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

# TREASURY NEWS

STATEMENT BY SECRETARY OF THE TREASURY DONALD T. REGAN AT A PRESS CONFERENCE SATURDAY, MARCH 31, 1984

I am pleased to announce that the Governments of Mexico, Venezuela, Brazil, Colombia, and the United States have joined the Government of Argentina in announcing a short-term \$500 million financing package in support of Argentina's economic adjustment efforts. The details have been provided in the release that was made available last night here at the Treasury Department and to you this morning.

I want to stress that this multilateral financing package was conceived by Mexico in hemispheric solidarity.

It takes into account that Argentina is faced with a temporary liquidity problem which prevents it, for the moment, from completing needed external debt service requirements to foreign banks;

It takes into account that Argentina has expressed its repeated intention of completely carrying out its obligation to the international banking community to the extent that its resources permit;

It takes into account that the solution of Argentina's external debt problems will redound to the benefit of the whole Latin American community;

It takes into account that the participating countries in this agreement have expressed their desire to cooperate and their solidarity with respect to the problems which Argentina is facing, as well as their deep interest in supporting Argentina to overcome those problems with the objective of making it an example of the democratic process;

-- It takes into account the report that the Government and people of Argentina are working not only to overcome the current difficult economic situation, but also to carry out structural changes required for the medium term.

The package consists of Mexico, Venezuela, Brazil and Colombia providing a total of \$300 million. Of this total, Mexico and Venezuela each provided \$100 million, while Brazil and Colombia provided \$50 million each. In addition, commercial backs comprising the International Advisory Committee for reserves to include in the package.

For its part, the United States has committed itself to provide a total of \$300 million in bridge financing to the Government of Argentina after agreement on a new adjustment program is reached by the International Monetary Fund (IMF) and the Government of Argentina.

Purther, the Managing Director of the IMF has issued a progress report on discussions between the government of Argentina and the management and staff of the IMF. In this connection, Argentina reaffirms its intention to work toward an early agreement with the IMF on a new adjustment program.

Finally, this very complex financial package should assist the Argentine government in restoring the basis for sustainable economic growth and in fostering democracy.

There has been some talk of a debtors' cartel. Well, this hemispheric cooperative move of many Latin nations to help one of their own, under Mexico's leadership, should put that talk to rest.

I also want to note that in this initial financing there is no contribution of dollars by the United States. We will only contribute after the IMF agreement allows us to bridge to something.

I can't conclude my statement without mentioning the extraordinary work done by the Treasury team. They were the linchpin in making the whole agreement possible. In particular, Deputy Secretary McNamar, Under Secretary Sprinkel and Assistant Secretary Mulford are to be congratulated and commended. 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

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

Dear Mr. Chairman:

I am writing to thank you, Edward Heath and Shridath Ramphal for your recent letter on the seventh replenishment of the International Development Association (IDA VII). I was pleased to hear that an agreement was reached by the IDA Deputies on January 14, and hope that the Executive Directors of the World Bank will soon forward the resolution to their Governors for approval.

I was asked to review the United States contribution to IDA VII before the meeting of the IDA Deputies in Paris last December. I concluded that the level of \$750 million per annum proposed by the U.S. Deputy in Tokyo last July would preserve the role of IDA in the poorest countries and allow IDA to continue to make a significant contribution to development, especially if the funds were concentrated on those countries with limited access to alternative financing and used to encourage the pursuit of effective economic policies.

As you know, the IDA VII program is scheduled to begin in July this year. Given this tight schedule, I think our top priority should be to ensure that the IDA VII resolution is adopted as soon as possible to prevent any disruption in IDA's lending program. In January, the Deputies endorsed a Canadian recommendation that the IDA VII program be reviewed in eighteen months. I assure you that the United States will approach that review with an open mind and will work constructively with other members to assess the effectiveness of the IDA program. Should you wish to discuss the issue further, George Shultz and Don Regan would be able to meet with you at a mutually convenient opportunity.

#### Issue

To respond to a letter from Willy Brandt regarding IDA VII.

#### Facts

Attached (Tab B) is a letter to you from Willy Brandt and other leaders of the Independent Commission on International Development Issues. They ask that you reconsider your decision to provide \$750 milion per annum as the U.S. contribution to the IDA VII replenishment, arguing that it triggers lower contributions from others which, when totalled, are "wholly inadequate for the needs of the world's poorest."

#### Discussion

State has drafted a response (Tab A) which we support stating essentially:

-- The level of the U.S. contribution will preserve the prominent role of IDA in the poorest countries and will allow IDA to continue its contribution to LDC development.

-- We are mindful of the need to focus funding more on the poorest countries.

-- We encourage timely adoption of the IDA VII resolution to avoid disrupting the IDA lending program.

we are writing as members of the I.C.I.D.I. (The Brandt Commission) to seek your personal support for the financial replenishment of the World Bank's International Development Association (IDA) at a more satisfactory level than is currently envisaged.

We have recently returned from a meeting in Rome held to review progress on proposals made by the Commission from time to time. Our meeting covered many issues, but we paid rather special attention to current difficulties over IDA replenishment. The negotiations so far have sadly reduced real funds for IDA VII to a level wholly inadequate for the needs of the world's poorest; indeed, far below the level which many donor countries were actually willing to provide. In our conclusions, we supported the proposal already on the table for a minimum contribution of \$ 12 bn. for IDA VII and undertook to do everything possible to encourage donor countries to make a response worthy of the international community.

We are aware of the difficulties which your administration has faced in committing itself to meeting the future financial needs of IDA and we are also conscious of the long record of generosity of the United States in supporting the World Bank's efforts. We trust that you will,

even at this late stage, be willing to reconsider your earlier decision on behalf of the US not to subscribe to IDA replenishment at a level favoured by all other donors.

Such is the importance and urgency of this matter that we would appreciate an opportunity for some members of the Commission to come to Washington to discuss it personally with you or with the members of your Cabinet most directly concerned.


