Clingendael means: valley between the inner dunes. The original part of the historic house was built between 1642 and 1660 for Philips II Doublet, the second bearer of that name from a family which owned Clingendael after having moved to The Hague from the southern Netherlands. Various Doublets held the office of Treasurer-General in the Republic of the Seven United Provinces. Philips II Doublet was married to a sister of the famous poet-statesman Constantijn Huygens, while Philips III Doublet married one of the latter's daughters, Suzanna.

The architecture of the original part of Clingendael is assumed to be related to that of Hofwijck, the Huygens family's country seat at Voorburg. In the nineteenth and first half of the twentieth century Clingendael belonged to the Van Brien family, who were active in trading and banking. During the French administration Willem Joseph van Brien was appointed burgomaster of Amsterdam and was elevated by Napoleon to "baron de l'empire". The last of the van Brien in the male line, Arnold, had a race-course installed for his guests, now moved to nearby Duindijk. Arnold's pre-married daughter Margaretha, known as Fanny Dalay, laid out the fine Japanese Garden at Clingendael.

During the Second World War the house was occupied for several years by Seyss-Inquart, the German Reichs Commissioner for the Netherlands, and members of his family. Since 1954 Clingendael has been the property of the municipality of The Hague.
