

As you requested, I have reviewed the draft speech insert for Senator Baker's upcoming address to the Radio and Television News Directors Association. I have penciled in my recommended revisions on the attached draft.

I recommended omitting the sentence "And I'll tell you why," and substituting what I have written in its place, because the original sentence makes it appear that the Democrats in Congress declined to override the veto because they were convinced by the President's position. In truth, they simply lacked the votes. We should not give them credit for principles they do not support.

I also recommended some revisions in the final sentence. The President has called the Fairness Doctrine unconstitutional, so there is no need for Senator Baker to qualify the position by stating that it is only "probably" unconstitutional. In addition, we should not imply that all content-based regulation is unconstitutional, because it is not.



Regan reported that while he was in town with T. Boone Pickens group (who were meeting in the OEOB with Administration officials), he thought Boone went too far in his blanket criticisms of corporate management.

The primary message Regan wanted to deliver was on state "preemption" and foreign policy. Specifically, he made the statement that he and other public pension fund managers were "making foreign policy" by their investment decisions. Further, state laws requiring disinvestment (such as California and New Jersey in the case of South Africa) were also exercises in foreign policy. He opined that the situation was getting worse. There are moves afoot at the state level to require disinvestment in Northern Ireland because of discrimination against Catholics. He also cited a bill in the New York legislature to require disinvestment from any country which employed "slave labor"—defined as less than 25% of the U.S. average manufacturing wage.

Finally, Regan offered to be helpful in any fiscal management initiatives we chose to undertake, such as financial reporting systems.

When I spoke with you before I mentioned that Robert Taft, Jr. had written a letter outlining the request in more specific terms. You assured me that the letter was on file and would be reviewed at the proper time.

I have been made aware that Senator Baker is Hamilton County's first and only choice for this particular rally at this time. So much so that they are willing to construct the event according to the Senator's schedule and not necessarily their own.

I hope that every effort will be made to honor this request. I was present when the Senator addressed the Ohio Savings & Loan League in Nashville last year and he was touched, as we all were, by the warmth of their reception and the standing ovation he received.

You suggested that I ask Mr. Kohnen to make a further inquiry sometime in August and of course I will do this.

In the meantime, please give my warm regards to the Senator. I do hope he will extend his "home rule" policy to include Ohio Republicans since they hold him in such great esteem.

## Reagan becomes shaking hypocrite

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The recent annual White House Correspondents Dinner had its moments.

President Reagan had to shake hands and congratulate Bob Woodward of The Washington Post for his revelation of Reagan's "disinformation" campaign against Libya.

As Reagan got up to shake the hand of Woodward, whose efforts won the Post the Pulitzer Prize in the Watergate scandal, the president murmured to his wife: "I hate to be a hypocrite but I guess I have to shake his hand anyway."

Another sidelight at the dinner was the attention paid to telegenic Fawn Hall, former secretary to ousted National Security deputy Lt. Col. Oliver North, Hall, who will testify on alleged document shredding before North was fired in the Iran arms-Contra aid scandal, showed up with her lawyer, Plato Cacharis.

Hall was spotted at one point talking to former national security adviser Robert McFarlane who made a secret trip to Iran.

Another former national security adviser, Adm. John Poindexter, who resigned as the scandal unfolded, also attended the dinner.

The president still has words of praise for Poindexter, who he calls an "honorable man" and North, who he described as a "national hero."

Evelyn Y. Davis, who writes a financial newsletter "High Lights and Low Lights," and attends blue chip corporation stockholder meetings regularly, extracted from Merrill Lynch officials at a meeting in Princeton, N.J., recently a "ball park" salary of former White House spokesman Larry Speakes.

Asked if Speakes was pulling down a salary of \$300,000 in his new position on Wall Street, she was told, "That's in the ball park."

Speakes has not exactly forsaken Washington. He has shown up at the major dinners

where the president has been the guest of honor recently, including the Gridiron dinner and the White House Correspondents dinner.

The White House had a credibility gap two years ago when it sought to keep secret the removal of a patch of skin cancer from Reagan's nose.

But White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater has no credibility problem. Showing up at the podium with two or three red blotches on his face, he did not hesitate to respond to a question, saying that he has skin cancer removed every six months.

Reagan was preaching to the choir when he addressed the U.S. Chamber of Commerce recently, and the audience was with him all the way with his humor and his policies.

Noting that the Chamber had been formed in 1912 at the suggestion of President Howard Taft, he recalled that Taft is the only president who had served on the Supreme Court. Taft, who became chief justice, was quoted as saying at the peak of his career: "I don't remember that I was ever president."

"You know that's something I can identify with," quipped Reagan.

Another story Reagan relished was about "that fellow out on the golf course who found that his drive had ended up right in front of an ant nest."

As the president tells it, "Well, he got out an iron and he took a swing. He didn't hit the ball; he hit the anthill. Thousands of ants were thrown into the air. He took two more swipes at it, and each time missed the ball and hit the anthill. And a couple of remaining ants, one looked at the other one and said, 'If we want to survive, we'd better get on the ball.'"
